Mr. Foote's directions for plant-

ing are:
Place the trees in the prepared hole, letting it stand, according to size, from two to three inches deeper than it grew in the nursery

You can readily distinguish this by the earth mark on the tree. Fill in around the roots un-til the hole is about Ovo-thirds full, press dirt down firmly, then fill the remainder of the hole with water, allowing it to stand until soaked in. Fill again with water, and when it has soaked in, fill up the bole, mounding up the dirt very slightly toward the tree, leaving a slight depression at the outer edge of the hole so as to drain the water to the ends of the roots rather than

toward the body of the tree. The hole should be dug six to tw-lve inches wider and deeper than necessary to accommodate the roots. One part manure to three parts soil, or muck, will benefit your trees. Where possible it is better to dynamite the hole. However, this should be undertaken

only by an expert.

Before planting, keep roots covered with moist material; do not read this, it is time to come and | expose to sun or allow to freeze.

thrown into the sea by the inhabitants, who are remarkably healthy. Epidemics are unknown.

"Tristan is a British possession in the South Atlantic between South Africa and South America. Its snow-capped peak towers nearly 3,000 feet above sea level. It is only twenty-one miles in circumference. The one miles in circumference. The nearest inhabited place in St. Helena, 1,200 miles away. The island itself is of volcanic origin, the only habitable portion of it being a tongue of fertile land at the foot of the precipitous cliffs.

Few Wants "Sufficient potatoes are grown in plots to meet the needs of the in-habitants. Cattle and sheep were introduced years ago and many cattle now run wild. Clothes are only to be obtained by bartering from ships that call. For protection to the feet the people make moccasins of bullock hide. Wonderful socks are made the women from wool carded by

themselves.

"From June to October of this year the people had been without bread, tea, coffee and sugar, but they

all looked pretty well nourished."

The reason there is no bread is that fifty or sixty years ago a shipwreck near the island allowed rats to get ashore so that since that time no wheat has been raised. But the mean that they are going to the grain to the grain. wheat has been raised. But the mean they are going to try again when the next mail in a year or two brings them some seed wheat. In the meantime, they are in no hurry; the meantime, they are in no hurry; if there isn't any bread they can be contented on potatoes. And, to supplement their potatoes, fish are abundant, and cattle, and birds with their eggs, and seals. They want for many things, says the chaplain, nevertheless, "there appears to be little discontent and few ever wish to leave the island."

Prairie Closes Down 1,600 bbl. Well Near Breck.

Flowing 1,600 barrels in the first nine hours, the Prairie Oil & Gas company well No. 5, on the T. P. Cochran lease within a mile of Breckenridge, came i at 9 o'clock last night, pay sand being hit at a depth ranging between 3,100 and 3,200 feet, it is reported. the third to 475 feet. In addition to those that the company s now drilling on this lease, it has already two producing wells on the property. No. 3, which came in for 150 barto 3,197 feet after being shot with 150 quarts of nitro-glycerine, is now being cleaned out. No. 1 is producing about 30 barrels at a depth ranging between 3,100 and 3,150 feet.
