Construction of a 20,000-barrel daily capacity "topping" or "skimming" plant at a cost of several hundred thousand dollars was begun today by the Humble Oil & Refining company on the Sun company's Rusk spur, some three and one-half miles south of Ranger. It is to be completed by April 15 and will handle all the oil that is piped from the Ranger field to the comaranese families who arrived here last pany's refineries at Bay City in South Texas, it is reported.

Government Says Cost of Living Is Not Declining

Dollar Doesn't Go as Far as in 1919, Says Federal Expert.

International News Service. WASHINGTON, Jan 6.—The cost of living has not gone down. It costs even more to live today than it, did one year ago. The New Year opens with an ac-companiment of rosy forecasts of relief for customers. There is much basis for hope in the price recessions noted. But the bald fact is today that your dollar bill has no greater purchasing power than in the holidays twelve months ago. Cold figures, compiled with an accuracy that defies contradiction, offer irrefutable proof that the high cost of living remains high. And the wind-jamming of prophets high. And the wind-jamming of prophets and propagandists, now using the fanci-ful plea that lowered living costs warrant deep cuts in the wages for which the av-erage man tolls, gets nowhere and is made to look ridiculous. High food cost, or it can be truthfully said, higher food costs,

can be truthfully said, higher food costs, stands out as the main thing that puts a crimp in the public purse. Review of the year 1920 by govern-ment experts shows that within this twelve-month period prices on practically all things, considered most necessary in the average family schedule rose to un-precedented heights. The high "peak" on many principal staples was reached last spring. There have been some price declines from the "peak" points toward the close of the year. But the price re-cessions thus far noted are generally upon isolated articles and reflect no wide-spread reductions. In fact, upon most things the consumer has to buy he is pay-ing as much as he did a year ago, and ing as much as he did a year ago, and on some commodities he is paying much higher prices. Such price tumbles as have occurred, as, for example, on sugar, are conspicuous for their small numbers, but in buying sugar for ten or eleven cents a pound you are paying just about what you paid for it a year ago—a war price. The scattered instances of price tumbles have been woeffully restricted to a group of things that have soared to diarry heights within the year 1000 Cona group of things that have soared to dizzy heights within the year 1920. Gen-erally, then, men and women are still paying "war prices" on practically all they buy, and consumers of every class are being harder hit at every end of the buying game than they were at any time in either the year 1918, when prices be-gan ascending, or in 1919, when threats of still higher prices became real. The retail cost today of twenty-two leading food articles in all parts of the

of still higher prices became real. The retail cost today of twenty-two leading food articles in all parts of the United States, made the basis of study by government experts, is relatively som-what higher than at the close of 1919. On this group of foods that enter into every household and are strictly neces-sities, the range of average prices stood about 100 per cent above the 1913, or pre-war level, figures. Now the prices on this same group of essentials stand around 110 per cent above the pre-war figures. There has been a gradual de-cline generally away from the "peak" marks of summer. Each succeeding month from 1 to 5 per cent drops have been noted here and there on certain staples. Perhaps the most pronounced drops have occurred in wearing apparel, in both cotton and woolens. But the drops have largely featured the whole-sale quotations. Reductions of from 25 to 40 per cent were made by wholesalers, but a corresponding decrease has not been made in the retail trade. The average total outgo of the individual for essen-tial things is fully as great now as ever, despite the few declines made in a spectial things is fully as great now as ever espite the few declines made in a spec tacular way. Federal reserve board reports as well as, a very careful survey by the bureau of labor statistics seem, however, to in dicate some further relief for consumers generally in 1921. These reports, based upon returns made by bankers and large business interests of every character, in dicate that prices of selected groups of foods and clothing as well may tumble downward 25 to 50 per cent more, according to the commodity specified, be-fore midsummer of 1921 is reached. Long expected drops in prices of boots and shoes are certain soon after the New Year, officials predict. Certain factors are now operating to destroy some of the speculative element in shoe prices., Governor Harding of the reserve board, in position to gauge the public pulse, feels that the consuming public will be-gin to get benefit of price concessions in the wholesale trade very soon after the beginning of the New Year.

International News Service. BOULDER, Colo., Jan. 6-George Davis, overseas veteran of Red Lodge, Mont., coughed up two pieces of an "O. D." uniform here and is now on the road to recovery after suffering many months from a mysterious "lung trouble" that baffled physicians.

Davis was wounded in the Argonne on Oct. 2, 1918, and spent several months in hospitals in France. Some months after the armistice ne was discharged and returned to Red Lodge. For two years he has suffered agonizing pain from an affliction of the left lung that physicians were unable to diagnose.

Recently Davis came to Boulder for vocational training at the University of Colorado, but his ailment had kept him confined to bed much of the time and little hope was entertained for his life.


