KAFIR SEED IS FOUND TO HAVE LONG LIFE

A sample of Blackhul kafir seed seven years old has been tested for germination by the Texas agricultural experiment station and found to contain 88 per cent live seed capable of producing good plants. This seed has been in storage at the experiment station at Lubbock, where it was grown in connection with grain sorphum inheritance studies heing made there. The seed was thoroughly cleaned and dried and placed in a paper container and the container stored in a box in the laboratory at the Lubbock station.



When working on the rear end of a automobile, or under it, it is usual. necessary to jack up one end of the car t provide more space to work. The illia tration shows a pair of simple homemac jacks for this purpose. They are made 2 by 6-in. unplaned lumber, and cor structed as shown in the upper figure each consisting of a 2 by 6-in base, tw support blocks, and a top board of th same material. The top board is pivote on one of the support blocks by mean of a piece of 1/2-in. iron pipe, loosely held in place by large staples; it must be about twice as long as the base and beveled a one end as shown, this end being slightly eavier than the other so that the board will fall to the position indicated in the upper figure.







Actually, it is the log of a rare and delightful journey told with the charm and sympathy which one would expect from an Irish woman born on American soil. It may not have been written with that in view, but the book reads like a romance.
