ODOR OF BOOZE ATTACHES TO DAUGHERTY

Who Turned the Tiger Loose in Tiffin?

SCHOOL HOUSE SCENE OF MUCH MOUTHWRANGLE

Candidates for Trustee Make Dignified Pleas, but Others Forget Where They Are.

Two candidates for school trustee, who would represent Tiffin, a community with 60 poll tax payers, in the Ranger Independent school district, divided the center of attention of a Tiffin audience last night with the chairman of the meeting and a man said to have been representing a daily newspaper in the Eastland county seat.

The disturbance which involved a question of veracity came after C. Miller, who says he is an independent candidate for trustee, had finished answering C. S. Bennett, his political antagonist, Jack Jarvis, former member of the school board and a resident of Tiffin, was making some statements about the Ranger board being steeped in klanishness preparatory to introducing M. H. Hagaman, present member and candidate for re-election.

Board in Politics, He Says.
"Don't you middle-grade people be misled on the Ku Klux Klan," Jarvis said. "I used to be a member and I say to you the board has been in politics for the last 23 months. And I'll—"

"Who put politics in the schools," interrupted Clyde Manning, owner of the Red Front grocery store, located near the Sinclair oil properties.

"H. S. Cole, if you'd know," Jarvis came back.
"You're a liar," Manning said, rising halfway to his feet.
"I'll meet you outside after the meeting," Jarvis said, coming closer to the stage footlights. "Who invited you kluxers to start this," Jarvis continued.
"I'm not a klansman," Manning replied. "We know you are," Jarvis said. "That's right Jarvis," said a voice on the left side of the audience.
"That's a d—m lie," Manning said heatedly.
"Let's go on," spoke up someone, and these were the last words of the subject of who is and isn't a klansman. There was no uproar as sometimes follows such impromptu affairs.

British Airmen May Circle Globe Trying To Beat U. S. Flyers

LONDON, March 18.—The start of the American airplanes on their flight around the world has aroused the envy of the British, who are now planning to enter the race and beat the Americans in making the circuit, the London Evening News said today. The British plan to fly eastward, while the Americans are going westward.

Three royal airforce planes, one being a Napier-Victor Amphibian plane, similar to that in which Sir Ross Smith flew to Australia, are being hurriedly prepared for the flight, the News says. It had been planned to start the British airmen about April 15, but the date has been set ahead.

The schedule calls for the completion of the globe flight in three months, which would bring them home ahead of the Americans.

WILL BANQUET 200 PERSONS AT GHOLSON HOTEL

New Commercial Club Will Entertain Next Week; Only Two Weeks Old.

A banquet for 200 men and women, citizens of Ranger, will be held some night at the Gholson hotel. The newly organized Commercial club of Ranger will be the host. The date will be announced tomorrow.

Music and entertainment features that will be of an unusual order will be programmed, A. Joseph, president of the club, announced today, following the club's weekly luncheon at the Gholson hotel.

"It will be for the purpose of getting merchants better acquainted with the needs of her townspeople and our local citizens with the men who run our stores," Joseph said. Personal invitations will be mailed out as soon as they come from the printer. Included in the envelope of invitation will be a card which the club requests the recipient to return at once. The recipient will be expected to inform the club if he or she can attend.

Today's luncheon was well attended and the members talked enthusiastically of plans for a sweeping spring trade. Adjournment was taken promptly at 1:15 o'clock.

OIL OPERATORS ATTRACTED TO WILDCAT AREA

Eastland County Men Investing in Leases in Crockett and Reagan Counties.

Eastland county oil operators and oil companies are leasing thousands of acres of land in Crockett and Reagan counties. Ranger independent operators and companies with headquarters here are particularly interested in the wildcat country, on which eyes were focused following the coming in of the St. Rita discovery well.

Among the Ranger oil men interested in acreage are said to be J. L. Thompson, John M. Gholson, Jack Clements, W. R. Bowden, George Dunkle, G. D. Chastain, C. J. Crotty, Corzelius brothers of Eastland, who have bought leases in Crockett county.

Magnolia Petroleum company with production headquarters at Olden, half way between Ranger and Eastland on the highway, is reported to have leased 20,000 acres. The Eldorado Oil & Gas company and the Texas Pacific Coal & Oil company, with Texas field offices in Ranger are also interested in these fields. The Eldorado has six sections and 80 acres besides. The States Oil corporation, with production offices in Eastland, will wildcat in the new country.

'Mystery Man' Says Fall and Sinclair Alone In Big Deal

BALTIMORE, Md., March 18.—Col. James E. Darden, "mystery man" sought as a witness by the senate Teapot Dome and Daugherty committee, today declared in a copy-righted interview published by the Evening Sun that neither the late President Harding nor Attorney General Daugherty had any knowledge of the deal between Harry S. Sinclair and former Secretary of the Interior Fall whereby Sinclair obtained the government oil leases.

"Fall handled the whole thing himself. He didn't tell anybody about it," Colonel Darden declared. "He didn't even tell it at cabinet meetings."

Darden was mentioned by Roxie Stinson in her testimony as a man who met Daugherty and Jess Smith, her former husband, in a shack in the woods near Columbus, Ohio, where they are supposed to have discussed the oil deal.

DAUGHERTY FINDS HE HAS FRIEND IN MOVIE MANAGER AT PITTSBURG

WASHINGTON, March 18.—Attorney General Daugherty today continued his reply to charges against him in connection with the showing of fight films, by making public a letter from John Harris, Pittsburgh theatrical man, regarding a formal ruling which Harris said Daugherty gave him in the Dempsey-Firpo picture.

On this point, the Pittsburgh superior man said he desired to remind Daugherty of their conversation about the matter, to which Harris quoted Daugherty as follows: "In reply to my question as to the view the department took on these questions you said, 'there is only one way these or any fight pictures can be transported.'"

Shallow Oil Sands North Of Eastland Give Good Showing

The Mogul Oil corporation's H. C. Ernest No. 1, located on the north one-half of the northwest one-fourth of section 3, block 4, H. and T. C. Railway company survey of Eastland county lands, and five miles north of the city of Eastland, has an excellent showing for a producer from the shallow sands, according to the most reliable reports from the well Monday.

Gas was struck Sunday at a depth of 1325 feet and the boiler has been moved back and other preparations made to drill in within the next few days.

It has been known for sometime that production in the vicinity of the Ernest tract could be had in the shallow sand, but this had been passed up heretofore in the interest of the deeper and bigger pay.

A good producer on the Ernest tract would attract much attention to that area and no doubt would open up another paying shallow oil field in the county.

ANDERSON LEADS FORD SALESMEN IN AUTO SALES

Edwin Phillips of Dallas Predicts Ranger Agency Will Be On Top.

T. J. Anderson was announced as leading his five fellow salesmen of the Leveille-Maher Motor company last night at a banquet held at the Gholson hotel to stimulate sales for the March campaign of the Ford Motor company. He is closely followed by Dee Sanders and W. J. McFarland.

The banquet, which was attended by Edwin Phillips, general manager of the wholesale and distributing department of the Dallas branch of the Ford company; H. M. Burton, chief Lincoln representative of the Dallas branch, and Phil Cappy of Dallas, road supervisor, and 25 men of the various departments of the Leveille-Maher company, lasted until almost 11 o'clock.

Picture Represents Growth.
Arthur Jury, manager of the Gholson hotel, arranged a complete surprise for the company by having a canvas painted which represented the Leveille-Maher company building of today and the bigger building of tomorrow.

Edw. R. Maher of the company kept the program running in high gear with verbal shafts to his associates and entertaining stories. He introduced Phillips as the last speaker, who took for his topic, "Success." He straightway complimented the Ranger agency for its showing up to date in the national campaign of sales, which will determine the 24 best salesmen of their respective districts. He said the Dallas branch would stand back of the local agency and offered all assistance needed to put the Leveille-Maher company out in front.

SLEMP MAKES SOME MONEY IN SPECULATIONS

Brokers' Books Make Him Appear Better Financier Than Daugherty.

WASHINGTON, March 18.—The president's secretary, the attorney general, two senators and four congressmen speculated in Sinclair and Doherty oil stock before and after the government assigned the naval reserve stocks made by the senate oil investigating committee by Lewis Bond, expert who has just completed a month's examination of the books of several brokers, who submitted his report.

C. Bascom Slemple, secretary to President Coolidge, and Attorney General Daugherty head the list. Both had accounts turned over to other names shortly after the Sinclair and Doherty stocks were purchased, the Slemple purchases being identified in the records of P. W. Slemple, while Daugherty's were turned over to W. W. Spaid, a partner in the firm of Hids & Co., brokers, but the receipt for the account was signed by Jesse Smith, intimate friend of Daugherty. The record revealed that Slemple made \$2,050.15 at least in the transactions, and Daugherty made \$643.50. These figures are said to represent only a portion of the deals, and the full extent of the profits could not be gleaned from an examination of the intricate book-keeping system of 15 brokerage houses.

Senators Charles Curtis of Kansas, Republican whip, and Davis E. Kilgore of West Virginia were two members of the upper house whose deals were "bad," Curtis bought 100 shares of the Sinclair stock which has not yet been sold.

Soldiers' Bonus Bill Goes Through House On Big Vote

WASHINGTON, March 18.—The house today passed the soldier bonus bill. The measure is radically different from the bill that was vetoed by former President Harding. Its principal provision is a 20-year endowment insurance to be issued to all ex-service men except those whose compensation is \$50 or less. These will be entitled to cash.

The vote was 355 to 54 and was regarded an overwhelming victory for the bonus advocates.

BOOTH OF EASTLAND COUNTY AT FAT STOCK SHOW IS ATTRACTIVE

According to all reports from the Cisco-Eastland-Ranger booth at the Fort Worth Fat Stock show, attracted much attention. In fact it was said by many who saw it to be the best arranged and most attractive exhibit at the show.

The booth was 10x10, inside of which was a platform 5x8 on which was constructed a miniature chicken house, modern in every respect. In this house and yard surrounding it were 100 baby chicks. Forming a background for the house was a large number of photographs of scenes in and around Eastland, Ranger and Cisco. Large quantities of literature from the chambers of commerce of the three towns was also there convenient for distribution and much of it was taken away by interested persons.

County Agent R. H. Bush, Mr. Briggs, Mr. Richardson, Mr. Bennett and others who assisted in getting up and arranging this exhibit, deserve much credit for their work.

Saghelin Island Of Japan Is Shaken By Earth Tremors

TOKIO, Japan, March 18.—Another earthquake disaster has visited the Japanese islands. This time Kashiku, a small Japanese colony, and the Saghelin Island have been the center of the quake.

Meager reports said the shock occurred Saturday night, that houses were shaken down and there were many casualties, that great fissures had opened in the earth and immediately following the earthquake the Naylor river began rising rapidly.

The tremors were felt in Tokio. Instruments showed the shock was both vertical and horizontal. The seismic center is believed to be in the bottom of the sea near the island of Kurile.

Relief measures have been started here to give aid to the injured and homeless on Saghelin Island.

'Round the World' Flyers Due To Be In Vancouver Today

NAVA FIELD, Sacramento, Calif., March 18.—The second day's flight of the "round the world" journey started at 9:48 this morning, when the three Douglas cruisers, headed by Major Fred Martin, making the flight, hopped off from the Nava Field and, after circling for altitude, headed northward for Eugene, Ore., and Vancouver Barracks. They expected to encounter no unfavorable weather, all reports for today being of clear skies and light winds.

At the Vancouver Barracks the air cruisers will be fitted with pontoons to prepare them for the flight over land and water when they cross over to Asia.

FEDERAL GRAND JURY WILL WORK AT ONCE ON OIL SCANDAL EVIDENCE

WASHINGTON, March 18.—A federal grand jury will be impaneled within two weeks to consider evidence of criminal conspiracy in the oil scandal, it was learned today. Indictments may be sought against three persons as principals and several others may be involved as alleged accomplices.

Grand jury action is to begin shortly after the return of Atlee Pomerene and Owen J. Roberts, special presidential counsel, who have now put under way several suits for cancellation of the Teapot Dome and California naval reserve leases to Harry S. Sinclair and E. L. Doherty. Charges of conspiracy to defraud the government and of bribery, as set out in the petitions for cancellation of the leases, will form the basis for the government's criminal proceedings.

HARRY'S FRIEND GOT THE MONEY, WITNESS SAYS

Mellon, Weeks, Haynes and Others Called Relative to New Phase of Inquiry.

WASHINGTON, March 18.—Delving into transactions regarding the withdrawal of liquor, the senate committee investigating Attorney General Daugherty today heard from William Orr of New York a story of large payments, sometimes totaling \$25,000 at a time, to Harold Manning, described as a close friend of Daugherty.

These payments, Orr said, were made in connection with liquor deals, but he did not know what became of the money except that it was to keep the cases out of court.

Development of this angle of the inquiry followed announcement that a large number of subpoenas had been issued, including in the committee's dragnet Secretaries Mellon and Weeks, Prohibition Commissioner Haynes and several members of Daugherty's staff at the department of justice. Among them was H. H. Votaw, brother-in-law of the late President Harding, who had charge of the parole cases at the department.

Orr, the witness who told of the alleged liquor deals, said that "various people" gave him money in connection with liquor withdrawals, and that he always turned it over, to Washington. Secretary Wheeler asked him if the total did not reach \$200,000 but Orr said he could not tell. Previously he was asked about his connection with the plan to distribute the Dempsey-Carpentier fight film. He added little to the committee's information on that point, but disclosed that he acted as campaign fund collector for the Republican party in 1920, gathering in \$10,000 before the 1920 convention, which he gave to Will Hays and Col. Boyce Thompson, then chairman and treasurer respectively of the Republican national committee.

Prairie Buys Eight Dodge Roadsters Of Ranger Garage

Eight Dodge four-cylinder roadsters have been sold to the Prairie Oil & Gas company by the Ranger garage, the local representative of the Dodge Motor company. The cars will be used exclusively for field service.

The new roadsters replace the 10 roadsters of the same make bought two years ago of the Ranger garage, and which were traded in for the new models.

"The Dodge car is very satisfactory to us," E. J. Wiss, transportation manager of the Prairie company, said today. He emphasized the adjectival "very." "That's the reason why we repeated the order."

The old Dodges were put into use in April, 1922, and have seen severe service.

NAVAL BOARD DETAILED TO FORMULATE PLAN TO CONSERVE NAVY'S OIL

WASHINGTON, March 18.—A naval board of five officers has been detailed to formulate plans to administer the naval oil reserve, if returned to the government as a result of the cancellation suits just started. Strictest conservation of the navy's oil is to be the basis of the new program, Acting Secretary of the Navy Roosevelt announced in making publication of the names of the officers detailed to draw up the plan.

TRUNK MYSTERY SOLVED, DENVER MAN CONFESSES BEATING WIFE TO DEATH

DENVER, Colo., March 18.—Fred Janssen today confessed that he beat his wife to death and then placed her body in a trunk in which it was discovered at Ogden, Utah. At first he said he hired a Mexican to do the killing, and then he repudiated this story and assumed all the blame for the murder.

DALLAS, March 18.—Three small buildings in East Dallas were destroyed by fire today with a loss of about \$12,000. Those burned out were E. K. Jackson, barber; Paul Moutley, restaurant; the Dixie Ele shop.

REPLY TO KLUXER PROPAGANDA.

After devoting itself earnestly, wholeheartedly and inefficiently for nearly five months to a campaign of abuse and vilification against the Eastland Telegram, a sprightly, upstanding and popular newspaper in the Eastland county seat, the Eastland Oil Belt News has now turned its sulphurous batteries, fired by spleen, against the Ranger Times.

This is as unexpected as uncalculated for. The Ranger Times has always been the most courteous and considerate toward its esteemed contemporary in Eastland, so far as the editor of this newspaper is aware, and to be accused without justification would be heart-breaking if it was not so ludicrous. Listen to this arraignment in the Oil Belt News:

"The main trouble with the Ranger Times, it hasn't any consistent policies, nor does it favor correct principles. It has defended and apologized for those supposed to be connected with the road bond graft; it has defended and apologized for those supposed to be connected with wide-open law violations and corrupt practices here a few years ago. The crowd in control of that paper have no particular respect for true religion, law enforcement or the right kind of conduct of public affairs."

That is the bill of complaint. To be accused by the Oil Belt News, according to its editor, equivalent to conviction, so it outlines the punishment to which the Ranger Times is to be subjected. The Oil Belt News says: "If that isn't plain enough English, (meaning, you senseless wretch) it may be necessary to use a vocabulary that they can understand better, though not just the thing for print in a decent newspaper like the Oil Belt News." Whether or not the Oil Belt News is justified in using such language towards its unoffending, prosperous and popular contemporary in an adjacent town may be a question for argument, but aside from this its editor should be reminded of what a great, world-unknown poet once wrote. He said:

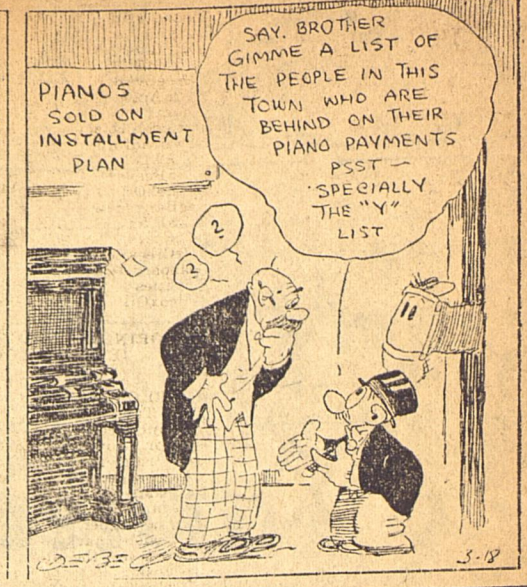
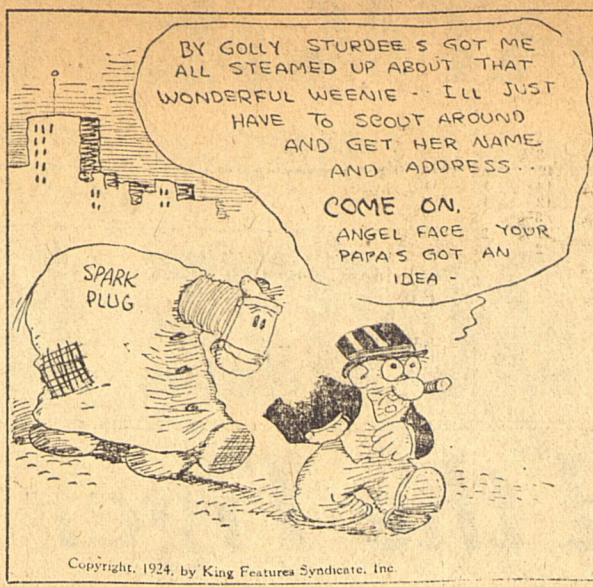
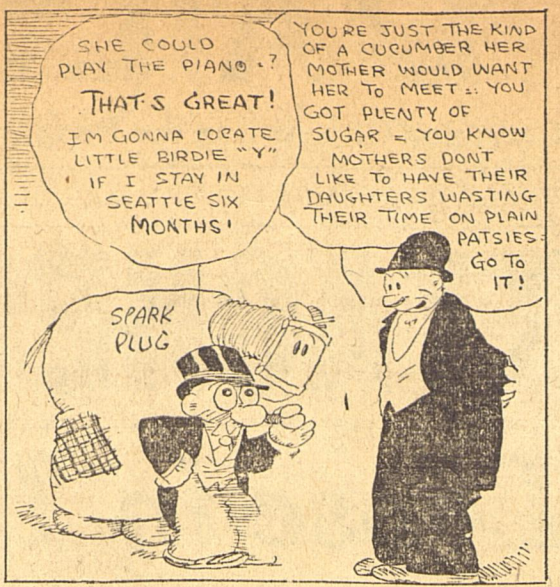
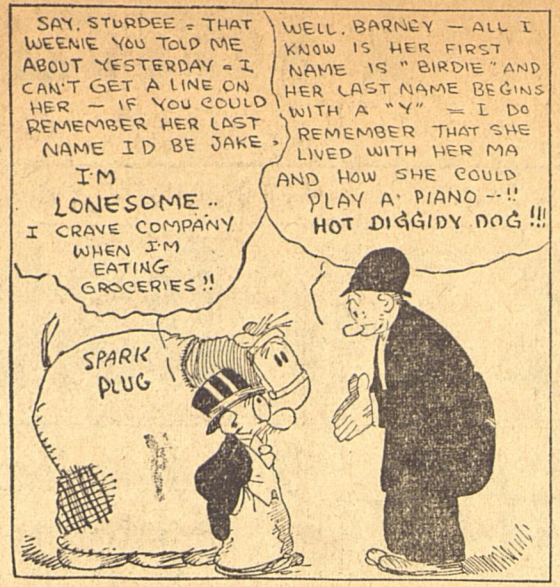
"Do not consign distasteful things To that o'er-heated clime below, Lest, when the sexton tolls your knell, You'll meet with them again, you know."

The Oil Belt News further alleges, but more in the nature of a plea of abatement rather than further indictment, that the Ranger Times "is attempting to trim its sails somewhat." In view of this, should not the Oil Belt News be glad of the apparent wish to adopt the "correct principles," which the Oil Belt News, standing like the Sadducee in the synagogue, so proudly affirms as its own? Somewhere in the Good Book it is said there is much joy in heaven over a sinner that repenteth, but not so with the Oil Belt News.

With reference to the indictment, which this newspaper would not consider justifies notice if it was not for its exquisite humor, it is not necessary to enter a denial. Buffoonery is never taken seriously, but sometimes unconscious buffoonery is so mirth provoking that it is entitled to notice. Because so few people will ever see it in the Oil Belt News and so many, therefore, would lose the opportunity for a chuckle, this newspaper is giving it the circulation that would otherwise be denied.

That virile, enterprising and real newspaper, the Eastland Telegram, may have merited some rebuke from the organ of the Eastland county kluxers, for it has not always shown the respect which age and infirmity should inspire in its esteemed contemporary, but why the Ranger Times should be turned on by an organ of which it has never had anything to say that was not perfectly respectful can only be attributed to failing cranial nerve tissues.

MRS. JENNIE STRICKLAND, PIONEER TEXAS WOMAN, DIES IN EASTLAND

Mrs. Jennie Wolfe Strickland, widow of R. B. Strickland, who died some 20 years ago, was stricken by death from paralysis early this morning at the home of the son-in-law and daughter in Eastland, Judge and Mrs. O. C. Funderburk.

Mrs. Strickland had been complaining slightly since a day or two prior to her sudden illness of Saturday evening, when she was stricken with a hemorrhage and stroke of paralysis of the left side. She was reading a book when the attack came. Mrs. C. F. Smith of Eastland was summoned to assist and nurses were wired for from Fort Worth.

Her birthday on the 12th of March was celebrated in the family home and Mrs. Strickland was the merriest of the party. She was 75 years of age, or as the Japanese so beautifully express it, full of 75 honorable years. She never regained complete consciousness from the time of her stroke, and the end came peacefully.

Jennie Wolfe was born in Arkansas, and married R. B. Strickland about 50 years ago, spending the greater part of her married life in Texas, and the major portion in Palestine. Her husband was engaged as a farmer, stockman and trader, and was successful.

Of the marriage three children were born, ex-Senator Jeff J. Strickland of San Antonio, D. F. Strickland of Mission, Texas, and Mrs. O. C. Funderburk, wife of Judge Funderburk of this city. Several grandchildren also survive her, and also a brother and half-brother.

Funeral services were conducted in the home at 10 o'clock this morning by Rev. H. L. Munger of the Methodist church. The family took the body to Omen, Smith county, Texas, on the morning train, where interment will be held in the family burial grounds.

ANCIENT EGYPT RULED WHOLLY BY WOMEN, THE REVEALED RECORDS SHOW

BERLIN (By mail to United Press)—The Egyptian world of 5000 B. C. was ruled wholly by women.

Men remained at home, tended the babies, cooked the food and scrubbed the floors. If the wife wanted a divorce she had to pay her husband alimony.

Attorney Walter Bahn made these revelations to the Society for Sexual Reform in a lecture on "the marriage problem." Bahn presented the copy of a marriage contract of those days, wherein the wife stipulated, "If I should come to dispense you and to love another man I will settle upon you a sum of so and so much."

Isis, the female goddess, was regarded as the ruler of the world. Gradually the "right of the father" developed and woman was relegated to the cooking, baby tending and floor scrubbing. The ancient Babylonians, Jews, Greeks and Germans had a carefully developed code of divorce laws. The code Hammurabi, for instance, provided that a wife receive sufficient land to support herself in event of divorce. Germany's divorce law provides that every divorce case shall be preceded by a legal attempt in court to reconcile the parties concerned.

Divorce reformers want this system abolished, along with other restrictions which tend to make dissolution of marriage in Germany extremely difficult. Justice Minister Eminger, however, believes that the reconciliation system must remain.

The law provides that the first session of every divorce case shall be devoted to an attempt to get the parties together again. The negotiations are private and it often happens that the judge by application of a bit of sound horse sense reunites families headed for a breach over trivialities.

In 1924, he went to her father's home and asked him the Tartar equivalent: "I won't give my daughter to a man who lives in a village where there is not even an electric light."

Alli went out in advance of the parental will, but became an agitator, not against the government, but for electric lights.

The Kasan government is now working steadily toward the completion of the work of electrifying the Russian village. The number of villages with electric lights in the peasant's huts is rapidly increasing.

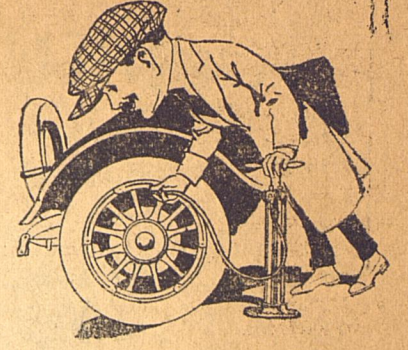

BIBLE INSTRUCTION TO BE BROADCAST BY RADIO

The International Bible Students' association (I. B. S. A.) with main office at 124 Columbia Heights, Brooklyn, N. Y., for some time has had in course of construction a radio broadcasting station. It is installing two sets of broadcasting equipment, the smaller radiating 500 watts and now licensed as Class A equipment to operate on 244-meter wave length, using the call letters WBBR. The larger set is expected to be ready for operation in the near future. It is believed from experiments that there will be less interference on this wave length than on a higher one. The chairman was also authorized to name a committee of six poultry-breeders to investigate the present production of poultry and poultry products and the marketing needs in the seven counties named. This committee will meet in Eastland Saturday and is to have its report ready for the larger meeting the Saturday following.

There were about 50 poultry producers in attendance from over Eastland and Stephens counties at the all-day meeting at the city hall. W. R. Bell, president of the Texas Farm Bureau Poultry Producers association, who was in attendance, led in the discussion of the actual operation of a poultry exchange.
