

The golden idol is being torn down. In its place is the idol of ac-complishment, which is just another name for service to humanity. Then the public recognizes as great sucthe public recognizes as great successes men who never create a fortune, men who counteract inferior ability, men who overcome hereditary handicaps, men who, by hard work and determination make a fair and honest living and educate their children

All these are successes -- great successes-in the eyes of Americans today.

Co-operative ownership of apartment houses has proved remarkably successful and the plan has come to stay. In two sections of New York more than \$100,000,000 has been thus invested. Co-operation is solving problems for railroads, public service corporations, department stores, retail stores, and even in church work-it will also solve the high rent problem.


