Federal officials assert that the Mann act is probably the most abused law on our statute books. During the past year more than 10,-000 complaints have been filed with the department of justice, but only a few convictions secured. And even this is said to represent only onetenth of the actual cases.

A majority of cases originate in the northwest and middle west in spite of the popular notion that the great cities abound in white slavers and seductive traps for country girls. Illegitimate emigrants who go to the farm belt for work, are usually victims of the "slavers" and the disappearance of thousands of girls are accounted for because of this traf-

Laws governing this matter, as in prohibition enforcement, are so full of loopholes and "jokers" that it is almost impossible to convict, and justify a growing opinion that they are deliberately constructed to movide for escapes and evasions. The people pay salaries sufficient to justify them in expecting good service at the hands of lawmakers, but, according to the opinion of federal and state courts, high school stadents could give at least equal serv ice in this particular.

FEEL EARTHQUAKE SHOCKS

DALLAS, July 8.—Dallas and the surrounding territory is not likely to ever be disturbed by earthquakes, according to Dr. Ellis W. Shuler, Southern Methodist University scientist, and a recognized authority on the subject.
