

Officers Arrest Alleged Assailant After Long Chase. He Gives Name of Joe Jackson and Claims Ranger His Home. Box of Red Pepper Found on Him, But No Weapon. Fair Thinks He Is Shot, But Surgeons Say Was Struck With Blunt Instrument.

H. Fair, proprietor of a jewelry store at 107 South Rusk street, was attacked in his store shortly before noon today and beaten over the head, the officers said, with a blunt instrument.

A' man giving his name as Joe Jackson, 25, was placed in jail 30 minutes after the attack as a suspect. Jackson was pursued through alleys, yards and fields by a crowd of citizens, who quickly gathered on Rusk street.

JACKSON HERE IN SEARCH FOR WORK

Charges of assault with intent to murder and intent to rob will be placed against Joe Jackson, alleged assailant of H. Fair, who is suffering with three scalp wounds, County Attorney W. J. Barnes said early this afternoon. Barnes, who came to Ranger, to take the prisoner to Eastland, said he would not take a statement from Jackson at present, being satisfied with the evidence gathered against him.

Jackson came in to Ranger Wednesday and his first action was to ask an oil driller, who asked that his name not be used, for a job. The driller suggested that

he go to Bradus, where he thought he could get work. Jackson went and returned yesterday. "He was a straight shooter as much as I knew of him," the driller said. "He was here through

most of the boom. There isn't a better tool dresser in the oil fields. It's a dam shame that a man like him would go wrong. He

is well built and fine looking.'

Fair sustained a scalp wound two inches above the left eye and a deep one on the back of his head. The head wound on the back bled profusely. He thought he had been shot, but the surgeon found no evilence of bullet wounds.

On the operating table in Dr. W. C. Palmer's office in the Ranger clinic, Fair told this story:

Fair Tells of Attack. "A man came in and said he would like to look at some suits of clothes. We went up on the balcony. I took some off the racks and he looked at them. He said 'let me see the serge.' reached for it. I felt something stinging as if I touched a wire.

"He grabbed hold of me. I tried to wiggle loose. I got weak. I heard shots. He grabbed me by the throat when I yelled.

"Do you see any marks on me?" he asked the doctor. Red marks showed up on the right side of his throat.

"He ran down stairs. I got out into the street and hollered for help. I saw him last going through an alley by the Liberty.

Fair said he never had seen the man before. He managed to always keep back of him, he said.

Tourists to Delve Into Mysteries of

The most fascinating spot in the Western hemisphere today—a land rich in long forgotten ruins or temples, pyramids, monuments, cities and roadways that may antedate the pyramids of Egypt—soon will be opened up to American tourists. It is the treasure land of the ancient Maya civilization of Central America, hidden for centuries on the sloping jungle lands between sea and mountains in the Yucatan peninsula and in Guatamala.

While Sylvanus H. Morley of the Carnegie Institute of Washington, D. C., now is leading an archeological expedition into this "Egypt of America" once inhabited by the "lost nation," the Guatemalan government is taking steps to make the land of mystery accessible to visitors. A national bureau of archeology, ethnology and philology has been established in connection with a national museum, and liberal provisions have been made for tourists and scientific expeditions.

Children of the South Organized for Battle to End Campaign Against Pests.

From South Carolina has come a new plan for fighting the bandits from Mexico that have wrought such destruction as has cost this country millions of dollars in the loss of property. Starting in the southern part of Texas 38 years ago, these bandits have steadily and stealthily spread and marched forward, ravaging and plundering as they went, until they have covered all the southern and southwestern portion of the United States.

These bandits had been hunted and fought in various and sundry ways, to very little avail, until now it is planned to enlist the millions of school children throughout the South in the fight on the "billion dollar bandits"-the boll weevils.

Nature endowed the red bird with the ability and instinct to strike back whenever attacked and fight to the bitter end; he knows no surrender as long as there is life and strength with which to battle. The plan is to organize the school children of the cotton belt into local "Red Bird" clubs to fight the boll weevil.

All the schools close about the time, or shortly after the weevils begin to come out of winter hibernation, and the plan of the National Chapter of the Red Bird club, located in Sumter, S. C., is to organize the children thus liberated into clubs to go into the cotton fields to catch and destroy these first weevils before they have had time to deposit their larvae or eggs. If all, or even a majority of these first weevils can be so destroyed, the planters will be assured a crop.


