MORE THAN FIVE WOULD DOOM THE HAND

IAN TELLS RY HOW HER HUSBAND DIED

Mrs. Childers' Testimony at the Trial of William Meador Difficult to Shake.

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SWEETWATER, March 26.—Cross-examination of Mrs. Thurl Childers, formerly Mrs. Asa Rawls, by attorneys for William Meador, charged with the murder of Asa Rawls on the Meadors' ranch in Andrews county in May, 1922, failed today to shake her story of the attack on and killing of Rawls. She was grilled for hours by Meador's counsel, but repeated that the youth and his father had beaten and abused both of them cruelly and then had shot Rawls while he was hog-tied in an automobile. She was struck in the face by the two men and her husband shot to death after he had been knocked unconscious, she testified.

M. A. Thornberry, another witness for the state, took the stand this afternoon and told of arriving at the scene of the murder soon after the shot that killed Rawls had been fired. He confirmed much of the story told by Mrs. Childers.

The trial of Meador was brought here on a change of venue from Tom Green county after the court of criminal appeals had reversed a conviction in the district court at San Angelo and sentenced Meador to 19 years' imprisonment.

Lynch Davidson To Speak In Eastland Tomorrow Night

DALLAS, March 26.—Lynch Davidson, candidate for governor of Texas on a business platform, is scheduled to make an address in Eastland tomorrow night at 8 o'clock. He is making a 2,000-mile tour of West Texas in a Ford sedan and said when he started that he expected to enjoy every minute of it.

"You'd be surprised," said the candidate, "so far as my oratory is concerned, it is an actual fact that I am getting better and better every day."

Davidson said he expected to make at least a half-dozen speeches before returning to Dallas and further perfect himself day by day in the gift of oratory. As a business man he claims already to have demonstrated, both for himself and the state that he knows how to apply the rules to obtain the best results.

HOUSE BONUS BILL MUST BE CHANGED SAYS SENATE COMMITTEE

WASHINGTON, March 26.—Consideration of the senate resolution asking the impeachment of C. C. Chase, son-in-law of Albert B. Fall and collector of Customs at El Paso, was postponed today by the house judiciary committee. The official copy of the resolution and attached testimony, which was referred to the committee late yesterday, did not reach it in time for consideration today. Chairman Graham said the question probably would be taken up at tomorrow's regular session of the committee.

DOG'S NUMBERS TO BE PAINTED ON SIDE

CISCO, March 26.—The numbers assigned each dog in the big wolf hunt to be held here April 1 to 6 will be painted on the side of the animal so the judges can know the dogs they see during the chase.

Points will be given each dog seen doing the right thing and those observed loafing on the job will be scratched, according to R. D. Grim, making official announcements.

The western dogs will have an advantage over the dogs from other sections of the country, because the imported hunters will not be accustomed to the climate and the altitude. The Oil Belt Hunters association is providing all brands of dog biscuits for the packs, so the menu will not become monotonous.

NEW STYLE STREET CARS NOW OPERATING IN DALLAS

DALLAS, March 26.—The first of 32 new street cars ordered for this city are in service. Of the most modern type, the cars are expected to speed up the service because of their improved methods of handling passengers.

These cars are the only ones in Texas with middle exits. Passengers board at the front and leave by a large pair of doors at the center of the car. During rush hours, special means are provided to handle the crowds.

Huerta Goes Away In Ship To Sea and Drops Out Of Sight

NEW ORLEANS, March 26.—Considerable mystery today surrounded the whereabouts of Adolfo de la Huerta, defeated revolutionary leader who fled from Mexico on a steamship last week. With his aides, Huerta was reported bound for some gulf port, but so far he has failed to appear.

Rumors are in circulation that the vessel on which he left Mexico has been lost in a hurricane, but no confirmation of this report has been received here. His wife is in New Orleans, has been here five weeks and it was believed he would eventually come here.

The Mexican consul general in New Orleans said he had received no word from Huerta since the defeated revolutionist had fled from Mexico.

RUSHING FAST YET TRYING TO PUSH FASTER

Leveille-Maher Passes Third Quota and Reaches Out for Fourth.

Leveille-Maher Motor company's "go-getters" passed the third announced quota of 150 sold Ford autos at 9:30 p. m. Tuesday, and are now seeking to pass or reach its fourth quota of 175 cars sold in the month of March.

With three quota records smashed, and the record for monthly sales broken in the history of the Ranger agency, the seven salesmen are now working to see a fifth quota set before March 31, the last day of the nation-wide sales campaign.

W. J. MacFarland, or "Mac," as his friends call him, sold the highest number of cars Tuesday, completing eight sales.

T. J. Anderson continues undisputed as the leading salesman, but, because of MacFarland's big spurt Tuesday, which put him in second place, found his margin of leadership smaller. Dee Sanders is a close third.

Horace Oldham started his first day as a Ford salesman by completing one sale.

Gullahorn Planning Most Attractive Of Auto Display Rooms

One of the most attractive automobile sales and service agency buildings in West Texas will be the Gullahorn Motor company's quarters in the Halbert building on Main street when completed.

The display room will be 50x45 feet and will be entirely exposed to Main street on the south side. This room when desired will be flooded with white light. A large vertical electric sign will be hung in front of the building.

The salesmen's desks will be in the front room surrounded by a railing. The repair stock and service department will occupy the floor space in the rear of the display room. There will be a Main street driveway on the west side of the building. Also a door on the north side.

The Gullahorn Motor company is the Ranger agency for the Hudson and Essex motor cars. The company expects to occupy its new home the middle of June.

Buchanan Chosen President Of the Ranger Rotarians

Free-for-All Fight Fight Enlivens the Dallas City Court

DALLAS, March 26.—A free-for-all fight took place in the city court this morning, when Houston Nickols identified Leon Hale as a member of a band of 10 men who attempted to kidnap and flog him last night. Nickols and Hale, supported by witnesses, had appeared in court in connection with other legal matters. When they clashed Nickols knocked Hale to the floor and then friends took up the battle until finally the police rushed in and joined the fray. It was an exciting session while it lasted.

Nickols owns a fleet of taxicabs and said that 10 men had attacked him last night in an attempt to kidnap him. But his taxi drivers rushed to his aid and drove the attacking party off, he said.

"They declared they were going to take me to the woods and whip me," Nickols told the police. Hale was held for investigation.

PARENT-TEACHER ASSN. OF TIFFIN CONDEMNS POLITICS IN SCHOOLS

TIFFIN, March 26.—The Tiffin Parent-Teacher association met in the auditorium of the Tiffin school last Thursday. This was a regular meeting, and was not called by any person or persons.

This meeting was called to order by the president, Mrs. Jarvis. Mrs. Jameson led in prayer, after which the members sang religious songs. The minutes of the previous meeting were read by the secretary.

A motion was then presented to the association as follows:

"Be it resolved by the Tiffin Parent-Teacher association in regular meeting assembled that we, as a body heartily condemn the bringing of political wrangles, religious differences or fraternal affiliations into our school or Parent-Teacher association.

"Be it further resolved, that we condemn and will not tolerate any boycott or discrimination being shown to any merchant, or merchants because of their political, religious or fraternal affiliations, real or fancied.

"Be it also resolved, that the officers of this (Tiffin Parent-Teacher) association be directed to comply with the above resolution or kindly tender their resignations to the association."

This resolution was passed as read without a dissenting vote.

TRAM AND BUS STRIKE IN LONDON EXTENDING

LONDON, March 26.—Unless the tram and bus strike is settled Friday midnight, subway workers will also walk out, leaving the city without transportation except taxis and a few hired busses.

The committee on underground systems ordered the men to quit work Friday night. All conferences so far have been fruitless. The government has introduced a traffic bill in the house of commons which it hopes will lead to a settlement.

CHARGES BIGAMY COMMITTED BY COMMON LAW WIFE

KANSAS CITY, March 26.—Paul Hardman, local attorney, has asked New York authorities to file bigamy charges against Miss Cleo Little, now Mrs. George V. Shaw, on a basis of an alleged common law marriage. Hardman claims Mrs. Shaw, while in Kansas City, lived with him as his wife, in accordance with a common law agreement they both signed.

BANDIT BOLD I WAS, BUT NOT--- SAYS JENNINGS

Former Oklahoma Outlaw in Washington to Testify in Oil Scandal Probe.

WASHINGTON, March 26.—The Sinclair contempt case will be placed before the federal grand jury here tomorrow with request for an indictment, United States District Attorney Peyton Gordon said today. Prompt action is expected from the jury by Gordon, as the jury dissolves March 31.

Al Jennings, former train robber, arrived today to tell the senate oil committee that he had known about the reported "deals" at the 1920 Republican national convention. Jennings conferred this morning with Senator Walsh, Montana, who will question him tomorrow. He declined to be interviewed, but hinted that his testimony would be enlightening.

Jennings, asked about his train robbing exploits, made no effort to deny that he had been an outlaw at one time. He said frankly:

"Yes, I was a bandit, but I never was secretary of the interior."

HEAT OF ARGUMENT PROVIDES SMOKE SCREEN FOR "FADE-AWAY" FOLKS

While Deputy Constable John Boyd was trying to convince a member of an alleged poker game in a grocery store south of Ranger on the Bankhead highway last night that he was violating the law, five or six others said to have been engaged in the game quietly stole away.

His protests were of no avail except that his argument saved his acquaintances from going to justice court and possibly paying a fine of \$21.95 such as he and another alleged player said in Justice J. N. McPatter's court this morning.

SAYS GIRL 'VAMPED' HIM WHILE PAL MADE AWAY WITH VALUABLE JEWELS

WAXAHACHIE, March 26.—Aline Faulk and Julia Gunbar, Dallas girls, were indicted by the Ellis county grand jury today, charged with theft of \$1,800 worth of jewelry at Ennis, near here. The girls were arrested Tuesday on the complaint of S. W. VanPelp, jeweler at Ennis.

VanPelp said one of the girls made away with the gems while the other "vamped" him. The jewelry which VanPelp identified was found in the girls' possession. They are held in jail in default of \$1,000 bond.

HOUSE COMMITTEE DELAYED IN ACTION ON CHASE IMPEACHMENT

WASHINGTON, March 26.—A complete change must be made in the house bonus bill, members of the senate finance committee agreed today. An estimate as to what the house bill would cost the government, varying a billion dollars from two other experts, was presented by Herbert Heiss, American Legion representative, causing committee members to declare the bonus bill cannot go to the senate in present form.

OIL WELL CATCHES FIRE LULING, TEXAS, MARCH 26.

A gusher on the C. C. Cannans oil lease near here caught fire when a workman struck a match near the derrick. The flames were subdued after four hours fighting. Several workmen were slightly burned.

WOMAN IS ARRESTED ON CHARGE OF BIGAMY

SHERMAN, Texas, March 26.—Ethel Monroe Medias is held by county officials here charged with bigamy. Alfred Monroe, of Leonard, who filed the complaint, said the woman married Joe Medias, a musician, last Tuesday. "She married me in 1919 and we were never divorced," he added.

MORAN.—Use of electric motors for drilling the oil well of Wade Hogan on the Broadfoot lease is proving satisfactory and much of the development in this field will be done by electric power from the West Texas Utilities company.

Daughter of Champ Clark Fails To Get Seat In Congress

NEW ORLEANS, March 26.—Mrs. James N. Thompson, daughter of the late Champ Clark, lost in her first attempt to obtain a seat in congress, returns today from the second district primary showed.

J. Zach Spearing has won the nomination with 1,369 votes more than both his opponents—Mrs. Thompson and T. Zenias Walmisley. The count is reported virtually completed.

Hiram Johnson Is Leading Coolidge In South Dakota

SIoux FALLS, S. D., March 26.—Senator Hiram Johnson of California will defeat President Coolidge in the state primaries by between 3,000 and 4,000 votes, it was indicated today as Johnson took the lead in the late count.

The rural vote is increasing Johnson's small lead. Virtually all returns from the cities and thickly populated regions are in. Johnson's headquarters hold that he will win by more than 3,000. The Coolidge supporters maintain the president will win.

The democratic delegation to New York will be instructed to stand by Wm. G. McAdoo.

Gov. W. H. Masters appeared assured of nomination for United States senator on the republican ticket, having a lead of 2,500 over Senator Thomas Stirling with the country vote increasing his margin.

ED LOCKHART, NOTORIOUS BANDIT IN OKLAHOMA, IS SHOT AND KILLED

TULSA, March 26.—Ed Lockhart, notorious bandit, was shot and killed today by Martin Grady, deputy sheriff of Muskogee, after Sheriff Bob Sandford and six deputies surrounded the bandit at the Bert Walker farm, near here.

Lockhart was killed with the gun he had taken away from Grady and was in his pocket after he had captured Grady, another deputy and forced them to walk to a timber hill.

When the three reached the hill, Lockhart fired at Sanford and the three other deputies with him and missed. At that moment, Grady, who was being used as a shield, turned and grabbed the revolver in Lockhart's pocket and shot him without taking it from his pocket.

Lockhart was a pal of the notorious Al Spencer, who was one of Oklahoma's worst desperadoes. Spencer was killed by United States Marshal Alva McDonald near Bartlesville, Okla., last year.

LAND DEALS MUST BE PROBED TO BOTTOM, DECLARES HEFLIN

WASHINGTON, March 26.—Smooth sailing henceforth in the investigation of alleged land frauds in Texas by the senate postoffice committee appeared probable today as Chairman Moses and Senator Hefflin reached an agreement on the introduction of evidence. The committee broke up in a row over the question yesterday.

As a result of the truce, Senator Hefflin said today he would not take the probe to the senate for a while yet, as he said he would do yesterday.

"Moses and I have reached an agreement on the evidence I desire to present and I believe we can get along amicably, but if any more flare-ups occur, I shall ask the senate for a new committee," said Hefflin. "We are going to the bottom of those land deals and nothing shall stop us."

TEXAS RANGER TO ATTEND OLYMPIC COWBOY SPORTS

AUSTIN, March 26.—Capt. Tom Hickman, Texas ranger, will be one of three judges of the Olympic cowboy sports at the British Empire exposition in London in June. Hickman has applied to Governor Neff and the adjutant general for a leave of absence to attend the British rodeo.

FRANCE MUST TRY NEW HAND AT THE WHEEL

President Millerand Accepts Poincaré's Resignation and Shuffles for New Deal.

PARIS, March 26.—Premier Poincaré today presented his resignation and the resignation of his cabinet to President Millerand. The resignations were accepted.

The defeat and retirement of Raymond Poincaré, former president, and several times premier of France, came on a comparatively minor issue today after the premier had survived a storm of criticisms for his policy towards Germany and the fiscal program.

The government pension bill was presented by Count DeLafayette, who made it a question of confidence in the government and by a narrow margin of seven votes the chamber of deputies defeated the measure.

Poincaré immediately met with his ministers and, after a discussion of reforming the cabinet, he went to the residence of the president and presented his resignation.

POINCARÉ MAY AGREE TO FORM A NEW CABINET

PARIS, March 26.—After resigning with his cabinet, Premier Poincaré expressed a desire to form a new ministry, and so informed President Millerand, who had accepted his resignation with regret. The premier said he would give a definite answer tomorrow after consulting with his friends.

ROTARIANS PROMISED FINE ENTERTAINMENT AT WICHITA FALLS

WICHITA FALLS, March 26.—Wichita Falls Rotary is preparing to entertain the biggest district conference Texas has yet had, and Wichita Falls hopes it will be most enjoyable.

The conference will be held in this city April 3 and 4, but all Rotarians are urged to arrive at noon Wednesday, April 2 as the annual Rotary golf tournament and an automobile trip to Lake Kemp, the main resort of the irrigation system will start promptly at 1 o'clock on this day. These are features which local Rotarians want every visitor to enjoy and to that end arrangements have been made for a special train to come up from Fort Worth Wednesday morning, arriving in this city at noon.

The regular train from Fort Worth does not get here until 2 o'clock, and it has no diner, which is another item not to be overlooked.

The Wichita irrigation project is decidedly worth seeing as it includes the largest artificial body of water in the state and the seventh largest in America. The big Archer county oil fields now in a state of active development, will be traversed en route to Lake Kemp.

The golf tournament will be played on the splendid golf course at the Wichita Falls Golf and Country club, which ranks with the best in the country. A handsome new clubhouse has been completed and will be the scene of several of the social features of the occasion.

Members of the executive committee here are busy with plans for the entertainment, comfort and pleasure of the Texas Rotarians who are expected, including plans for the entertainment of the Rotary-Anns, a large number of whom it is hoped will be present.

GENERAL E. W. KIRKPATRICK, CONFEDERATE VETERAN, DIES

M'KINNEY, Texas, March 26.—Gen. E. W. Kirkpatrick, commander of the Trans-Mississippi division of the Confederate veterans, died suddenly of pneumonia in Rincon, N. M., late Monday. He was president of the Texas industrial congress and prominent in public affairs throughout the state.

HOUSE COMMITTEE WILL TRY TO PICK SUSPECTED TWO

WASHINGTON, March 26.—Graft and bribery accusation against "two congressmen," will be investigated on April 2 by a special house committee, it has been announced by Chairman Blaine. The charges were made recently by a Chicago grand jury, which indicted Col. Charles R. Forbes, former director of the veterans' bureau.

DAUGHERTY AND SMITH LEFT ON COLD OUTSIDE

Were "Sore" About Exclusion From \$33,000,000 Deal, Testifies Mrs. Stinson.

WASHINGTON, March 26.—Five friends of Attorney General Daugherty and Jesse Smith cleaned up \$33 million dollars in a Sinclair oil deal, Mrs. Roxie Stinson today told the senate committee, conducting the Daugherty probe, that Smith had told her.

Daugherty and Smith were not in the deal and they were sore about it, so Smith said, testified Mrs. Stinson. After openly accusing Daugherty of "moral responsibility" for the death of Jesse Smith in Daugherty's apartments last May, although she said she believed Smith was a suicide, Mrs. Stinson launched into a story of a \$33,000,000 deal of which Smith had talked freely with her.

She asked Jesse Smith one day, she said, if he had profited in any oil deal, after Smith had told her that five men he knew had made \$33,000,000 in an oil deal within a few days. "I asked him if he and Harry were in on it?" she said.

"No, we were not and that is what we are sore about, for they were friends of ours, too," was Smith's reply, she said.

"What kind of a deal was it?" asked Senator Brookhart, chairman of the committee.

"A Sinclair oil deal," Mrs. Stinson replied.

After asking if she knew whether Edward B. McLean, Washington publisher, was one of the five men and receiving a negative reply, the committee turned aside from the matter.

DAUGHERTY CHARGED WITH MORAL RESPONSIBILITY

WASHINGTON, March 26.—Mrs. Roxie Stinson charged Attorney General Daugherty with "moral responsibility" for the death of her divorced husband, Jesse Smith, in her testimony today before the senate committee investigating the department of justice.

"I have no doubt in my mind but that Jesse Smith committed suicide," Mrs. Stinson declared, "but I do feel that Harry Daugherty was morally responsible for this death."

Greek Plebiscite To Say If Dynasty Shall Be Abolished

BUCHAREST, March 26.—King George of Greece announced today he will refuse to abdicate the Greek throne until a national plebiscite confirms the action of the assembly at Athens in determining the dynasty and declaring a republic.

RANGER HIGH SCHOOL DEBATERS TO ENGAGE TEAM FROM STRAWN

Ranger High school debaters will get their last tryout and practice session Thursday noon at the Methodist church auditorium to determine who will enter the Eastland county interscholastic meet in Eastland, Friday. Strawn's debating team will come up and defend the negative side of the question, "Resolved that the United States Should Join the League of Nations." It will begin at 12:30 p. m.

The affirmative side will be debated by Ranger's team. In a debate held here last week, the local team took the negative side and won. The high school students will go to the auditorium and hear the debate.

CHURCH ATTENDANCE OVER COUNTRY ON INCREASE

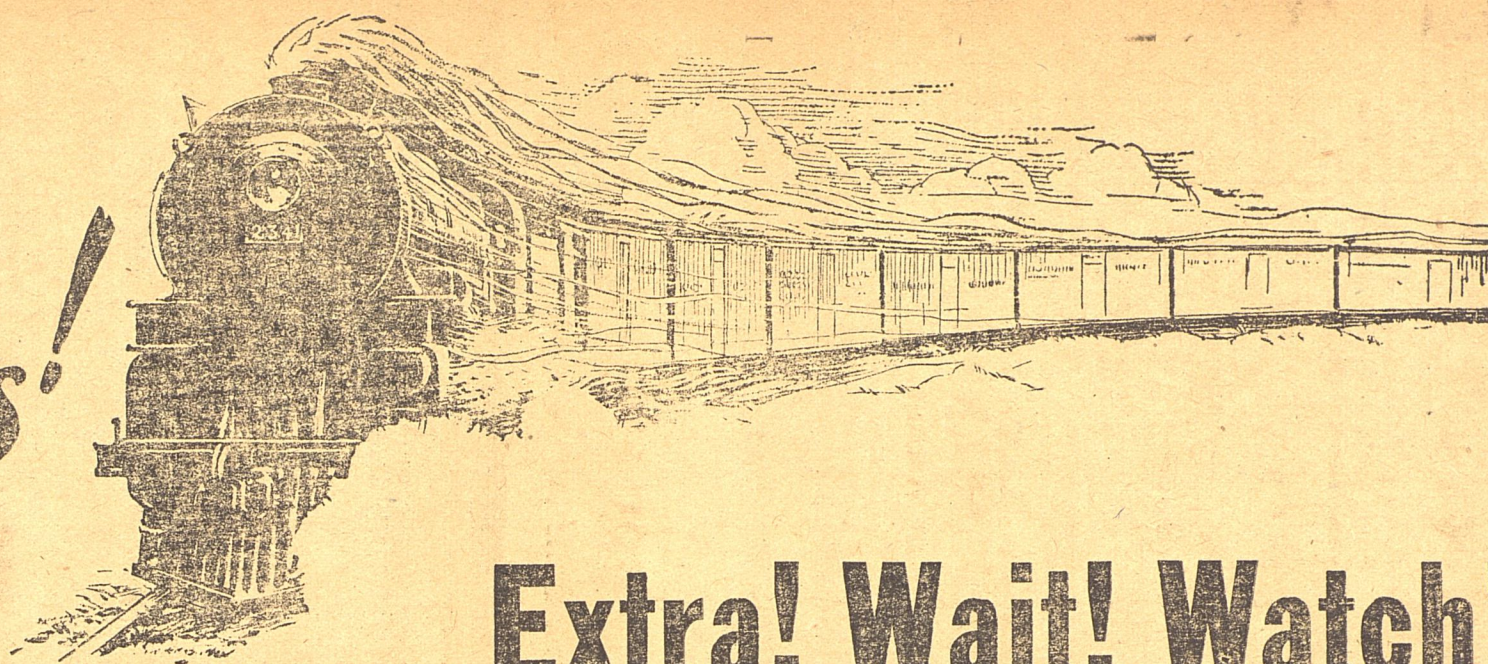

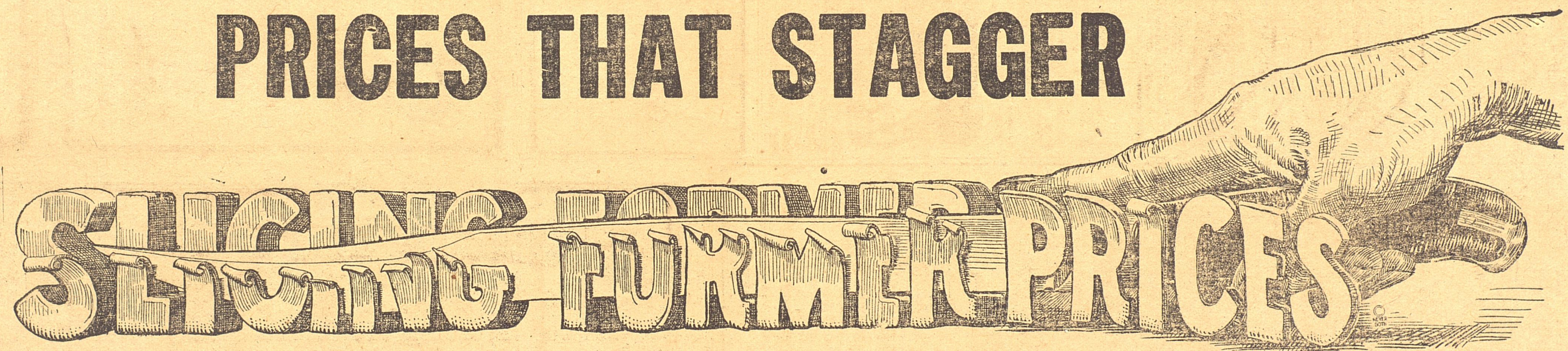

THE PHILIPPINE "ENTANGLEMENT."

Mr. Manuel Roxas, head of the Filipino senate, arrived in Washington recently to petition for the immediate independence of the Philippine islands. In 1898 the United States paid Spain 20 millions of dollars for the islands and official pronouncement was made that occupation should continue only so long as might prove necessary to educate the natives to a degree that would warrant the grant of independence. Ex-President Taft, ex-President Wilson and two ex-governors of the islands assert that the nations are competent, but General Wood and Mr. Forbes reported that in their opinion they were not quite up to American standards in one or two particulars. Since General Wood's appointment, but little has been accomplished to promote either a better feeling or better conditions. The demand for independence made at this moment when the United States is seriously considering "internationalism" because of the Bok prize award and World court discussion, rather complicates matters, and it is generally believed that America must clean up in this matter before it can consistently participate in similar European propositions.

REAL WHISKY NOT WANTED.

A million dollar cargo of medicinal and chemically pure whisky, bought in Scotland three years ago, has been returned to Scotland because its owners were unable to dispose of it lawfully under a wholesale liquor permit to sell to druggists and hospitals.

It is said the owners have refused many offers from illegal sources but that druggists and hospitals found it more profitable to buy from bootleggers who could undersell the legitimate dealers. Many hospitals have been the recipients of contraband liquor turned over to them by tender-hearted magistrates, though it has transpired in many cases that liquors thus donated are unfit for hospital purposes, and in many instances are now refused. The turning back of a million dollars' worth of standard-proof liquor serves to reveal the avarice and greed of those who are not only willing to violate the law in order to gain an additional profit but to deceive those who place confidence in their business and professional integrity.

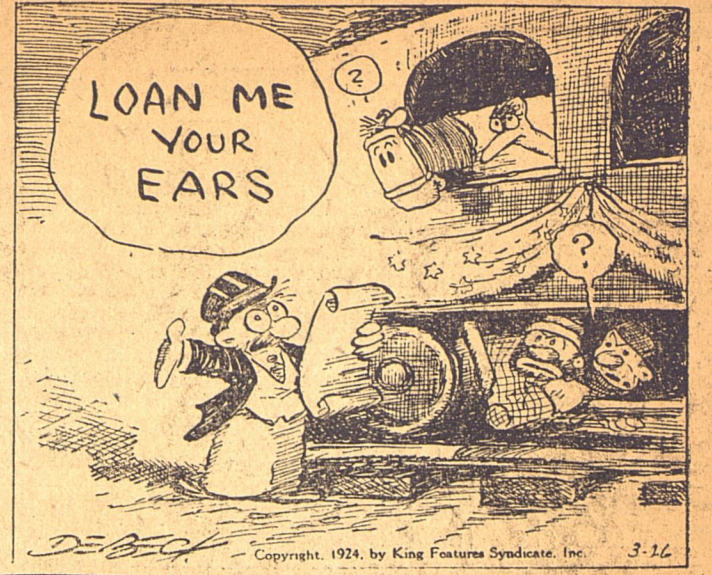

TEXAS HENS BEHIND THOSE OF OTHER STATES IN EGG PRODUCTION

Texas hens are behind those of other states in production of eggs, J. S. Jones, poultry expert of the Purina mills, declared in a talk before dealers and salesmen, numbering 150, at the Texas hotel, Fort Worth, Tuesday. He pointed out that Texas hens lay on an average of 40 eggs a year, while the average for the country is 72 eggs.

"There is no reason," Jones said, "why Texas shouldn't get up to a point where each hen might lay an average of 150 eggs per year. There are very few hens to lay 345 eggs in the 365 days of the year. But such instances have been known and many farms have produced hens laying more than 300 eggs each year."

Edward T. Hall, secretary and advertising director of the Purina mills, said advertising in no way causes an increase in the price of a commodity to the consumer—that in reality the selling price is really lowered by the increase in sales.
