

## SENATE ASKS PRESIDENT FOR THE BOOKS

### LYNCH DAVIDSON CHANGES PLANS FOR AUTO TOUR

#### Visits Eastland, but Postpones Speaking Engagement, Being Called to Houston.

Lynch Davidson, former state legislator, state senator and lieutenant governor and at present candidate for governor, in a conference with friends and supporters in Eastland this morning, discussed with them the aim of his candidacy, based on the general proposition as he put it of "more business in government and less government in business."

Mr. Davidson was scheduled to talk in Eastland tonight at 8 o'clock, but found it necessary to change his arrangements in order to keep other engagements. He stated, however, that he would come to Eastland at some future date. While here he seized the opportunity to meet many voters, and held a conference with his supporters.

#### Discusses Issues.

"Extraneous issues in Texas are constantly blinding us to the real problems of state government," Mr. Davidson explained. "I say the real problems of state government—it should be stated the problems of state management—for after all the question of proper finance in Texas and the correction of the deficiencies under which this state is operating are merely a matter of management. I know whereof I speak, because not only have I had 35 years of successful business experience, but I have had opportunity to study the governmental business during my terms of state legislator, state senator, and lieutenant governor."

Once Texas gets itself of clique and bloc factionalism in its political progress, Mr. Davidson declared, then "we can get down to the real business of solving this penitentiary problem and correcting the enormous wastage of our tax rates and the saving of not less than ten million dollars biennially."

After going carefully through the gamut of the state's situation from a departmental standpoint, Mr. Davidson concluded by stating:

#### Rules of Business

"I want to apply business principles to Texas as I applied business principles successfully to our state railroad. I want to go into the governor's office as a business man, and I am going in with the determination not to be the candidate of any bloc, clique or faction. Suffrage is a heritage unsurpassed and when it is exercised independently its combined strength will co-ordinate Texans, terminate factional strife and secure the harmony of purpose this state demands."

Mr. Davidson, accompanied by several newspaper men, arrived in Eastland this morning at 10 o'clock from Breckenridge, where he spoke yesterday and left just before noon for Cisco. He expected to go from Cisco to Baird, where he will catch the train for Dallas tonight en route to his home at Houston, where he is going to attend to some business matters.

### LEASE IS TAXABLE WHETHER OR NOT IT HAS OIL PRODUCTION

WICHITA FALLS, March 27.—The opinion that a lease is taxable whether or not it includes production rendered here Wednesday by Judge W. H. Atwell, is said to be the first decision of its kind in a federal court. Judgment was given in favor of Wichita county against the Gilliland Oil company.

### JENNINGS TELLS WHAT WAS TOLD HIM BY HAMON

#### Says Million Dollars Was Spent to Elect Harding in Return for Promise.

WASHINGTON, March 27.—Al Jennings, ex-handit and Oklahoma politician, testifying today before the senate oil investigating committee, told the committee that Jake Hamon put up one million dollars to elect Warren G. Harding president of the United States in exchange for the secretaryship of the interior. Jennings also charged that the late Boise Penrose, Republican senator from Pennsylvania, received \$250,000 in the same deal in which Hamon and a number of big oil men from Oklahoma were involved. He said he believed Harry F. Sinclair was one of the oil men interested in the deal. Jennings said he got his information from Hamon himself, Hamon having told him long before the convention that Harding was to be nominated and that he (Hamon) would be "the biggest man in the United States."

The deal was finally concluded in a hotel room in Chicago the night before Harding was nominated, Jennings said. He mentioned the name of Attorney General Daugherty as one of the men present at that time. Daugherty was pre-convention campaign manager for Harding.

### U. S. Death Rate Rises and Births Show a Decline

WASHINGTON, March 27.—The death rate in the United States is increasing and the birth rate is declining.

The annual death rate is 12.6 to each 1,000 of population in the first nine months of 1923, compared with 11.8 for the same period of 1922, according to statistics compiled by the census bureau. The annual birth rate was 22.8 compared with 23.1.

Montana had the lowest death rate, and Vermont the highest, 15.8. North Carolina had the highest birth rate, with 30.2 and Montana the lowest, 17.5.

### INDICTMENTS CHARGE ANTI-TRUST LAWS VIOLATED

### LANDSLIDE IN SOUTHERN ITALY CAUSES DEATHS

#### Nearly 100 Persons Reported Killed in Amalfi District on Gulf of Salerno.

By United Press. AMALFI, Italy, March 27.—At least 91 persons were killed, and the lives of many persons, including a number of Americans, imperiled when a series of landslides devastated several villages on the Gulf of Salerno yesterday, it was officially announced today.

While Amalfi itself suffered little damage, Vietta and Conca Marina, on the sunny coast, suffered severely. More than 50 persons were killed at the former place and scarcely a house was left undamaged.

The roads leading up to the mountain side were blocked with great boulders of rock and broken trees, nearly all the way to the Petruccio hotel, where many tourists, panic-stricken, but safe, were found. Refugees, many of them carrying bundles hastily snatched from their devastated homes, began to stray into Amalfi early today and told pitiful tales of death and destruction. Relief was hastened to the stricken area at once, with doctors and medical supplies. The bishop of Amalfi placed his seminary at the disposal of the rescue workers and many of the injured were taken there. Rescue work was being pushed vigorously today.

Many fishing boats were sunk when the landslide reached the sea. Premier Mussolini sent his under secretary, Seidi, from Rome today to ascertain just what aid was necessary.

NAPLES, Italy, March 27.—Seventy persons were killed in a landslide in the Amalfi district, on the Gulf of Salerno yesterday. A check-up of casualties showed three towns, Vietta, and Conca Marina were partly wiped out. Relief parties have been rushed to the scene of the disaster.

Two destroyers in the gulf played their searchlights on the devastated area during the night, aiding in the rescue work in which many of the sailors joined. The government is sending relief.

### SIGN BOARDS ALONG HIGHWAY SHOUT RANGER

Advertising Ranger as far east as Mineral Wells and west as far as Eastland by means of highway milestone signboards was announced today at the office of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce. Most of the signs already have been constructed.

The signs consist of an automobile rim with a cross piece on an upright about six feet tall, placed every mile on the Bankhead highway in the directions given above. They are painted white and have black lettering. The name of the firm erecting the sign is on the rim, Ranger is in the center and the mileage to Ranger is on the cross piece.

The signs are erected in a cement base and are durable. An Abilene advertising agency solicited the Ranger business firms for the signs. These Ranger business firms are bearing the cost: Gullahorn Motor company, Ranger Dry Cleaning company, Postoffice garage, Mission garage, Peoples State bank, Westgate & Barnes, Ranger Battery company, Heid Bros. Lamb theatre, McCleskey, Fern cafe, West Texas Electric company.

### Billions Of Insects Resembling A Flea Destroying Oats

DALLAS, March 27.—Experts from the United States department of agriculture left today for McKinney to investigate reports of a strange type of bug that is destroying the oats crop in Collin county.

The pest, according to reports, resembles a flea and spreads destruction by hopping from blade to blade. The insects are so numerous in some sections that they can be raked from the ground by the shovel full, it is claimed. The bug is a fast breeder, according to Collin County Farm Agent Saunders, who said immediate steps should be taken to prevent its spread.

### WHEELER WANTS SENATE, NOT THE GRAND JURY, TO ASSERT ITS DIGNITY

By United Press. WASHINGTON, March 27.—Indictment of Mal Daugherty, brother of the attorney general, for contempt because of failure to produce records before the Daugherty investigating committee, was fought in a motion today by Senator Wheeler, chief prosecutor.

Wheeler asked the committee to report to the senate that not Daugherty but C. F. Ballard, cashier of the Commercial bank, had failed to produce the records in a subpoena served.

Chairman Brookhart asked that the senate be requested to lay the matter before the federal district attorney and later before the grand jury and also to hail them before the bar of the senate and place them in custody.

### Flames Force Three Persons To Jump To Safety From Fourth Floor

HOUSTON, March 27.—Clinging to the window ledges of Dr. Penn Thornton's sanitarium on the fourth floor of an office building in the heart of the business district until flames from behind forced them to leap to safety, two women and a man were slightly injured when they jumped into a life net spread over the awning at the third floor.

Mrs. Lurine Bordeaux, a nurse, had her back slightly wrenched. Miss E. W. Franklin, a nurse, suffered a few minor bruises and Dr. W. R. Sneed, a dentist who had his office in the building, had his back wrenched. In addition to slight burns, they suffered also from smoke as they escaped from the building.

### ALL READY FOR COUNTY MEET TO OPEN TOMORROW

#### Interscholastic Contests, Both of Brain and Brawn, to Be Held in Eastland.

Everything is in readiness for the interscholastic track meet to be held here Friday and Saturday. Superintendent C. A. Peterson, who is director general of the meet, stated that all of the schools of the county had entered their contestants and that a large crowd was expected to attend during both days.

The county track meet has been growing in popularity with the students and other people of the county for a number of years and each succeeding event has surpassed the preceding one in point of interest and attendance and this one is expected to be better than any yet held.

### ORIENT RAILWAY BID IN FOR ITS NOTE HOLDERS

#### Price of \$3,000,000, Highest of Only Two Offers Made For the Line.

By United Press. WICHITA, Kan., March 27.—The Kansas City, Mexico and Orient railroad was sold for \$3,000,000 at public auction today to Clifford Histed, Kansas City attorney.

Histed is general attorney for the Orient and for M. T. Kemper, the receiver. He announced that a general plan of reorganization would be announced soon and all the noteholders would be invited to participate.

The only other bid besides Histed's was that of E. E. Mulany, a banker of Hill City, Kan. His bid was \$2,764,000.

### Senator McKellar Renews Demand For Mellon To Resign

By United Press. WASHINGTON, March 27.—Senator McKellar, democrat, Tennessee, today renewed his demand for the resignation of Secretary of Treasury Mellon.

McKellar cited the example of President Grant in support of his contention that Mellon is ineligible for office under a statute of 1789, which prohibits a man with commercial connections to hold a public position.

"If Mellon continues to hold office he is subject to a \$3,000 fine and summary dismissal," McKellar said.

### Red Hats Bestowed On New Cardinals With Due Ceremony

ROME, March 27.—Amid all the glorious splendor of the pageantry of the Roman Catholic church, Cardinals Hayes and Mundelein today received from Pope Pius XI the red hat that signifies elevation to the rank of princes of the church. St. Peter's, where the ceremony was performed, was jammed with a tremendous throng, including hundreds of Americans who were privileged to watch their countrymen, who studied together as poor boys on the lower east side of New York, receive the highest honors the pontiff has to bestow.

Cardinal Mundelein received his red hat at 10:42 a. m. and Cardinal Hayes received his at 10:45 a. m.

### Poincare Agrees To Remain Premier and Form New Cabinet

By United Press. PARIS, March 27.—Raymond Poincare today definitely accepted the invitation of President Millerand of France to form a new cabinet, announcement being made in an official communique.

Poincare was conferring today with a number of leaders who will be ministers for the government in the reconstruction program, and visited Millerand late this afternoon to inform the president he would remain the office of premier.

### FALL AT HIS RANCH PREPARING HIS DEFENSE

THREE RIVERS, N. M., March 27.—Albert E. Fall, pivotal figure in the oil scandals, is at his ranch here, preparing his defense in case criminal action is brought against him, according to friends. H. G. Clunn, Fall's private secretary when he was in President Harding's cabinet, is assisting Fall in preparation of his defense, it was said.

### ANTI-CHILD LABOR LAWS APPEAR ON THE WAY

WASHINGTON, March 27.—A constitutional amendment enabling congress to enact anti-child labor legislation has been favorably reported by the house judiciary committee. The supreme court has held that congress, under the constitution, does not have power to regulate child labor.

### UNITED MINE WORKERS APPROVE WAGE CONTRACT INDIANAPOLIS

The new wage contract for miners negotiated recently at Jacksonville, Fla., has been approved by the United Mine Workers. It provides for continuance of the present scale for a period of three years.

### Roxie May Know the Five In Pool, But Must Not Tell It

By United Press. WASHINGTON, Mar. 27.—The senate Daugherty committee today refused to let Roxie Stinson name the five men whom she said yesterday made \$33,000,000 in a Sinclair oil deal. Daugherty's counsel intimated that a "president of the United States was among them."

In a hot clash with Senator Wheeler he demanded the right to go into the matter. Wheeler was adamant, although at one stage he and Senator Chamberlain were near blows.

Daugherty's lawyers were not permitted to open the question, which the committee had decided not to go into because Daugherty was not involved.

### TRIAL IN CITY COURT AROUSES MUCH INTEREST

By United Press. DEFENDANT CHARGED WITH VAGRANCY, MAKES VIGOROUS FIGHT AGAINST CONVICTION.

Difficulties of doing cement construction under West Texas weather conditions was aired in city court of Ranger today in the case of a young man charged with vagrancy. He pleaded not guilty and employed an attorney to fight the case. A jury, however, found him guilty after 30 minutes' deliberation and fixed his fine at \$5. He will also have to bear the costs of \$10.70. It was said an appeal might be taken.

Several members of the defendant's family testified as to his industriousness, earning power, conduct and his willingness to support his mother and sister. What constitutes "vagrancy" was the issue at stake.

The contention of the arresting officers that they never saw him at work was met by the statements of defendant and his attorney, L. R. Pearson, that his work could not be carried on during rainy and freezing weather. Officers testified that he was arrested in a domino parlor on Main street. The defendant maintained that he was visiting his mother, who lives in Ranger, because the weather was interfering with his work in Breckenridge, where he was working for a firm of cement contractors.

Income tax returns, the number of working days in the last two years, wages of a cement worker, how many days the inclement weather has interfered with outdoor work during the last two years were some of the issues Sam K. Wasaff, special prosecutor for the city, and Attorney Pearson wrangled over before some 75 to 100 spectators. City Judge L. H. Fleweller frequently had to take a hand in the debate.

Because of the large number of arrests on charges of vagrancy the last several weeks, the case was followed with keen interest. The defendant was arrested on the night of March 20. His mother testified that her son is "industrious." His sister-in-law testified that he worked whenever the weather permitted. A brother said the defendant followed his occupation whenever there was work and the weather was clear. Questioned as to how many times he has been in Ranger, the defendant replied: "Three times in the last eight months." Attorney Pearson argued that this was not sufficient to arrest a man for vagrancy.

### "BIG BOSS" OF DAUGHERTY IS ASKED TO ACT

#### Hurt by Attorney General's Refusal, Senators Go Over His Head.

WASHINGTON, March 27.—President Coolidge was expected today to instruct Attorney General Daugherty to turn over to the senate committee investigating the department of justice such files as called for by it back to and including January, 1921. This action was unanimously voted by the senate today in executive session.

The flat refusal by Attorney General Daugherty to furnish the documents called for, claiming it would be inimical to the public interests, caused the committee to go over his head to the president.

### ARCHER COUNTY SETS NEW OIL OUTPUT RECORD

Archer county shows a gain of 2,515 barrels in crude oil daily average production for the week ending last Saturday, which is a new high record for this county. This gain and other ones wipe out the decrease of week before last.

This county has more production than any other county in West Texas, except Wichita county. Powell county shows a falling off of 2,000 barrels, although production this week shows a considerable decrease under last week's figures.

### TEXAS A. & M. COLLEGE RANKS WITH THE BEST

COLLEGE STATION, March 27.—With the largest investment in plant and equipment, the largest faculty and largest denominational groups among its student body, the A. & M. College of Texas occupies a high place among the state institutions for men in the southern states.

According to United States census reports contained in a recent publication, this college has the largest investment, with \$4,500,000; has an endowment of \$200,000,000, second only to that of Virginia Polytechnic Institute at Blacksburg, Va.; has the largest faculty, and enrollment second only to that of Georgia Institute of Technology at Atlanta, and on its campus are the largest groups of Methodists, Presbyterian, Lutheran and Roman Catholics of all the state colleges for men in the entire south.

### MANY MEN AT WORK GRUBBING NEW FARM LAND

STAMFORD, Texas, March 27.—Announcement is made by the employment department of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce that more than 3,000 grubbers are now at work in various parts of West Texas getting land ready to be placed in cultivation. More than half of these laborers have been furnished through the instrumentality of C. W. Woodman of the department of labor, U. S. employment service, Fort Worth.

DAUGHTER OF CUDAHY MARRIES SWEDISH OFFICER

HOLLYWOOD, March 27.—Edna Cudahy, daughter of the late Jack Cudahy, has been married to Lieutenant Lais Lithander, Swedish army officer. She was recently divorced from Percy Brown, a Pasadena bank clerk, to whom she was married in 1920.

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**BIBLE THOUGHT.**

**RIGHT THINKING AND WILL POWER.**

A London magistrate recently asserted that there is no such thing as a bad boy; he may do much wrong under the influence of "the gang" and to "show off," but no boy is "inherently vicious."

It is an open question if this argument does not result in more harm than good. Every boy has a natural or inherent sense of right and justice. But this does not mean that when he is given to being a bad actor, he is a good boy.

The great thing is to make boys and girls know that they can be good if they will; that there is nothing but will to be good needed; if this is "inherent" goodness, then they have it. But with this knowledge should go that conviction that capacity for goodness is latent; that what counts is motive and conduct; that everyone to others is in personality and influence conditioned on what he or she does. Remove all causes of evil outside the boy, and he will not be free from temptation to do badly at times; this is the condition that sharp definition of right and wrong, determined by something other than inherent goodness, is necessary to make boys good men. Nine out of ten boys live by example, and the most important example is in their own homes.

**PROFITABLE COTTON MILL.**

Notwithstanding the slump of last year in the cotton manufacturing industry, the Amoskeag company of Manchester, N. H., the largest cotton mill in the world, has had a remarkably profitable ten-year record. In 1919 the company earned over 121 per cent, and a stock dividend of 100 per cent was issued besides retiring over \$1,520,000 of preferred stock. Of course the value of present dividends should be doubled when estimating capital earning. The object of stock dividends is for the purpose of reducing the percentage of dividend declared and thus avoid income taxes for stockholders. This phase of the income tax law applies to corporations only.

**23,000,000 SCHOOL CHILDREN.**

The United States National Educational association convened in annual meeting in Chicago, Feb. 24 to 28. This simple statement of fact will probably suffice for millions of people who are content to "let George do it," and then conveniently forget the important matter of educating their children.

The day has come, however, when statesmen are honored in giving years to the promotion of constructive school legislation and business men spend small fortunes in special research for a more efficient public education. The average American might assume that he can "let the thing take care of itself," that after the usual perfunctory sessions mixed with a few social dinners, the members of the department will return more or less unchanged to their usual isolated routines. If so, the average American has been denied the news that the chief school officials of the country, the recognized leaders of educational thought, outline future programs of education of national and international import, obtain visions of progress and carry away enthusiasms for finer effort—affecting 23,000,000 persons who are soon to shape the course of the nation which is composed of these average Americans.

**THE COST OF WARS.**

The average American citizen has to depend on misleading figures given by prejudiced office holders as to the cost of government. Sometimes it would appear that officials do not approve of too much publicity on this subject, because it has a tendency to create dissatisfaction and unrest. But the high political duty of all American citizens in this new age is to learn the facts themselves, so that they do not have to depend on their representatives for information.

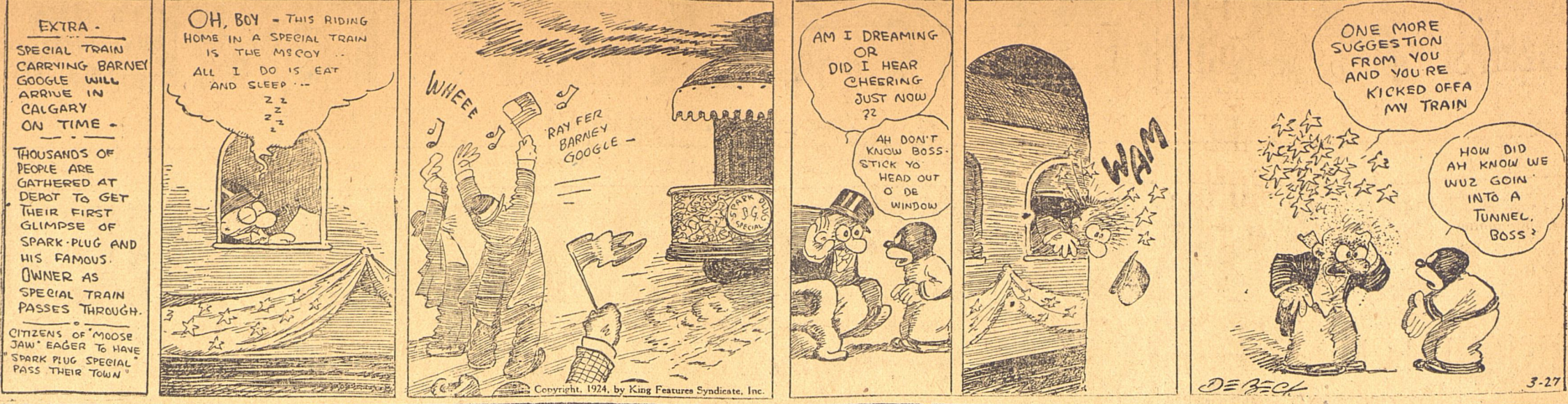
During the year 1922 the total disbursements of the federal government amounted to \$3,703,801,000. This was divided as follows: Peace items, \$496,719,000; war items, \$3,207,082,000. Roughly speaking, therefore war—past, present and future—absorbed more than five-sixths—or about 88 per cent—of the whole.

The "peace government" includes the following items: District of Columbia, \$24,800,000; expenses of legislation, \$14,289,000; expenses of judiciary department, \$18,364,000; administrative, \$439,266,000.

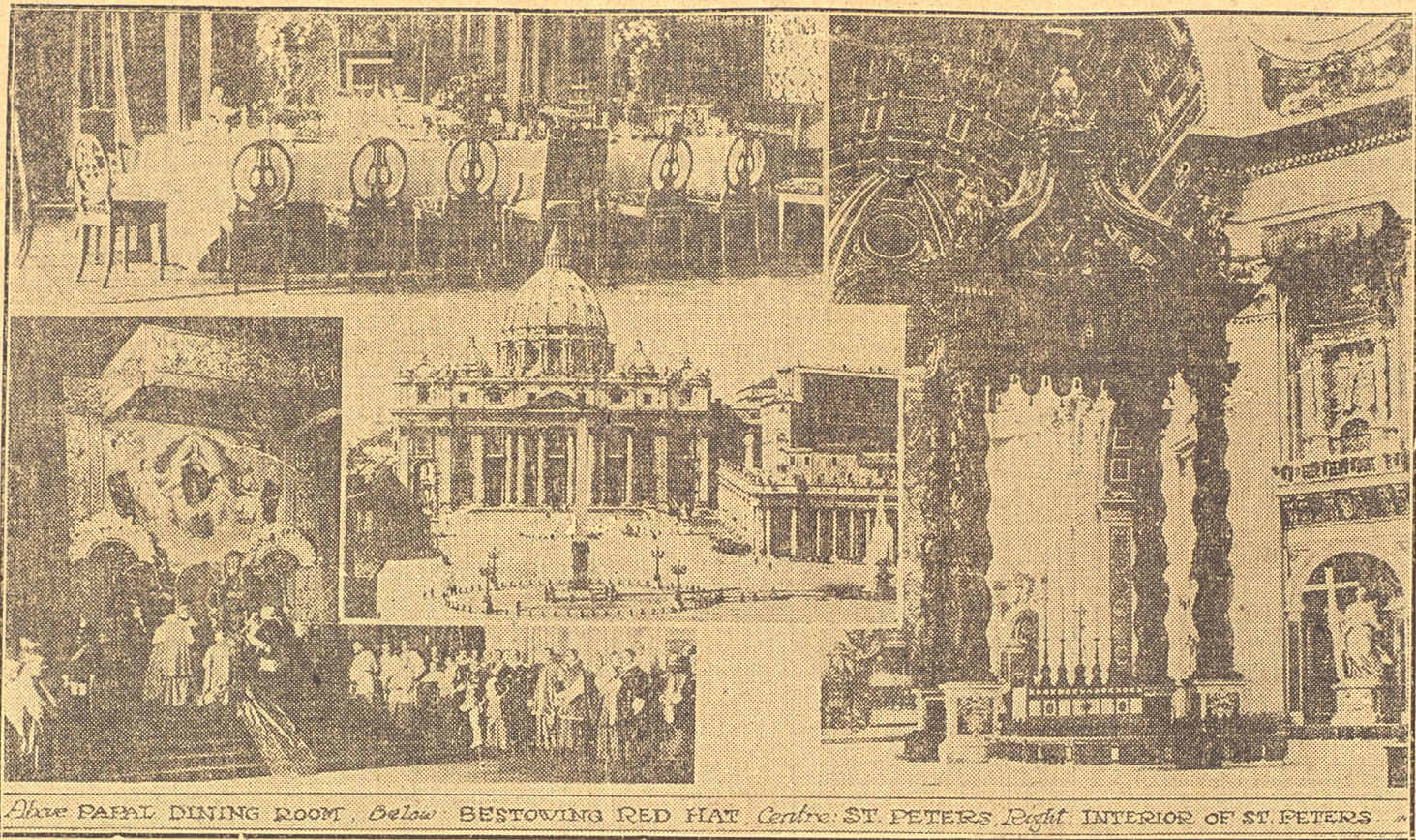
The war expenses include the following items: Interest on bonded debt, \$1,100,000,000; veterans bureau, \$464,194,000; spent by the navy department, \$350,191,000; spent by the army department, \$334,000,000; paid on bonded debt (principal) \$283,838,000; pensions, \$275,758,000; railroads (due to war), \$234,960,000; war finance corporation (a war board), \$125,000,000; shipping board (a war board), \$38,508,000.

The foregoing figures are sufficient evidence upon which any individual can base the conclusion that wars are costing the American people millions of dollars annually, and that not more than one dollar of every six of the taxes he pays his government comes back to him in actual benefit.

**UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE.**

The United States coal commission reported that the mines worked only about half time during the year, that two men were employed for every real job. Now the coal miners are moving for an unemployment insurance similar to that of Wisconsin and along the lines adopted by 35,000 clothing workers of Chicago.

The Chicago plan is a mutual arrangement between employer and employees. The employees pay one-half of 1 per cent of their wages into the fund and employers contribute an equal amount. If unemployed after a given time the workman will be paid 40 per cent of his full earning, but not more than \$20 per week. No benefits are payable because of strikes.

The principle that a man's trade or skill or profession is his capital and entitled to just as much consideration as a piece of inanimate machinery or mine mule, is beginning to be recognized. Idleness is the great fear of mechanics, and they have a great deal of it—more than is necessary if good business principles obtain.

**PEACE AND WAR.**

Notwithstanding the protestations for peace and outlawing of war, every government is bending every effort to invent deadlier devices, and Uncle Sam's among the leaders. For instance, our government has perfected a bomb weighing 4,000 pounds, to be carried by airplanes. This is 10 times as big as the largest bomb used in the World War. It contains a ton of high explosives and makes a crater in the ground 57 feet deep and 150 feet across.

Another American invention is an armored caterpillar tractor with a speed of 30 miles an hour. It goes up a 45-degree slope easily, and can travel through water up to the driver's chin.

The famous French "75" gun is eclipsed by a new American gun of the same caliber, but twice the range or shooting distance.

Shoulder machine guns are taking the place of regular rifles. They fire bullets four times as heavy and send them three times as far as the Browning gun.

Poison gases have been perfected since the armistice, many times more deadly than the worst gases used during the World War. It is asserted that with a very few airships, New York, Paris or London could be wiped off the face of the earth in a single night and coast fortifications annihilated in an hour.

The people of the world should give serious thought to the fact that while one faction of leaders works to prevent another big war, another faction is toiling night and day to perfect more deadly devices of warfare.

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During the year 1922 the total disbursements of the federal government amounted to \$3,703,801,000. This was divided as follows: Peace items, \$496,719,000; war items, \$3,207,082,000. Roughly speaking, therefore war—past, present and future—absorbed more than five-sixths—or about 88 per cent—of the whole.

The "peace government" includes the following items: District of Columbia, \$24,800,000; expenses of legislation, \$14,289,000; expenses of judiciary department, \$18,364,000; administrative, \$439,266,000.

The war expenses include the following items: Interest on bonded debt, \$1,100,000,000; veterans bureau, \$464,194,000; spent by the navy department, \$350,191,000; spent by the army department, \$334,000,000; paid on bonded debt (principal) \$283,838,000; pensions, \$275,758,000; railroads (due to war), \$234,960,000; war finance corporation (a war board), \$125,000,000; shipping board (a war board), \$38,508,000.

The foregoing figures are sufficient evidence upon which any individual can base the conclusion that wars are costing the American people millions of dollars annually, and that not more than one dollar of every six of the taxes he pays his government comes back to him in actual benefit.

**R. M. TODD CONDUCTS OWN DEFENSE; CASE WITH JURY.**

The jury in the case of R. M. Todd, charged with selling whisky, was still out at 1 o'clock this afternoon, having had the case since 9 o'clock last night.

Todd is being tried on charges growing out of his alleged activities in connection with the selling of liquor at Pioneer during the boom days in that oil field town. The case was set for Monday, but owing to the illness of his attorney, the case was continued by Judge Hill of the Eighty-eighth district court, until Wednesday, at which time the trial was begun. In the absence of his attorney, who was said to be too ill to conduct the case, Todd acted as his own lawyer and conducted the case throughout.

**SENATE REJECTS NOMINATION.**

WASHINGTON, March 27.—The senate oil committee has rejected the nomination of Samuel Knight, San Francisco, to be special government counsel to prosecute claims for sections 16 and 36 in naval oil reserve No. 1.

# JACK KEARNS SHOWS ANTI-PATHY TO PROPOSED DEMPSEY-GIBBONS FIGHT

NEW YORK, March 25.—Unsettled conditions in New York, which several times threatened the life of the boxing game, have made it impractical for Tex Rickard to say too much about his plans for the coming season.

Rickard has practically decided upon his program. He has the matches and the dates in mind and all he has to do is to remain silent until the time comes to talk.

The first big bout of the outdoor season will bring Jack Dempsey and Tommy Gibbons together again in a return bout. Kearns has been showing unusual antipathy toward suggestions for this bout, and Eddie Kane, Gibbons' manager, has been yelling that Dempsey didn't want the match.

There were reasons for Kearns to be cool on the proposition, because it would not do to have the steam all let out early in the winter, when it would have to be all heated up again before the summer had hardly started.

Dempsey will fight anyone, if he gets the money he wants, and Tex Rickard will meet his financial demands when Rickard sees money in it himself. There would be money for a promoter in another Dempsey-Gibbons fight, because Gibbons doesn't want the mint for fighting, and Dempsey will draw a house any time or any place he fights.

Rickard is not making any plans to give Georges Carpentier some work, despite reports from Paris to the contrary. Paris newspapers a few days ago carried a story that Carpentier had completed negotiations for three fights under Rickard's promotion and that he was sailing in a short time. Rickard said he didn't even know that Georges was still alive and that he hadn't had any negotiations with him for anything.

Dempsey, it was reported some time ago, might go to England this summer and take another smack at Carpentier in a bout to be staged in the Membley stadium. It was suggested that the bout might draw enough to pay the two young financiers if it could be staged during the British empire exposition.

Howard C. Key, a graduate of the Eastland high school, and winner of the county and district finals in tennis last year, was noted for his spectacular playing, his school friends said today.

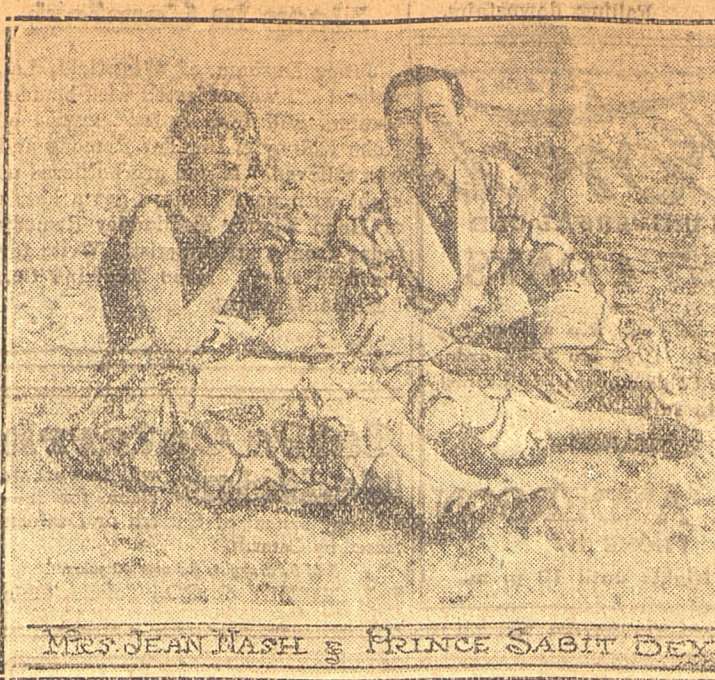

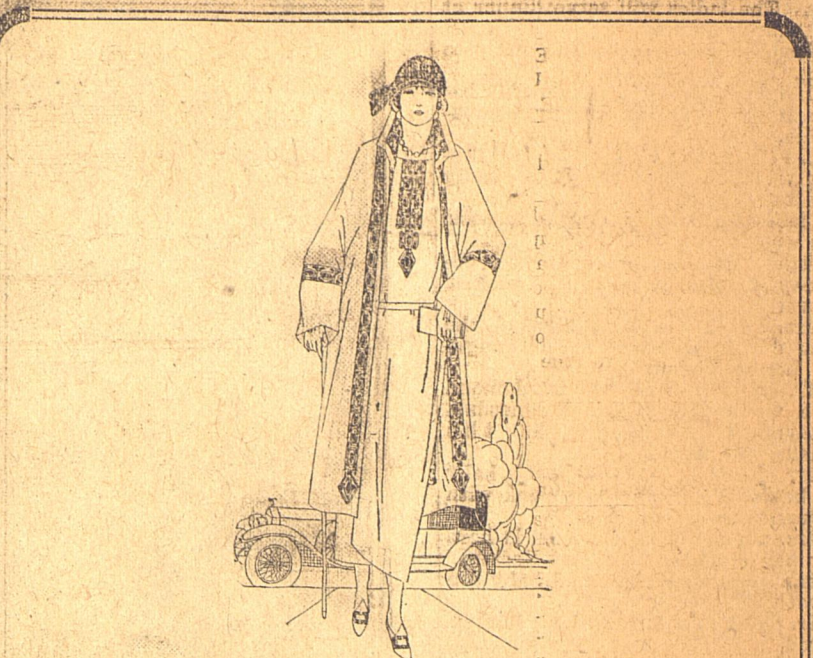
