Nearly 1,600 Students in Public Schools and 100 in St. Rita's Parish School.

Nearly 1,600 pupils enrolled in the Ranger public schools today. Almost 100 are expected to be enrolled at St. Rita's parish school this week.

The Ranger high school enrollment exceeds by 60 the registration of last year. The enrollment today after the credits are checked and books assigned, will be approximately 310, J. W. ## **COTTON SUPPLY SHRINKS**

Smaller Carry Over, Increased Demand by Spinners, and Diminished Yield This Years Makes Staple Scarcer and Inucreases Prices.

### By United Press.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 11.-Increased consumption, together with a small surplus of stock from last year, will result in a world's cotton shortage unless foreign cotton producing countries increase their output during the coming year, it was revealed today in government statistics covering a world survey of the cotton situation.

With a diminished surplus of only 6,400.000 bales at the beginning of the season, and an American yieldmore than half of the world's supply-estimated at not more than 10,788,000 bales, an ever-increasing shortage is imminent. Consumption of cotton this year is likely to be ahead of last year's consumption of 20,550,000 bales, which was an increase of 900,000 bales over the preceding year Heavy inroads on the surplus stock of last year will help increase the shortage.

The stock on hand at the beginning of this year, 6,-400,000 bales, was the lowest for several years, in spite of larger production last year than for several years.

Own Water Supply it Will

Twilight Dusk and Chill of Early Evening At-Lights the World. Il-Moon Where Eclipse Is Total Turns Day Into Night.

It was an almost ghostly light-ing effect on the streets of Ranger yesterday afternoon while the sun was partially obliterated by the passing of the moon between the solar rays and the earth. The partial eclipse, and it was about 75 per cent, resulted in a grayish lighting effect The partial eclipse was noticeable about 2:30 o'clock. A notch appeared in the sun, and steadily, quickly the eclipse grew in volume until the greatest portion of the sun covered amounted to abount 75 per cent,

as seen in Ranger. The eclipse could be observed nicely and without pain or injury to the eye by means of smoked glasses. Hundreds of Ranger people were seen viewing the sun between 3 and 3:30 o'clock. School children were dismissed from classes, that they might look at the phenomenon.

As theh great shadow, with its weird manifestations, crept over the face of the earth, riots took place, for the people believed the sun had been blotted out forever.

Because the people were not prepared for the eclipse, and because Emperor Tshun-Kang was badly frightened, he promptly had the heads of the two astronomers cut off and placed at his feet after the sun had again appeared. This is the earliest account of an eclipse on record.

An eclipse turned the tide of the battle of Arbela, during the time of Alexander the Great. A battle between the Medes and the Persians
