Germany Tells Russia She Will Enter Four-Power Security Pact

LONDON, June 24.—Germany, according to reliable information today, has announced to the soviet government her definite intention of entering the proposed four-power security pact. This would repudiate an earlier Russo-German agreement to pursue identical courses regarding the League of Nations.

France Gives to Germany Assurance of Cologne Evacuation

BERLIN, June 24.—A report here today said Ambassador Hoesch at Paris had received definite assurances from Foreign Minister Briand that Cologne would be evacuated along with the Ruhr region on Aug. 17.

DALLA SNEGRO RUNS AMUCK SERIOUSLY INJURING TWO

DALLAS, June 24.—Two persons were seriously injured and several others imperiled when Sam Davis, negro, ran amuck with a shotgun in "little Mexico," here today. Arona Blesa, a Mexican woman, and Le Roy Foreman, negro, were struck by shot as the negro fired several times in the street. Davis escaped after the shooting, which was a love affair, officers believe.

Farm Marketing Salesmanship Most Important for Success, Says Davidson

Special Correspondence.
HOUSTON, June 24.—Former Lieutenant Governor Lynch Davidson, addressing the Houston Salesmanship club, urged that farmers to be successful, should acquire some knowledge of salesmanship. In part, he said:

"Show me the man who is a good home provider and, with few exceptions, I will show you a good citizen. It was said by Napoleon, one of the greatest military geniuses of his age, that 'an army travels on its stomach,' meaning of course, that it must be fed and provided for or else it would not travel.

"So it is in all walks of life, and that calls for individual economic independence. It calls for man to first provide for his own security, but not selfishly. Individual economic independence creates good citizens, and upon good citizenship government depends for its existence.

"If typical of its title, this organization's membership relies upon salesmanship as a means of maintenance. There are many kinds of salesmen: hardware, grocery, dry goods, lumber, steel, oil stock, cigars and cigarettes, pen and paper, neat and pop-corn vendors, but how frequently do we ever see or hear of a real 'farmer salesman'? And so I have chosen 'Farm Marketing Salesmanship' as a theme kindred to this organization and occasion.

"No class of people throughout this broad land enjoy less economic independence than the farmer—the biggest business of all businesses—producing annually more new wealth than any other single business. It provides, generally speaking, poorer standards of living, less opportunity to enjoy the luxuries of life than any other single industry, and yet is the very heart, soul and backbone of the nation's prosperity.

"So long as the individual farmer, with sample in his hands, peddles his

WASHINGTON, June 24.—A crisis that may wreck the 9,000-mile Van Sweringen brothers railway merger or throw it into the courts was faced by proponents of the proposed merger today as hearings on it were resumed before the interstate commerce commission. On the ruling of the commission as to whether O. P. The commission has a motion to compel such testimony under advisement and its decision will be rendered today or tomorrow. Presentation of technical testimony occupied the opening hours today.

Before taking to their automobiles, the presidential party was greeted in the waiting room of the station by Major George J. Bates and members of the city council. A crowd of several hundred persons lined the station square and the route through Salem, giving President and Mrs. Coolidge a cordial reception.

ABILENE MAN HURT IN AUTO CRASH, SUES FOR DAMAGES

ABILENE, June 24.—Damages for personal injuries, totaling \$10,695 are asked of C. L. Todd by R. F. Revell in a suit filed in district court here which grew out of an alleged motor accident which occurred last July 4, at a curve on Highway No. 1, just east of Lytle lake.

The plaintiff claims he suffered permanent and serious injuries, to an eye, and that the other eye was useless before the accident. He states that he fears he will soon be totally blind as his sight is gradually becoming less.

The petition filed states that Mr. Revell was engaged in the dairy business and that he was hauling milk at the time of the accident. He claims that he was driving south approaching the point where the highway turns east and that he became aware of two large and powerful automobiles coming west and approaching the same curve from the east.

The charges that the cars were evidently racing and that as the first one passed his car, he pulled out to the extreme right hand side of the road that as Todd's car started around the curve he was driving at such a high rate of speed and in an "unlawful and wanton manner" that he lost control of the car and that it then struck the plaintiff's car, demolishing it.

Shepherd's Attorney Says Money Behind Man's Prosecution

CRIMINAL COURTROOMS, CHICAGO, June 24.—Money is at the bottom of the prosecution of William D. Shepherd on the charge that he murdered his ward, Billy McClinton, chief defense attorney, charged in his argument for acquittal.

"If Shepherd had taken a hatchet and murdered his own son, this would simply be another murder case," Stewart argued. "But in this case Billy had a lot of money and there are a lot of people who are jealous because he gave it to Shepherd. That is why he is being persecuted."

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BRITISH SEE TREACHERY IN CHINESE RIOTS

Taking Decisive Steps at Hong Kong and Canton to Preserve Order.

LONDON, June 24.—The British government professes to believe that agents of another government are fostering disturbances in China, Foreign Secretary Austin Chamberlain told the house of commons today, replying to questions.

Chamberlain told another questioner that Great Britain is not contemplating the appointment of any ambassador to Russia.

While foreign refugees, including many Americans, are pouring into strike-ridden Hong Kong from the former settlement of Shameen at Canton, British and Indian troops are being sent into Shameen from Hong Kong.

This move, following the clash yesterday at Canton, involving Chinese students and British marines, in which one Frenchman was killed and several British wounded slightly, indicates that the British intend to defend Shameen with arms, if necessary.

This takes on added significance in view of the Hong Kong dispatch that before the marines had replied to the Chinese fire, the British consul had warned the Canton government that any Chinese attempt to enter the foreign concession would be forcibly resisted and the Chinese government held responsible.

At Hong Kong, additional Chinese are reported joining the general strike, while Americans were enrolling in the special constabulary and foreign women working as waitresses in cafes. Special measures were being taken to keep the public work in operation and the British government is reported prepared to take relentless measures against attempted disorders.

At Peking, Americans are planning to hold a meeting to consider the situation.

The Eastland Retail Merchants meeting held last evening was fairly attended and some important matters discussed. The matter of closing Eastland places of business on Saturday, July 4th, was discussed, but no definite steps taken until a more representative meeting of the membership can be had.

J. W. Thurman Home From Rotary Meeting

John W. Thurman returned to Ranger, Sunday, from Cleveland, Ohio, where he attended the International Rotary club convention, as a delegate from Ranger Rotary club. Mr. Thurman gave a short report of the meeting at the Rotary club luncheon, this noon, and expressed himself as being most highly pleased with it in every way. He stated that unlike a great many conventions it was not held for a good time, but for a profitable time, and the Rotary ethics were never forgotten at any time. Even on the train, going up to Chicago, on their first Sunday out, they gathered in one coach and had a sing-song and various talks.

Good Rain Falls In Far West Texas

MULESHOE, Texas, June 24.—About two inches of rain has fallen in this section in the last 24 hours and the rainfall continued today. Tanks and lakes have been filled. Reports from Lamb county indicated the fall was general in the lower Panhandle countries to the New Mexico line. Prospects for crops are excellent.

MON-TEX BUYS OWENWOOD OIL FT. WORTH PLANT

FORT WORTH, June 24.—The Mon-Tex corporation has purchased the Owenwood Oil corporation building at 600 North Main street, with a filling station, trackage, oil storage and other marketing facilities for \$135,000 which it will occupy July 1, it is announced. Mon-Tex manufactures natural gasoline and carbon black.

Owenwood will move into offices on the eighth floor, F. & M. National bank building.

Mon-Tex, incorporated in Texas during 1924 for \$500,000, is starting up a natural gasoline plant eight miles west of Rising Star, Eastland county, which has a capacity of 20,000 cubic feet of wet gas daily. In addition, a two-unit, 60-house, carbon black plant costing \$200,000 is being built.

Four producing gas wells and a fifth on the sand will furnish the gas to run the plants in Eastland county. Mon-Tex obtained the sixth permit to manufacture carbon black issued in Texas. Stephens county has four plants and Eastland will have two. The plant of Mon-Tex ultimately will have a capacity of 20,000,000 cubic feet daily.

Officers of Mon-Tex are A. W. Terpening, formerly of Billings, Mont., president; G. K. Martin, vice president, Texas oil operator; Charles E. Smith, La Belle, Mo., manager; O. W. Nicky, formerly of Billings, secretary. All officers are directors, together with J. R. McPhail, cattleman, Omaha, Neb., and O. C. Edwards, formerly of Kansas City, Mo.

Dallas Women Robbed By Hollywood Bandits

HOLLYWOOD, Calif., June 24.—Four wealthy society women of Dallas, Texas, were routed from their beds at a fashionable summer bungalow colony here this morning by burglars and robbed of \$10,000 in diamonds and jewelry and an undetermined amount of cash.

The women are Mrs. Ara Smith, Mrs. Harry Simon, Mrs. Arthur Flake and Mrs. W. H. Roberts. They came here a week ago and rented the bungalow and prepared to enjoy a summer in Hollywood.

FIRE NEAR SHREVEPORT BELIEVED INCENDIARY

SHREVEPORT, La., June 24.—W. W. Hutchins, former justice of the peace, was held for investigation today in connection with two fires, believed to have been of incendiary origin, which swept the business and residential sections of Bossie City, a suburb, during the night.

Thirty buildings and homes were destroyed, with loss estimated at \$100,000. C. D. Lass of Deridder, La., was seriously injured when trapped in a burning hotel.

LUFKIN BOY KILLED WHEN HIT BY AUTO

LUFKIN, Tex., June 24.—S. B. Sanders, 12, was instantly killed when run down by an auto on the Houston highway near here during the night. The lad had alighted from a machine to retrieve his hat when struck.

Kissing Another's Wife Thrown Out As Evidence for Divorce

NEW YORK, June 24.—A New York supreme court judge has taken legal cognizance of the new course of conduct permissible to the younger generation. Kissing another man's wife, for example, will no longer be permitted as evidence in a divorce case. Supreme Court Justice Hoard said today from the bench.

ROAD BUILDING ABOUT RANGER IS DISCUSSED

Ranger Chamber of Commerce Directors Also Consider Swimming Pool.

Road matters pertaining to Ranger and Eastland county were discussed at length last night by the board of directors of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce. Several roads leading out of Ranger into territory belonging to the county that are not in condition for good traveling, were taken over and a special road committee appointed to look into matters.

The board of directors were informed of a telegram from Joe Burkett, of the highway commission, announcing that the state had accepted the maintenance of the Pleasant Grove road leading out of Ranger westward over Eastland hill and connecting up with the Breckenridge highway about seven miles west of Ranger. It was reported that the contract had already been let for the hard surfacing of the road and that the contractor, with his equipment and road workers, would be on the ground in a few weeks. Construction of the Pleasant Grove road will cost somewhere around \$70,000, no construction of the two and a quarter miles of the road in the Ranger city limits that will be hard surfaced by the city of Ranger will be about \$7,000. Warrants will be issued by the city commissioners to cover the city's part in the construction program, according to an order adopted by the commission two weeks ago.

MacMillan's Flight Ship Now at Sydney On Journey Northward

SYDNEY, N. S., June 24.—The Bowdoin, Commander Donald B. MacMillan's flight ship on the forthcoming Arctic expedition, arrived at Sydney harbor at 2 p. m.

Lieutenant Commander E. F. MacDonald Jr., in command of the plane ship, Terry, which arrived here yesterday and also in charge of radio communication on the expedition, explained that the additional equipment being rushed north consisted only of a spare generator. MacDonald intimated there would be no alteration of radio equipment already installed on the boats and planes.

Amundsen Planning To Write Book and Go On Lecture Tour

OSLO, Norway, June 24.—Capt. Roald Amundsen, Arctic air explorer, plans to arrive at Horten, Norway, on a coal steamer, July 4. He intends to write a book covering his flight almost to the pole. This will appear in the autumn, after which he plans to lecture at home and abroad.

Seven Arrested In Connection With Plot To Kill Kansas Woman

KANSAS CITY, June 24.—Six men and one woman, arrested in connection with the alleged plot to kill Mrs. Mabel Davies of Concordia, Kan., will be given a preliminary hearing Friday, following their arraignment yesterday on charges of assault to kill. Five of them failed to make the required bond of \$10,000 and are being held in jail.

Ray Bryan, one of those arrested, said that Davies had arranged with the gunmen to kill his wife. Mrs. Davies was beaten and robbed in her home last year by four gangsters, believed to be four of those now under arrest.

DR. FARADEE, NOTED ANTHROPOLOGIST, DIES

WASHINGTON, June 24.—Dr. William Curtis Faradee, 60, noted anthropologist, died in a hospital here today. Three years ago he was stricken with a mysterious malady while heading an exploring expedition into the wilds of South America, and since then has fought courageously to overcome the disease. He has submitted to more than 35 blood transfusions in an effort to save his life.

AGED MINISTER DIES

GRAHAM, Texas, June 24.—The Rev. S. D. Cook, 81 years old, a resident of Young county for nearly 20 years, died at the home of his son in Wichita Falls and the body was brought here for burial.

NAVY SECRETARY IS ACTING LIKE SPOILED CHILD

If MacMillan Won't Use Navy Radio on Trip, Naval Fliers Can't Go.

WASHINGTON, June 24.—Secretary of the Navy Wilson today ordered Lieutenant Commander Byrd, commander of the aviation naval detachment with the MacMillan expedition, to land the navy planes and personnel at Sydney, N. S., and leave the party if Commander MacMillan refused to take on naval radio equipment other than as Wilbur desires. The navy department announced that it had no information of reports that MacMillan had wired the expedition was returning.

United States Destroyer Putnam, with Regulation Navy Radio Equipment Taken from United States Steamship Delaware, and Sent to Wicasset, Maine, for the MacMillan Expedition, is Today Proceeding to Sydney, N. S., under orders from the navy department to deliver it to the two ships.

WASHINGTON, June 24.—The refusal of Commander Donald MacMillan of the polar expedition to carry navy radio equipment has precipitated a quarrel with Secretary of the Navy Wilbur, which may cause Wilbur to withdraw the navy plane and personnel. He has sent a pre-emptory message to Lieutenant Commander Byrd, in charge of the several naval fliers, to get MacMillan to discard his commercial short wave wireless and substitute for it the long wave naval equipment provided.

It is learned that Byrd has been told to leave the expedition if MacMillan refuses to comply with Wilbur's request. A naval destroyer is pursuing the expedition today with the naval equipment. The first stop is to be at Sydney.

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HOUSTON BOY DROWNS

HOUSTON, June 24.—Marvin Hicks, 21, was drowned while swimming in Bray's bayou near here yesterday. The body was recovered after a three-hour search.

TARIFF COMMISSION USELESS. Nearly a year ago the tariff commission recommended a reduction of the tariff on sugar of one-half a cent. Since that time the president has been investigating the question in his own way, with the result that he has finally determined to ignore the recommendation.

This is contrary to what was generally conceded to be the way the commission idea would work out when the measure was debated in congress. The 1924 national platform pointed with pride to the commission as an agency for the making of tariff rates lower when they were too high and for increasing them when the necessity arose.

Watson and His Wife Are Freed on Bond

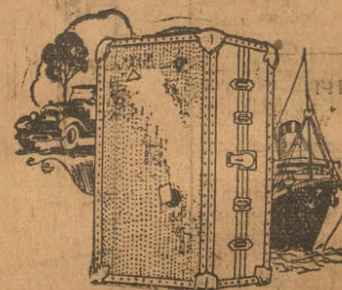

W. A. MASSIE, AGED WEATHERFORD MAN, DIES

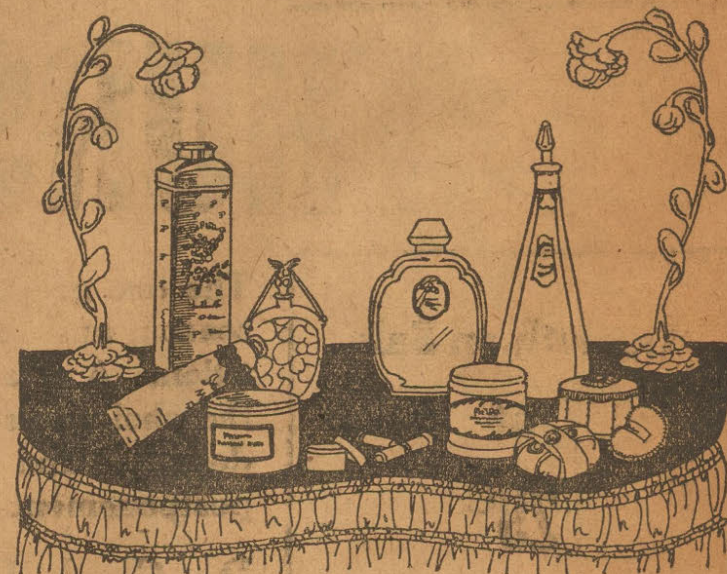

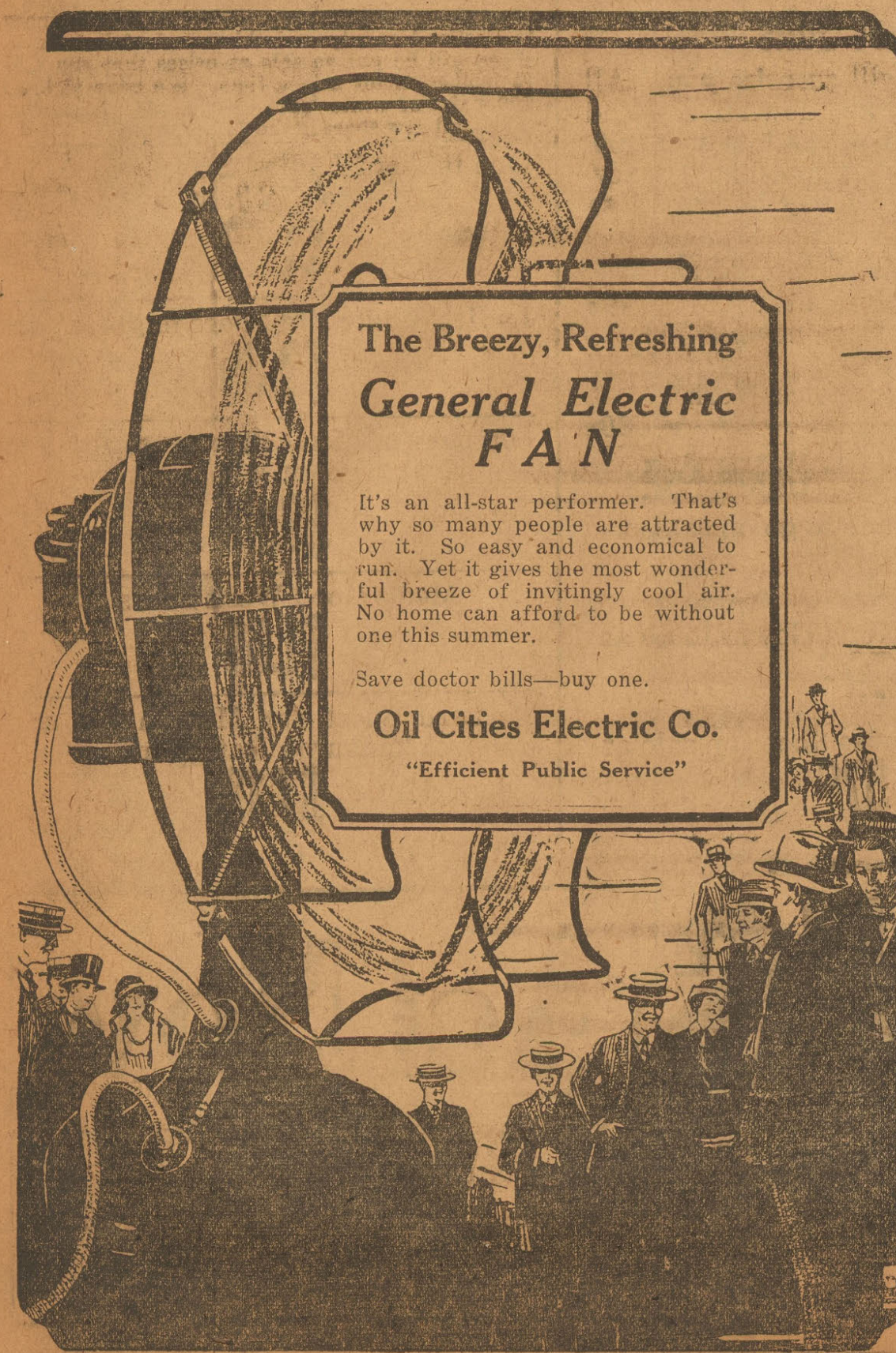
