FORTY KNOWN DEAD IN UTAH SNOW SLIDE

Oil and Sulphur Royalties Subject To Taxation As Personal Property

1,293 CLEMENCIES "MA'S" RECORD TO DATE

4 FULL PARDONS 8 CONDITIONALS ARE ANNOUNCED

All Records Broken In the United States By Texas Governor

AUSTIN, Feb. 18.—Four full pardons, eight conditional pardons and seven restorations of citizenship were announced today by the governor's office.

This raises the total of full pardons to 231, 535 conditional pardons and 150 restorations of citizenship. It makes the grand total of 1,293 clemencies since "Ma" assumed charge of the executive office. It breaks all records in the United States, so far as known.

3 SUSPECTS ARE HELD IN SHREVEPORT

SHREVEPORT, La., Feb. 18.—Texas officers were enroute here today to attempt to identify three men held in connection with abduction of the town marshal of Savoy, Texas, recently, and also suspected of other crimes, including bank robbery. Articles stolen from stores in Arpe, Texas, were said by the police to have been found on the men.

SEEK ALIENS IN PRISONS OVER NATION

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—A survey of all the federal and state jails, penitentiaries and asylums to determine how many alien inmates are subject to deportation was ordered today by Assistant Secretary of Labor White.

BOY IS HELD ON CHARGE OF P. O. ROBBERY

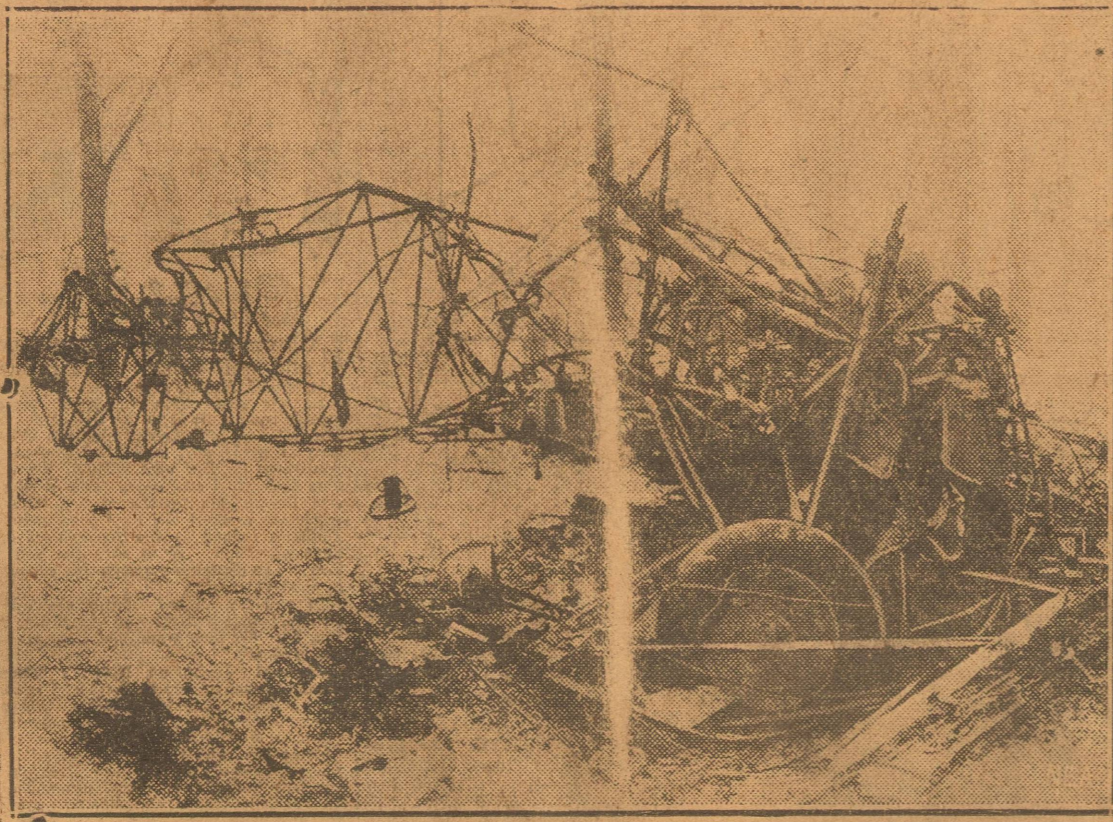
HOUSTON, Feb. 18.—Willard King, 19 years old of Onalaska, is under arrest charged with robbing and burning the Onalaska postoffice last December. He was taken into custody at Onalaska.

Italy Benefits By Dunlap Will, Gets a Library

ITALY, Texas, Feb. 18.—This city was made the beneficiary in the will of Samuel M. Dunlap who wrote provisions in his will providing for \$200,000 with which to build a public library.

Dunlap died several months ago but his will was only recently filed for probate and the provision discovered. Dunlap was a son of Nicholas P. Sims who at his death left Sims library as a gift to Waxahachie. A \$30,000 memorial to his daughter was also built by Dunlap on the Campus of T. C. U. at Fort Worth.

QUARANTINE AGAINST FLU IS DEMANDED

DALLAS, Feb. 18.—Laws for the quarantining persons sick with influenza may be asked the state and municipal authorities, according to City Health Director N. W. Andrews. Dr. Andrews said persons afflicted slightly with the malady usually circulate about the city and are spreading the disease. Dallas is over run with the epidemic. Reports show that there are cases of "flu" in every city block.

KIRBY SELLS OIL LEASE FOR \$34,000

For a consideration of \$34,000, John H. Kirby of Houston conveyed to H. C. Pace and John C. Ward of Dallas the Caudle lease, which has been one of the most productive leases in the Eastland district, developed since the boom. The assignment of the lease was recorded today by R. L. Jones, deputy county clerk, and the instrument bore \$34 in United States internal revenue stamps.

3 FIREMEN HURT HOUSTON FIRE, LOSS IS \$150,000

HOUSTON, Feb. 18.—Three firemen were slightly injured and damages estimated between \$100,000 and \$150,000 was done here late yesterday afternoon when a fire almost completely destroyed the two-story brick and concrete building of the Houston Sash and Door company.

Breeders Poultry And Dairy Farm Are Visiting Tyler

TYLER, Feb. 18.—A breeder's poultry show and the cotton belt dairy, hog and poultry train were here at the same time. The attractions were gathering places for throngs of farmers and farmers' wives. Nearly 1,200 persons visited the two displays.

Would Publish Correspondence With Mexico

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—A resolution requesting the state department to inform the senate whether the Mexican government has refused the application to permit the publication of the recent correspondence on relations between the United States and Mexico was introduced in the senate today by Senator Norris, republican, of Nebraska.

NEW SYSTEM VALUATION EXPLAINED

The Stoner System of Appraisal, which has been approved by the City Commission, and whose ultimate acceptance is now in the hands of the Ranger School Board, will do the following things for Ranger. It will furnish sectional unit-foot maps for all property in the city limits, showing block outlines only for use in determining the unit foot values of streets and highways. On completion of the map services described the company will furnish the city with one set of unit foot measure maps, with the final correct unit-foot values inscribed thereon. A set of blue prints showing the front foot value in dollars of each lot or parcel of ground after being computed will be furnished.

Another set of blue prints will show by symbol every taxable building in the city. Experts will be employed to ascertain the unit foot values, upon actual view of each street and after the unit-foot values on all streets have been approved, the experts will compute the value of lots on their relation to the streets, alleys, railroads, waterways or other elements of accessibility and usefulness. Experts will also determine the value of buildings and will furnish a card record showing name of owner, lot and block number, addition, street number, number of square feet of floor space, and factors of valuation and depreciation, showing the present value based upon the cost of reproduction less depreciation expressed in unit of age, condition, obsolescence or lack of utility. The company also will write and abstract showing the total value of each lot and the building thereon, which will also describe the lot, owner, value of land, improvements, the total value of land and improvements and the assessed value.

NIGHTFALL SEES GLOOM IN TIA JUANA

TIA JUANA, Mexico, Feb. 18.—Gloom replaced joy at Tia Juana today for the first time since the advent of prohibition in the United States. The 6 o'clock American closing order which went into effect last night put the first real damper on the notorious resort.

KANSAS CITY SNOWBOUND, TRAINS STOP

KANSAS CITY, Feb. 18.—With a blinding snow which began falling early today continuing unabated this afternoon, indications were that Kansas City would be virtually snowbound by night. The fall ranged from three to five inches over northwestern Missouri and Kansas. A high wind piled up drifts in streets and highways and on railroad tracks, demoralizing all traffic. Train service to and from the west was disrupted and transcontinental passenger trains are reported many hours late.

PANHANDLE HIT BY SNOW STORM SCHOOLS CLOSED

PERRYTOWN, Texas, Feb. 18.—A blinding snow storm considered one of the worst in this section of the country for years, has been raging across the extreme northern Panhandle for the last 15 hours. Snow has accumulated in drifts six to eight feet deep, rendering roads impassable. Schools in this district were ordered closed today on account of attendance being practically impossible. It is said to be worth at least a million dollars to wheat farmers.

RULING IS MADE FOR ATTORNEY IN SOUTH TEXAS

Assessment Is Based On What It May Sell For at Private Sale.

AUSTIN, Feb. 18.—Royalty interests in both sulphur and oil are taxable as personal property, according to an opinion of Assistant Attorney General R. J. Randolph. This information was mailed to C. B. Matterson, county attorney of Brazoria county.

FIELD MEET IS PLANNED FOR MCH. 19

The plans of Architect C. R. Glenn of Cisco for the new Central Ward school building of Ranger, were adopted by the school board at the meeting last night. Mr. Glenn was instructed to draw up the necessary specifications, which he stated would take about two weeks, and then bids on the building will be sought.

The site committee made a report but it was continued and asked to get reports on other sites before the next meeting on Monday night, Feb. 22. A committee consisting of C. C. Patterson and W. W. Houswright from the board of city development was presented and made in an effort to interest the school board in the Stoner appraisal system. This matter was also passed to the next meeting.

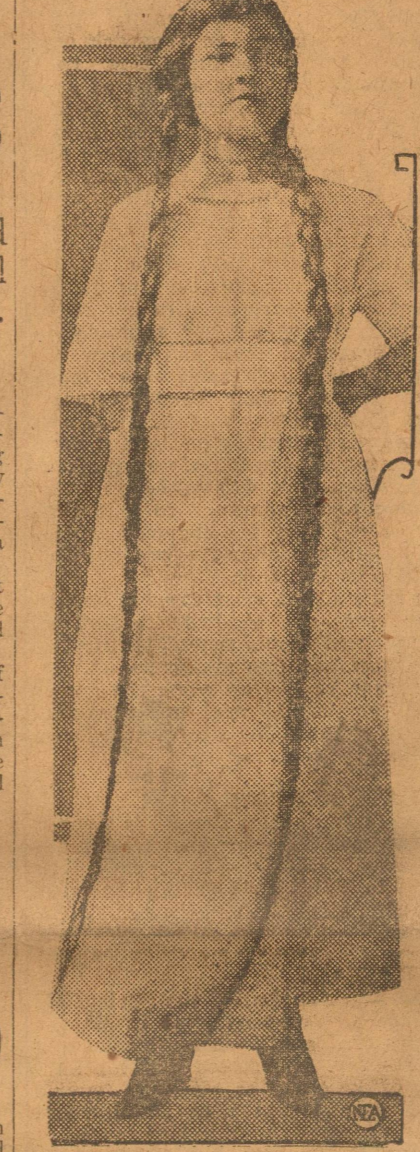
WOODMEN PLAN TO INTERVENE IN BOND CASE

EARTH TREMORS SHAKE 3 TOWNS IN CALIFORNIA

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 18.—California cities from Santa Barbara south to Long Beach were rocked by a distinctive earth tremor today. The jolt appeared to center at Santa Barbara and was the most severe that has been felt in southern California in six months. The shock hit at 10:19 a. m., shaking buildings for five seconds. No damage was reported.

TOWN WATCHES RESCUERS DIG AMONG DEBRIS

Salesman Tells Story Of How He Felt Under Debris Of Building

BINGHAM, Utah, Feb. 18.—A heavy pall of smoke and fog settled over this little mining camp this morning as though Mother Nature was mourning for the dead and injured. Small groups of relatives and friends of those who are still unaccounted for could be seen near the buried buildings waiting for the workers to bring out their dear ones. The death toll early today stood at 40. The missing list was variously estimated at from 30 to 40.

An avalanche of snow covered Bingham. The slide started yesterday afternoon. Approximately 1,000 men are working digging into the tons of which swept down burning buildings and bringing death and injuries. Perhaps one of the most graphic stories of the disaster was told by Tony Valasic, 21 years old, a salesman, who was buried beneath the debris for six hours. Valasic was taking an order from a boarding house when the slide occurred.

"I was just getting ready to leave when I heard a roar, and the snow began to filter down from the floor above us," Valasic said. "In the room with me was Joe Atencia, the boarding house cook. The next thing I knew I was overwhelmed by the debris and found myself in a sitting posture on the floor. My legs were pinned and I was completely covered by snow."

"I did not seem badly hurt, but I could hear the groans of Atencia. Now and then I would reach over and pinch him to let him know that I was still alive."

"I noticed his voice was getting weaker and his groans less audible. He died a few moments later. That was about 15 minutes before I was rescued."

3 NEW WELLS FOR STATES, RISING STAR

Three wells will be started in the immediate future in the newly-discovered Rising Star pool by the States Oil corporation of Eastland, which has approximately 400 acres adjoining on three sides the Barney Carter-Cowboy Evans gusher lease.

The States is about ready to spud in on the No. 2 Allen, which is an offset to the Carter and Evans wells, and will start soon on the No. 3 Allen. The No. 1 Allen, half a mile north of the Carter and Evans producer, is a 9,000,000-foot gasser. The lease adjoins to the north the Dunn, on which the big oil well is located.

DAVIDSON GETS WRIT OF ERROR IN HIGH COURT

The supreme court has granted a writ of error in the case of George A. Davidson against Eastland county, attorneys in Eastland learned today. This is the case in which Davidson obtained an injunction in the 91st district court restraining the county from spending the road money. The Eleventh Court of Civil Appeals dissolved the injunction. Davidson carried the case to the supreme court which, in granting a writ of error, signifies that it will go into the matter at a later date. In the meantime, the injunction remains in force.

Root and Rhodes To Start 2 Wells For the Big Lake Co.

Root & Rhodes of Eastland, who have drilled many wells in the Big Lake field as contractors, will start two wells at once for the Big Lake Oil company.





Sparks Throws Hat In Prosecutors Ring

"I am taking this method of formally announcing my candidacy for the office of county attorney of Eastland county.  "My policy as county attorney, if elected, will be one of sane, energetic, aggressive prosecution, taking pride in the fact that I am representing before the bar of justice not only the widows and orphans and others on whom has fallen the heavy hand of the criminal, but also a citizenship that wants to see right and justice prevail. I pledge to Eastland county my energy and whatever talent I may possess to an active, aggressive, and conscientious discharge of the duties of this office, in the event the people see fit to elect me.
 "It happens that the city of Eastland will apparently furnish several, if not all, of the candidates for this office. I am glad to know that all of my avowed and prospective opponents are personally my friends, and I want to assure the people of Eastland that, while I shall lay before them my claims for their support, when the campaign is over it will be my pleasure to know that each of my opponents and their friends are still my friends. I trust that my past record and my bearing before you will commend me to your confidence and support.
