Herriot Turns Down Invitation; Defeat Is Due to Bad Politics

By United Press. PARIS, March 9 .- Aristide Briand today accepted President Doumerge's invitation to form a French cabinet. After three days of surly declarations that he would not take the responsibility of organizing a government to succeed himself. Briand attributed his defeat to have passed the necessary financial legislation to petty politics. He agreed to accept a port folio in the new ministry within an hour after the issuance of the invitation by President Doumerge.

gest job in France, handicapped by his 64 years, but possessed of a prestige such as no other French rolitician could claim this morning. Briand offered Joseph Callaiux, the position of Minister of Finance




