Begin with dried crumbs and again continue layer for layer with seasoning until all is used. Cover with but-tered crumbs, sprinkle with cheese and take 25 minutes in a moderately hot oven. Serve from the dish in which it was baked.



The answer seems obvious in the main. The value of Angora goat raising is manifest and is is based upon more than one source of in-

crement. First of all, the mohair. For the food they eat and the wool they pro-duce, it is said a good Angora will produce a greater net cash yield than any other animal or any plant prod uct. For mutton (they call is chevon, now), it is only a question whether your goat is worth more alive or dead. But far and away the largest item of present value, Mr. Reese believes, is the goat's utilization in the clearing up of wild lands, thousands of acres of which still remain untilled in the county and residue.

The goat is a shrub eater. Given full browsing sway, he will beat a whole army of men armed with grubhing hoes, it is said. Once the goats have done their work, the rest of the clearing comes cheep.




