WILL BUY HALF, STORE HALF OF PRODUCT

Gulf May Join in Move; Other Pipe Lines Have No Information; Storage Rules and Rates Announced by Texas Company.

Only half the production of crude oil in the North Central and North Texas fields will be purchased by the Texas Pipe Line company and the Humble Oil & Refining company, according to notices posted yesterday. However, both companies will accept oil for storage, the Texas charging 2 cents a barrel a month for this storage and the Humble charging 3 cents a barrel. The Gulf Pipe Line company has received no notice to take this action, but is expecting it, according to information given out at its offices this morning. Other companies in this but M. H. The same plan prevails with the Texas Pipe line. However, in its posted notice, it is stated that the company retains the right to cease storing the oil on ninety days' notice and at the expiration of that time, if the company did not purchase the and at the expiration of that time, if the company did not purchase the stored oil then it had a right to charge handling and transportation charges. If the oil is not sold to the company in the time limit or re-moved then the company reserves the right to sell at the prevailing price and account to the owner fo

The bulletin posted by the Texas company is signed by T. J. Donoghue, its vice president, and reads:
"Effective this dates Dec. 27, 1920,

this company will limit its purchase of crude oil in North Central Texa and North Texas to 50 per cent of the production of wells. If desired this company will accept and store on the following credit balance plan, all or any portion of the remaining 50 per cent of production from the same wells. The Texas Pipe Line company company, and credit balance oil shall measurement, and title requirements clauses numbered one and two, form

"This company (The Texas com pany) will charge storage on credibalance oil at the rate of 2 cents per parrel per month, and when such ois ultimately not purchasen by thi owner's orders, the owners or his as signs shall pay the handling and transportation charges of the pipe

"This company reserves the right to terminate storage on ninety days notice, and thereupon if oil is not removed, to sell the same in order relieve storage, and account to the owner for the proceeds.

All deliveries of credit balance oil will be put out of the company's com-mon stock, North Texas and North Central Texas crude.

The covenants under which the company accepts the storage reads:

1. Quantities are to be compute from regularly compiled tank tables the oil owner to have the privilege o witnessing gauge tickets, and, in ac dition to the deductions of the tan tables, corrections shall be made for temperature and impurities according to your local rules in force at the time, and oil shall be steamed when necessary to render it mechantable

2. Satisfactory abstracts and other evidence of title will be furnished to you at any time on demand. In the event of a failure to so furnish such evidence of title, or in the event of a dispute at any time concerning title, you may hold the oil run or its proceeds, without interest, until indem nity satisfactory to you has been fur-

3. Runs to the Texas Pipe Line company for your account shall be valid delivery, and said pipe line company in your place and stead may make the aforesaid deductions and

You are not expected to re ceive oil in definite quantities or for fixed periods or to provide storage on except as and when you shall now or

He is now unable to buy the food to which he has been accustomed, simple as his wants are Likewise, he can no longer make his journeys, forsooth, his friends cannot aford to entertain him. To the nomadic Indian this is a grievous thing.

Even religious observances are affectd, a most serious matter. The gravity of the situation from the Indian's standpoint may be illustrated by referring to the cost of ordinary cotton cloth which at one time got beyond the means of the masses. The Mohammedan religion re quires that the dead shall be buried in unused shrouds.
