

Sheriff and Jailer on Way Here From Thurber in Quest of Brazos Bank Robbers; Had Abandoned Car.

In Hand During Melee

With Highway Bandits

Palo Pinto Jailer Shot

Charles W. Leird, jailer for Palo Pinte county, is lying in the local hospital this morning with a serious bullet wound in his left hand as the result of an attempt on the part of highwaymen to rob him and W. G. Abernathy, sheriff of Palo Pinto county, about 8:30 o'clock Thursday night on the Thurber road, some two and one-half or three miles out of this city.

They were on their way from Thurber to Ranger in an effort to obtain some clew that would lead to the apprehension of the three bandits who held up the Brazos State bank at noon Tuesday and forced William Simmons, cashier, to turn over some \$1,265 to them, Mr. Leird stated at the hospital Friday morning. He said that while at Thurber Sheriff Abernathy had secured a tip that the bandits might be hiding in Ranger, but the sheriff, himself, stated this morning that he had been unable to find any trace of them and that he believed that they must have gone in hiding at Ft. Worth or some other elty from which they had come.

DIDN'T WANT A RIDE.

When they were about two and a half or three miles from Ranger and passing along a lonely portion of the road, Sheriff Abernathy said that he heard someone hall them. Ho thought at the time that it was someone who wanted a ride and asked Leird to stop, but Leird, he said, had understood what was said. "Stop nothing!" he replied, "they said stick 'en up!" and gave the car more "juice." Sheriff Abernathy said that he

sprang to his feet and "shot a ring around the car" at the bandits, who had already opened fire upon them.

Put Spare Moneys

He was uncertain how many there were of them, but said that he and Leird were fired at irom both sides of the road. The latter stated this morning that he had seen two men on the left hand side of the road and another on the right hand side and that he had fired at them and had seen one crumple up. Of this he is uncertain though, because of the darkness, he maintains. The

windshield of the car was shot out. Several hundred yards from the scene of the attempted; hold-up, Sheriff Aberna-by said that Leird told him that he had been hit and that he had thought that he was joking until he showed him his left hand from which the blood was streaming. Abernathy immediately took the steering wheel and drove Leird to the hospital here.

USED BANDITS' CAR.

Both Abernathy and Leird drove to this city in one of the two cars that the bandits had used in the Brazos bank robbery. It was found three or four miles southeast of Santo when the posse of citizens, organized immediately after the bank robbery, had pushed them too closely. Two of the three bandits had driven up to the bank in one automobile and the other in another car. No one was in the bank but Cashier Simmons at the time of the hold-up and he had had presence of mind enough to step on an electric, button, used as a burglar alarm, so that citizens arriving on the scene came very near catching the bandits, who almost ran over several of them, as they left the bank. One of the cars used by the bandits belongs to D. J. Nash of Ballinger, and it is also be-

SANTA ROSA, Cal., Dec. 10 .- Disdaining to await the processes of the law, a mob of 100 men swouped down upon the Sonoma county jail early 10day and overpowering the guard, seized Charles Valanto, Tarrance Fitts and George Barron, alias Boyd, the confessed slayer of Sheriff James A. Petray and two of his deputies, and hanged them to the limb of a tree, three-quarters of a mile from this city.

The three men and a woman named Dorothy Quinlan, were arrested Sunday afternoon, during a gun fight with the sheriff and his deputies in a local hoel. It was alleged that the men were members of a gang that is guilty of a number of recent crimes committed against young girls in San Francisco and that they were wanted by the police of San Francisco

Mob Tries for Days.

For several days the mob had made desperate attempts to break into their cell and drag them forth to the death they felt they deserved. Strong guards had been stationed at all points of the jail, but this morning the mob could

stand it no longer and having gained in numbers, rushed the building. Faced and pointed out by the accus-ing finger of one of the young women, whom it is alleged that he assaulted, Barron is said to have confessed a few days ago to having killed the sheriff and his two deputies. He himself was on the verge of death, having been shot through the liver in the gun battle that ensued during the attempt of the sheriff's force to arrest him.

Numbers of girls have told the San Francisco police that they were enticed into automobiles by various members of a notorious gang and spirited away to a house in the suburbs of the city, where they were criminally assaulted. The stor-ies told by the girls and of their suffering while in the hands of the alleged gang added flame to the already infuriated minds of the mob.

The skillful and combined management of special detectives, members of the po-lice department and the sheriff's posse, together with the assistance of a number of the young girls who had once surfered in the hands of the hoodlums, located the three alleged members of the gang in a hotel at this city, where the sheriff and a posse of deputies attempted to arrest them Sunday.

What its possession means to the Poles is indicated by recounting some of its turbulent history.

700 Years Old.

Vilna was founded by Prince Godimin of, Lithuania, who reigned from 1315 te 1340, and, with Kiev, it formed an im portant part of Southern Russia. God inin and King Wadislaw of Poland unit ed in a war against the order of Ger man Knights, but it was not until nearly 100 years later that the two countrie estal-lished a common reichstag. Thi was at Horodlo on the Bug river and here the rulers of the two lands co-oper ated in deciding all important issues. There was a complete union of Pe land and Lithuania in 1560, as far a all state affairs were concerned, and this continued until the end of the eighteenth century. Although Lithu-ania was divided into six governmental subdivisions in 1795 and was under the rule of Russia, a writer in the Danzig Zeitung says, Vilna's sympathies remained with Poland.

Vilna was occupied by Russian "red" troops in the summer of last year and twice changed hands during the Polish-Russian campaign this year. It has been called the capital of Lithuania but the writer in the Danzig Zeitung says the number of Poles in and around Vilna
