FARMERS WILL RECEIVE MARKET BY WIRELESS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—The wireless telegraph as a means of carrying to the farmer agricultural market news such as prices and conditions is to be tested by the department of agriculture in co-operation with the bureau of standards. The experiment is to be tried in half a dozen Maryland and Virginia counties adjacent to the District of Columbia and if successful will be extended over the country.

The plans contemplate the essential use of seventeen wireless stations over the country. The wireless news of market conditions and prices will be sent broadcast and arrangements will be made with numerous private licensed operators who would aid in distributing the reports to farmers and others interested in the territory covered.

U. S. Navy Best Fed in World, Says McGowan

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—Claim still may be made that the American navy is the best fed body of men in the world. Samuel McGowan, paymaster general of the navy, declared in his annual report, made public Tuesday, in support of his statement, Rear Admiral McGowan cites the following order issued by Admiral Wilson, commander of the Atlantic fleet:

"Due to the special excellence of present navy ration and living conditions on board ships of the fleet, training tables for athletic events are considered unnecessary and are therefore forbidden."

Surplus provisions left over after filling the war-time need, Admiral McGowan said, have been disposed of at reasonable prices. He added that now stocks of the current season's crops were being obtained in sufficient quantities to meet the estimated requirements for the coming year.

Increase in the price of foodstuffs during the year were reflected in the cost of the navy ration, which rose to an average of 70.5 cents, as compared with 55.7 cents in 1919 and a pre-war average of 3 cents.

Admiral McGowan asserted that final figures showed that the navy subsisted 900,000 troops en route to France and 1,200,000 returning troops. In connection with the wartime work of the subsistence branch, he said:

"Despite the scarcity of certain articles of food and the constant and persistent pressure from outside amounting in effect to actual propaganda for relaxation of the rigidity of the navy's specifications, especially on meats, no such thing has done and the standard of subsistence was never lowered."

Admiral McGowan estimated that the navy during the three years from the outbreak of the war to the first of last April spent more than \$4,198,000, or one and a third as much as had been expended during the previous 123 years of the navy's history during which time it was engaged in four wars.

The cut in naval appropriations for labor by the last Congress was declared by Admiral McGowan to have been "too great to reasonably expect anything like satisfactory service for the various bureaus of the Navy Department." It will be necessary despite efforts to simplify reports and less work, he announced, to go to congress early in the session convening tomorrow to ask additional funds.

Progress in the sale of surplus vessels by the navy was described by the paymaster general as satisfactory. During the last fiscal year these sales amounted to more than five million dollars, although most of the vessels sold were small craft.

One of the chief recommendations made by Admiral McGowan is that the navy coaling plants at New York and Boston be located on government owned property. The government has large investments of capital in coaling plants on rented ground at the two cities, he said, adding that "sound business and naval policy requires that the control of these plants be removed from commercial disposition by government purchase of the land."

LABOR COMMISSIONER WANTS SHORTER DAY FOR WOMEN WORKERS

AUSTIN, Dec. 8.—The enactment of a law to provide an eight-hour day and a forty-eight-hour week for women employees in Texas, instead of the nine-hour day and the fifty-four-hour week now allowed, is contained in the biennial report of State Commissioner of Labor Jennings to Governor Hobby.

Commissioner Jennings also recommended that all exceptions made to the law as it now stands be removed and the law be made to apply in all occupations. Women working in laundries and cotton mills and as stenographers now are excepted under certain conditions, from the present fifty-four-hour law.

In support of his recommendation, the commissioner said that recent investigations have disclosed that the infant death rate among children of mothers employed by industries is many times greater than among children whose mothers were not employed previous to their birth. Mr. Jennings declared that eight hours is recognized almost universally as the standard working day, and the federal and most of the state governments so recognize it. He added that as a whole men's working hours in Texas are shorter than those of women and that in addition to their regular work, many of the employed women are forced to do several hours housework each day.

SURGEON-GENERAL SAYS HEALTH OF NAVY IS TIP-TOP

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—Despite the influx of recruits, health conditions in the navy during the last year were good, Surgeon General Braisted said in his annual report made public today. Influenza was the only communicable disease which was unduly great. Admiral Braisted said, adding that the number of sick leaves on this account were not over-large when taken in consideration with the replacement of the duration-of-the-war enlistments.

The death rate of the navy, the report showed, was 5.90 per 1,000 in the last year while for the year 1919, with the thousands of war-time enlistments, the death rate reached 18.47 per thousand. If pneumonia could have been eliminated, the report said, the death rate last year would have been only 1.84 per thousand.

## No Peace on the League Special to Geneva Meet

GENEVA, Dec. 8.—You find anything but peace when you travel on a League of Nations special.

Our train was due to leave the Gare de Lyon, Paris, at exactly 9:05 p. m., carrying a whole load of Britishers, including Lord Robert Cecil; an assortment of Japanese, Chinese, Uruguayans, etc. But a whole ten minutes before that hour, war broke loose among the traveling leaguers.

A traveling Englishman discovered that the sleeping compartment he had reserved hadn't been reserved at all. He found it occupied by a diminutive Jap who emphasized his possession by locking the door from the inside. While the Englishman swore the Jap unfolded a copy of the Tokio Nichi Nichi and began reading the latest sporting news from the Orient.

Swearing in the train corridor having failed, the Englishman took up a commanding position on the steps and began addressing the whole world.

"Blankety-blank it all," he began, and Lady Cecil put her hands to her ears, "how in 'ell can you organize a League of Nations if you can't even organize a place to sleep? How can you, I ask?"

Nobody answered, but all the travelers cheered. Someone blew a whistle, the train began to pull out and no one knows whatever happened to that particular English, except that he didn't arrive in Geneva next morning.

The battle was renewed at 8 o'clock next morning when the train reached Bellegarde, the French customs station on the Swiss frontier. Everyone was invited to descend for breakfast in the little railway station. Then the strife began.

"Waiter," shouted Lord Robert Cecil, banging his fist down on an uncovered wooden breakfast table to emphasize his remarks, "I ordered two cups of coffee thirty minutes ago and thus far I have only one spoon."

"Oh, it'll be there—now don't get excited," replied a white-aproned individual who was mopping some spilled chocolate off the next table, and Lord Robert drew his head down into his big gray overcoat and sighed.

"I said tea—not coffee," remonstrated the Maharajah of something, from India, speaking in both English and French.

"Difficult fellow," mumbled the waiter. "Ought to be glad he gets anything."

Only the Japs were quiet in the general commotion. They appeared highly amused.

The final stage was reached at Geneva two hours later when the Uruguayan minister to Madrid, who headed his country's delegation, discovered that a Swiss baggage man had run off with his grip containing his credentials.

"Terrible—terrible—terrible," he

moaned, after clashing with every uniformed employe at the station. "This country lives on tourists and the League of Nations. No one here to meet me and they steal my baggage. Terrible—terrible—terrible."

LONDON, Dec. 8.—A new plan of government for Mesopotamia announced by Andrew Bonar Law in the House of Commons today that the Arabs shall be governed by Arabs. While an electoral law for the creation of a representative Mesopotamian congress is being drafted, the country is to be administered by a council of state, composed of native dignitaries and subject to the guidance of the British high commissioner, Sir Percy Cox.

### PECAN TREES THRIVE IN IRRIGATED VALLEY

EL PASO, Texas, Dec. 8.—After years of experimenting, farmers in the irrigated valley near El Paso say they have found a pecan tree which grows luxuriantly in the valley's climate and soil. All attempts had been futile until this year. The nuts from the tree are of the paper-shell variety and this year's output, though small, is said to be of a rich flavor.

The fact that the scattered experimental trees did well proves, the farmers contend, that pecan trees, hitherto thought impossible in West Texas, can be grown in this territory. Farmers are planning to plant a number of the trees, feeling assured of success.

### LOVE FOR FIRST SWEETHEART, WHO JILTED HIM, LEADS YOUTH TO FACE TRIAL FOR MURDER

Strange Love Affair Begun at "Lake of the Broken Heart" Ends in Grim Tragedy When Girl Is Killed With a Razor.

ST. LOUIS, Dec. 8.—A hapless youth, confined in a cell in the city jail here is proving a strange problem to criminologists who are studying his case.

He is Albert Scott Ellis, twenty-one, confessed slayer of his first sweetheart, Edna Ellis, eighteen-year-old stenographer, because she persistently spurned his efforts to effect a reconciliation after their dance hall and summer resort romances had been shattered. The brutal manner in which the girl was slashed to death with a razor and the youth of her slayer have made the case a sensation in St. Louis police annals.

When one sits and talks with Ellis in his cell in the jail it is difficult to believe that this quiet, sad-faced youth could have committed such a horrible crime as the one with which he is charged. There is nothing of the hard, cold criminal or thug about him. He is not a tough or a gangster, but seemingly a normal youngster, with a deep love for his home and his mother and an overwhelming desire to have her constantly with him.

Ellis is charged with and has confessed to the murder of his sweetheart on the night of November 5. They had quarreled and when he found that all his efforts to "make up" were useless he wanted for her near a vacant lot she was in the habit of passing on her way home from work in North St. Louis and slashed her throat with a razor. Two days later he was arrested and when confronted with the evidence signed a confession admitting the crime.

It was in October, 1918, that Ellis met his sweetheart. He had just learned to dance and she was his first "girl." "I will never forget the date," he said, in talking of his love affair, which terminated with such tragedy.

Neither will he ever forget, he declared, the place Creve Coeur Lake. But Ellis didn't know that Creve Coeur Lake, translated, means "lake of the broken heart," or "lake of sorrow." It seems an ominous coincidence that many of the romantic evenings of these youthful lovers should have been spent at the "lake of the broken heart" before their own youthful hearts were broken by a series of minor circumstances resulting in the breaking of their engagement, and that the final effort of the youth to patch things up before the tragic evening of November 5 should have been made at the "Lake of Sorrow."

The occasion of their meeting was a church picnic at the resort and Ellis, struck by Edna's beauty, asked permission to dance with her.

"I fell in love with her right away," he said. "I took all the rest of her dances that evening, took her home, and made an engagement to take her to another dance. She became my first 'steady' girl. She didn't go with any other boys and I didn't go with any other girls."

Ellis wept while telling of his proposal to Edna. "We talked about getting married," he said. "I was boarding at her home. It was her birthday, September 28, 1919, after we came home from a dance. We always went to dances. We spent every Sunday afternoon and evening dancing and lots of week evenings. I had saved \$18 and had bought a little diamond ring in a pawnshop. That night I asked her point blank to marry me. She said she would. I was driving a truck and earning \$4.00 per day, but soon after that my employer told me all the soldiers were coming back from France, making labor cheaper, and he would have to reduce my wages to \$15 a week. I worked for a time for this, but I began getting in debt and soon owed Edna's mother a board bill."

Ellis worked around at different jobs, getting constantly deeper in debt and "hard up," he said. Then one day his mother went to Edna's home seeking a little electric motor which she said had disappeared from her house. She thought Albert might have taken it.

"Edna's mother thought I was a thief and made me leave her house," Ellis said. "She told me never to come back and that she would rather see Edna dead than married to me. I told her I intended marrying Edna anyway. The next day my parents found the motor they suspected me of stealing."

But the incident had broken his courtship and try as he might his sweetheart refused to accept him. When he persisted in his efforts he said he was told by friends that Edna was going to have someone "get him," and he worried so much over it that he was afraid to stay out late or travel dark streets.

Finally he determined to see his former sweetheart once more. He cannot explain why he carried the razor, but swears he had no intention of killing the girl he still madly loved.

Ellis hovered about the corner where he knew she would leave a street car on her way home from work about 6 o'clock, he said in his confession. But he worked overtime that night and did not start home until 8 o'clock. Some time between 8 and 9, Ellis met her near a vacant lot within a block and a half of her home.

"I told her I wanted to speak to her," he said, "but she ran across the lot. I can after he, grabbed her by the wrist and demanded that she tell me who was going to 'get' me. She just answered 'mind your business,' and pushed me away with both hands. I lost my temper and struck out with both fists, hitting her in the eyes. She fell down, but got up and grabbed me. Somehow she got her hand on the razor in my vest pocket. I grabbed for it, too. Then she grabbed it with both hands and I gave it a jerk. The blade was pulled through her hands. The blade broke and the handle fell to the ground. She cried, 'Al, you cut me.' Then I lost control of myself—I slashed right and left and she fell. Then I ran and she called, 'Al, don't run.'"

Ellis recited in detail how he washed his hands of the blood on them, grabbed a car and went home. The next evening he called on a friend, discussed the killing of Edna Ellis casually and played cards. Eighteen hours later he was in the hands of the police and under a "third degree" examination which brought forth his confession.

### UNEMPLOYMENT ON INCREASE IN TEXAS, SAYS LABOR OFFICIAL

AUSTIN, Texas, Dec. 8.—There is considerable unemployment in Texas and the number of men out of work is steadily increasing, according to George W. Slater, president of the State Federation of Labor, who said that "unskilled laborers are being harried hit than the craftsmen. A noticeable thing, he said,

is that when men are being laid off on jobs requiring skilled workmen, the higher priced men are retained while those less skilled are let go. Texas is more fortunate than some of the northern states, according to Mr. Slater, inasmuch as Texas workmen are more versatile. When mills and shops in the North close down, he said, and throw men out of their regular work most of them know nothing else to do. There is less specializing in work in Texas, he continued, and Texas workmen go from one occupation to another as the demands vary.

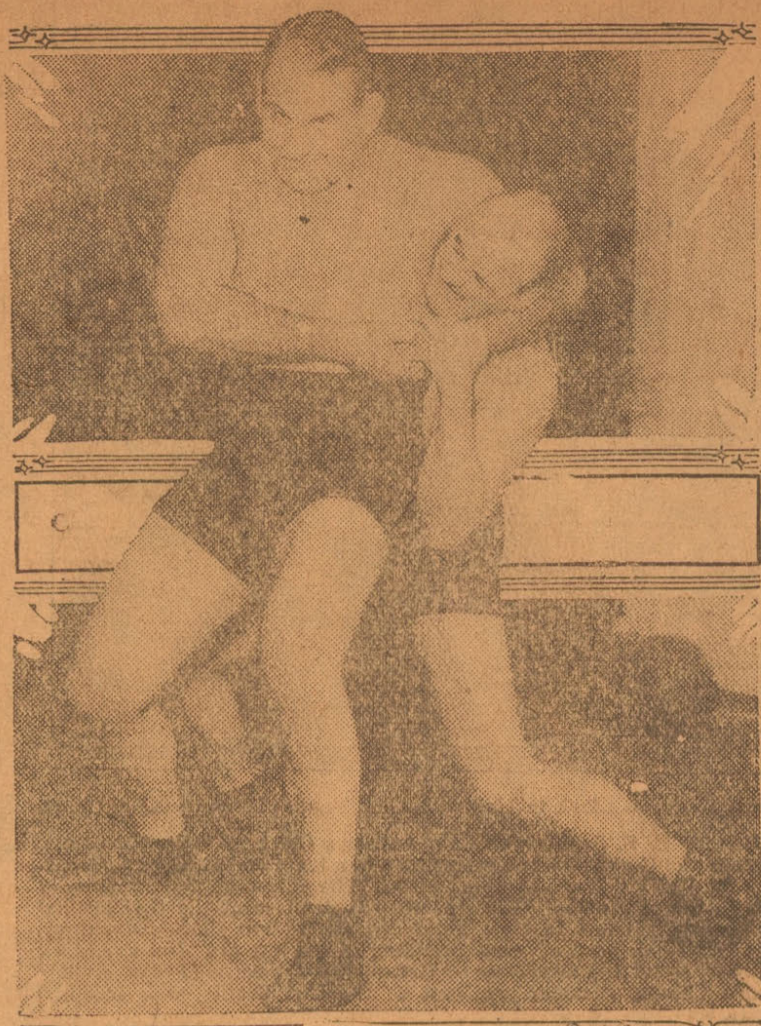
## Want Tris to Referee Bout in Panther City

## Lloyd George Pessimistic on Foreign Trade

COLCHESTER, Eng., Dec. 8.—Premier Lloyd George said in a letter he sent the other day to the Mayor of Colchester that he was afraid Great Britain was faced with a difficult economic period and that "we shall have to meet growing foreign competition and growing unemployment. That we shall succeed in surmounting the difficulties I am sure, but only if the nation grapples with them in the same spirit in which

it grappled with the problems of the war."

J. H. Thomas, secretary of the National Union of Railway Men, and a Labor Member of Parliament, wrote: "Nothing is so fatal as the doctrine of doing as little as possible in order to find work for others. I think we shall recover from our present difficulties if for six months we have the spirit of 1914 again. Let us frankly recognize that both the employers and men are something to each other and both have to be together. I don't despair of the future. We are going to pull through."

All peace-time records for the men were broken when 17,025 men enlisted in the United States army during October.

## ARGENTINE'S TRADE BALANCE MOUNTING AT RAPID RATE

BUENOS AIRES, Dec. 8.—Argentina's foreign trade during the past six years has given the country a favorable balance of approximately \$1,400,000, according to figures just compiled. This exceeds the entire favorable trade balance built up in the history of the country as an independent nation before 1915. The favorable balance reached its height in 1919 when it amounted to \$375,000,000, while estimates place the balance for the present year at about \$100,000,000.

Foreign trade for the present year, it is estimated, will reach \$2,000,000,000. Until the present year the highest figure reached was in 1919 when the country's foreign trade amounted to \$1,700,000,000.

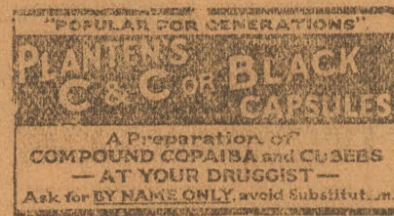
## WALKING ARSENAL TRAILS HER HUSBAND

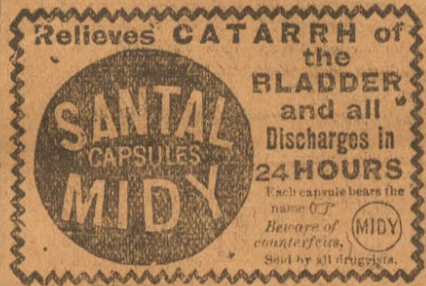
