





the best way possible. With three day ing escapes already to his credit and with a career of outlawry that has placed his name in the list of the most cold-blooded of his kind, Ben Cravens has not given up, although he is nearly sixty years old. Escaped from Lansing.

Cravens escaped from the Kansas State penitentiary at Lansing in 1900 with the use of a tinfolled wooden re-volver. He had been sentenced to that prison in 1896 for twenty years for high way robbery, committed at Elgin, Kan Cravens stole a handsome sorrel sta lion from a Kansas farmer and rod him 100 miles, the animal falling from exhaustion. "That was the finest and pluckiest horse I ever saw," declared Cravens later. In running from the prison Cravens was struck on top of his head by a bullet which lodged there.

After the stallion dropped dead, Cra-vens worked awhile shucking corn, and watching his opportunity to get anoth horse, he finally reached this county TI bullet was still lodged on the top of hi head and be compelled an Oklahom ranchman, an old acquaintance, to cut i out with a razor. The surgical operation was performed while Cravens held a six ooter in order to force the ranchman complete the job.
