Unless some scheme can be devised to satisfy the Texas & Pacific officials, the new passenger station will not be built before spring, due to the objections they raise to a section of the city charter. It is said that a portion of the

It is said that a portion of the wording was left out of this section when it was printed and it allows the city control of buildings in public streets. The city sent an attorney to Austin to confer with the attorney general as to how the objectionable features could be removed by amend-ment, and that department has ruled that the amendment cannot be made until next April, when the city will ment, and that department ment, and that department that the amendment cannot be made until next April, when the city will be two years old. This decision was given under a state law which sets out that city charters cannot be out charters cannot be out that city charters cannot be out that city charters cannot be out charters cannot be amended except once every two years. The attorney general's department ruled that the law applied to cities where a charter has been in effect less than two years. Under the con-ditions the railroad company refuses to accept fifteen feet of Commerce street which they need before they street which they need before they will have space to erect the station. REFUSE ALL OFFERS.

KEFUSE ALL OFFERS. The city commission has offered every plan that it can think of to cure the objections but they have all been refused. Their last offer was to pass an ordinance to lessen the width pass an ordinance to lessen the width of Commerce street for the necessary number of feet. This offer has not been entirely refused by the legal department of the railroad, but it is doubted that it will be accepted.

In the past the city has granted several franchises under the charter as it now exists and no objections have been reised, and on a former occasion the fifteen feet of Commerce street was given the Texas & Pacific under this plan. At that time they accepted the land without question, but because the station was not built within a set time the franchise was revoked.

MILAN, Italy, Dec 2 .--- Gabriele D'Annunzio, military dictator of Fiume, is threatening to make a formal declaration of war against Italy. if the Rome government upholds General Caviglias' blockade of Fiume, said dispatches from Fiume to-

day. D'Annunzio has sent wireless instructions to the representatives of his government at Rome to return to Fiume tomorrow, unless the Ital-ian government backs down.

General Caviglias, commander of the government troops in Istria, that are blockading Fiume, has warned his legionaires to retire 'from the islands of Arbe and Dglia which were recently seized in defiance of Rome's wishes.

MILAN, Dec. 2 .- During a demoustration by Italian warships off Fiume, Gabriele D'Annunzio's troops fired upon the warships with rifles, said a dispatch received from Fium? today. The transport, Cctellazzo, of D'Annunzio's fleet, is reported to have sunk at the entrance to the Fiume harbor.
