## DAMAGE BILL OF DOWNTOWN FIRE \$90,000

Flames Take Mission Gar- Commissioner A. Davenport age and Damage Ading Building.

Twenty-eight automobiles, the Mission CITY DEPARTMENT HEAD garage building and its equipment and considerable damage from fire and water in the adjoining building were the losses resulting from the destruction of the garage by flames starting from a gasoline tank explosion at 3:40 p. m. yesterday.

The garage building and its contents, mechanical equipment, vulcanizing plant

and accessories were almost a complete In the adjoining building, the T. velers hotel, which occupied the second floor, the Piggly Wiggly grocery and the Cherry Blossom confectionery were bad-ly damaged by fire and water. The combined loss is placed at \$80,000 to \$90,000,

partially covered by insurance. R. M. Bailey, a mechanic employed in the repair department of the garage, was badly burned about the hands and arms. The fire, according to Bailey, started directly behind where he was working. He made an effort to smother the flames with his hands, causing his burns. The Elks' club, which is located about

twenty feet west of the burned build ing, was threatened for several minutes.

D. E. Patton, who owned a vulcanizing plant in the garage and who was in the building at the time, said that the fire started toward the rear of the building.



HEAVY RAINS FALL

Some hail has accompanied the rains but little or no damage has been done.

#### WASHINGTON, May 11 .- While advices from Mexico on the revolutionary situation are fragmentary and conflicting, they cast considerable doubt on the reports that President Carranza has been made prisoner. A Vera Cruz dispatch from the newspaper El Dictamen, member of The Associated Press, bearing Monday's date, declared that the fugitive president, who was making an effort to reach Vera Cruz, had broken through the revolutionary lines and was standing at bay with 4,000 men at San Marcos,

twenty-seven miles north of Puebla. On the other hand, revolutionary leaders along the border are still claiming that Carranza has been taken, saying that

he was captured near Apizao, Hidalgo. It appears, however, even presupposing the accuracy of reports that Carranza is at liberty, that his situation, according

to Vera Cruz advices, is precarious. It is reported that troops at Vera Cruz commanded by General Aguilar, governor of state, have deserted, making Vera Cruz apparently no longer safe for Carranza.

In adition, the revolutionary forces under Generals Hill and Trevino, are reported closing on Carranza near San Other reports declared that General Aguilar, Carranza's

son-in-law, has been killed in fighting in Vera Cruz state. All Mexico, with the exception of a few localities, notably the state of Yucan, Campeche and Chiapas, is declared to be in the hands of revolutionists. The overturn of the Carranza government has been effected with little bloodshed.

New Ruler Next. WASHINGTON, May 11 .- With practically all of Mexico dominated by the revolutionists and President Carranza reported a prisoner, interest here turned from military to

expected political developments. Defacto agents profess belief that immediate steps will be taken toward the establishment of a provisional government, to be succeeded as soon as possible by a constitutional regime.

Reports through official channels and revolutionary agents continue to indicate the absence of serious disorders, although the dispatch of a battleship and additional destroyers to southern waters suggested determination of the United States to afford foreigners protection in the event of serious trouble at Mexican ports.

While officials here considered the revolutionary movement as too untried for judgment, the impression is manifest that for a time at least it would not have to face the usual counter revolution by various rebel leaders which formerly operated in Mexico.




