PENITENTIARY INVESTIGATION SWITCHED

CAVERN CLOSES IN ON VICTIM, HOPE FAILING

Floyd Collins Will Be Taken Out of Cave by Kentucky, But May Be Dead.

CAVE CITY, Ky., Feb. 5.—Dead or alive, Floyd Collins, 35, explorer, will be taken from Sand Cave, where he has now been imprisoned more than 100 hours...

That's my last trip," he declared. "I'd never come out alive if I tried it again. I couldn't even get my hand through the opening that is left."

The only means of reaching Collins, according to engineers on the ground, is through a new shaft which must be sunk immediately above Collins and driven through a hill of solid sandstone.

The rescuers almost had Collins out yesterday morning; just a few seconds and a few more inches and he would have been drawn to safety.

Collins was left imprisoned in an aperture judged to be about twenty feet long, about a yard wide and a yard high. Behind him is believed to be a pit forty feet deep which leads to no one knows where, so that the prisoner probably has air.

Increased production through the contest will probably result in a higher production demand in after years, it was intimated at the governor's office.

LAWYERS WANT NEW COURT OF CIVIL APPEALS

Eastland County Bar Association Adopts Resolutions of Approval.

At a meeting of the Eastland County Bar association, presided over by President H. P. Brelsford, a resolution asking the senator and representatives from this district to give the bill now pending before the legislature to establish a court of civil appeals at Eastland, their support was adopted.

Whereas, the plan and policy of the creation and maintenance of courts of civil appeals, as prescribed by the constitution, is to locate such courts as conveniently as practicable to the litigants having business in such courts; and

Whereas, since the year 1918 the volume of the appellate court business in the Second supreme judicial district at Fort Worth, Texas, has so greatly exceeded the capacity of that court that a sufficient number of cases appealable to said Fort Worth court from Eastland, Stephens and other contiguous counties to employ an additional court of civil appeals has been transferred to El Paso and other appellate courts far distant, thus working an intolerable hardship on litigants and attorneys; and

Whereas, there is now pending in the legislature of the state of Texas a bill to create an additional court of civil appeals, to be located at Eastland, Texas; and

Whereas, the City of Eastland is the most centrally located and accessible point to the far greater part of the litigation arising within the proposed district;

FEATURES IN TEXAS CHILD LABOR LAW NOW PENDING

AUSTIN, Feb. 5.—A state child labor law was passed finally in the house, Wednesday, after a lengthy debate over amendments.

Children under fifteen years of age were singled out in the bill as being entirely out as employees in any factory, mill, workshop, laundry or theater and their employment as messengers in cities of more than fifteen thousand persons was forbidden.

Children under twelve years would only be allowed to work for the family benefit with the permission of a county judge upon a written statement from the parents.

SHERIFF FEARS MOB VIOLENCE FOR PRISONER

Accused Man in La Grange Tragedy Spirited Away to Avert Lynching.

LAGRANGE, Texas, Feb. 5.—Fears of mob violence by scores of citizens enraged by the brutal slaying of Valeria Zapalac, 17-year-old school girl, and attack on her sister, Minna, aged 15, by William H. Langhorn Jr., 25, who is charged with the crime, was spirited from the Fayette county jail early today and taken to a distant part of the state for safe keeping.

Dozens of persons were coming in town all morning and feeling against the prisoner appeared to be running high, Sheriff William Loesch told the United Press. Threats against the man's life were becoming quite general, the sheriff said.

The two sisters, Valeria and Minna, were taken for an automobile ride by Langhorn, whom they had known for several weeks. They had attended a basket ball game at the LaGrange school Tuesday night and accepted an offer for a ride to their home. Valeria was shot four times after she interfered with an attack on her sister, crawled into the car seat and died.

Parents visit jail but do not see their son.

LA GRANGE, Feb. 5.—Langhorn's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Longhorn of Chappell Hill, came to LaGrange Wednesday but were not allowed to visit their son. A special session of the county grand jury has been called for Monday Strict precaution will be taken to guard the prisoner at that time. Langhorn had lived in LaGrange but a short time.

LOCKHART, Feb. 5.—W. H. Longhorn Jr., accused of killing Theresa Zapalac and injuring her sister Minnie, is in the Caldwell county jail here.

LICENSES FOR ALL MOTOR CAR DRIVERS PROPOSED

AUSTIN, Feb. 5.—Licensing of all auto and other motor vehicle operators on state highways under the supervision of the state highway department would be compulsory, in a bill introduced by Senator Pierce of Johnson county.

Children under sixteen years of age would be prohibited from driving motor vehicles on the road and minors above sixteen would have to supply signed statements of approval from their parents or guardian to get their licenses.

Violations of the law would result in suspension of driving license of thirty days for the first, not more than sixty days for second and not more than 12 months for the third violation.

CHICAGO, Feb. 5.—Obeying the order from Police Chief Morgan A. Collins to "shoot to kill," police today shot and killed Arthur Falenstein when they caught him holding up a taxi driver.

Falenstein later was identified in connection with other recent robberies. He was surprised by the "flirver" squad and fell before the bullets of the officers at their first volley.

STATE AID FOR RURAL SCHOOLS RECOMMENDED

Rural School Supervisor Approves Sums for Eastland County Districts.

Frank Van Winkle, rural school supervisor for the state department of education, who has just completed a tour of inspection of the Eastland county rural schools, has recommended that state aid to the amount of \$15,000, be granted to such schools of the county as meet the requirements of the state.

Last year 40 schools received state aid. This year only 28. Two of the schools are self-supporting and the others failed to vote sufficient tax or did not meet other requirements.

With the state aid that has been recommended, the schools receiving it will be able to have six months terms, while without it many of them would have been cut short and at least two of them would have had to close within the next few days.

Williamson County Sheriff Agrees To Resign and Leave

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Feb. 5.—Sheriff George Galligan will give up his duties as law enforcement officer of Williamson county and leave the county without unnecessary delay and remain away until it is agreed that conditions are such as to permit his return.

This was agreed upon at a conference between Governor Small, the attorney general and adjutant general with Sheriff Galligan and five members of Williamson county board. The action was taken in an effort to bring peace in "bloody Williamson county" the scene of many outbreaks.

Galligan agreed to turn over his duties to Deputy Sheriff Randall G. Parks. He also agreed to revoke all outstanding special deputy warrants except those of regular deputy sheriffs authorized by the county board and those of watchmen of Williamson county.

BURKETT TELLS WHY HE DID NOT ACCEPT HIGHWAY CHAIRMANSHIP

Senator Joe Burkett, who returned last night from Austin, said this morning that he would accept the appointment as member of the state highway commission for the four-year term as had been offered him by Governor Ferguson.

Senator Burkett said he was offered the chairmanship of the commission, which carried with it a two-year term, but preferred to accept the four-year term without the chairmanship, as the latter is a longer term, does not require nearly so much of his time and pays the same salary.

PRISON PROBE CENTERING ON MORAL ISSUE

Committee Returns to Investigation of Charges Presented About Week Ago.

AUSTIN, Feb. 5.—Charges of immorality involving a former prison commissioner for alleged trafficking in prison privileges was scheduled for hearing by the joint prison investigating committee here today. The trend of the investigation was revealed at a preliminary meeting of the committee yesterday, when further hearing was postponed until today at the request of Edward A. Berry, Houston attorney and chairman of the state democratic executive committee, who asked that his client, W. H. McKnight, be permitted to appear before the committee.

Mrs. James Cade, wife of a prisoner in the penitentiary, was expected to take the stand and testify today. Cade is alleged to have been made a trusty at Huntsville, after his wife had submitted to intimate relations with a former prison commissioner. In a statement given out here, Mrs. Cade said she would "bare her life and tell everything."

AUSTIN, Feb. 5.—Testimony that she had improper relations at a Houston hotel in August and November with H. L. McKnight, at that time a member of the state prison board, was given to the prison investigating committee today by Mrs. Jennie Cade.

"I believed that he could and would get my husband out of prison," said Mrs. Cade.

Two Visits To Houston. Manager Gary Arnold of the hotel was questioned and testified that "Jennie Cade and H. L. McKnight registered within 10 minutes of each other, Aug. 26, and were assigned to rooms adjoining."

She also said that Mrs. King's statements and the rumors connecting her with McKnight were untrue. "I didn't tell them the truth. I came down here to tell the truth," she testified today.

Mrs. Cade went to Houston at McKnight's suggestion, according to her story. He told her that Governor Neff was to be in Houston Aug. 27, and that he would introduce her to Neff. She registered at the hotel to which McKnight had directed her and after getting lunch went to her room, she said. Afterwards McKnight told her he decided it wouldn't be a very good policy to make her acquainted with the governor at that time, so he returned to Huntsville the next morning.

When she returned to Houston in November she registered as Mrs. Mary Hogan, she said. A woman friend accompanied her to Houston. Mrs. Cade said she went to the room occupied by McKnight and stayed an hour or two.

She said that her husband was serving a term of five years for manslaughter and that she followed to be near him. Soon after her arrival in Houston, Cade was transferred to the Ferguson prison farm and she remained in Huntsville and worked as a servant in a hotel. She said that Mr. Coleman of Huntsville and Captain Spear advised her recently to make affidavits to the effect that the rumors were not true. Coleman told her that she was going to ruin McKnight and herself if the affidavits were not made.

She married Cade eight years ago, she said, having previously been a nurse and school teacher, and they had lived on a ranch prior to Cade's conviction for manslaughter.

Representative T. K. Irwin at one time threatened to quit questioning Mrs. Cade if the doors of the committee room were closed. The suggestion had been made that the doors be closed to keep out noises from the hall.

H. F. TANNER PLANNING TO DRILL DEEP TEST FOR OIL

H. F. Tanner of Eastland is making plans to drill a deep test for oil and gas in Gaines county where he has 30,000 acres under lease. He plans to begin actual operations about May 1.

Mr. Tanner's acreage is near Seminole and includes land on which a water well is making gas by heads from a depth of 111 feet. This well, Mr. Tanner states, was drilled about six months ago and has been making gas continuously ever since.

REALTORS BONDING BILL INDEFINITELY POSTPONED

AUSTIN, Feb. 5.—Smothered under amendments and bearing battle scars from more than half a dozen voted down, the senate realtors bill, by Senator Stuart, was laid upon the table in the senate under indefinite postponement after a hectic session last Tuesday.

The main trend of the bill was to require real estate operators to obtain an operating license, granted by a board to be set up, and to post bond to provide reliability.

The original bond of \$1,000 inserted in the bill was variously threatened by proposed amendments to be set at from \$10,000 to \$100,000, measures admittedly put forward to lead to destruction of the bill.

Senator John Bailey took the floor in a bitter arraignment of "under hand" attempts to kill the bill, urging members to vote outright for its defeat. Bailey termed the bill a plan to create a "trust wherein the little man who dabbles in real estate" would be removed from competition.

DIPHTHERIA EPIDEMIC AT NOME IS DECREASING

NOME, Alaska, Feb. 5.—The diphtheria epidemic seemed to be on a decline today. For 24 hours no new cases have been reported. Dr. Curtis Welch, the city health officer, said he was confident that further spread of the disease was growing less and less. He was continuing to administer the serum which arrived by dog-team last Monday, and which, although frozen when it reached here, appears yet to be very effective.

Dr. Welch said at least one million units of the anti-toxin were needed in Nome and the surrounding territory.

SENATE AMENDS AND PASSES WORTHLESS CHECK BILL

AUSTIN, Feb. 5.—Authors of worthless checks will be punished under a felony statute unless the script is redeemed within 30 days after issuance, according to the amended house bill which passed the senate today. Original draft of the bill calls for 10 days' notice, but 30 days was deemed necessary before prosecution by the senate.

MISSOURI PHYSICIANS MUST PROVE RIGHT TO PRACTICE

ST. LOUIS, Feb. 5.—Forty-five physicians were cited today to appear before the state board of health to show cause why their licenses should not be revoked.

This move is the last step towards the elimination of the diploma mill scandal which was exposed by a St. Louis newspaper more than a year ago.

FIGHT ON CONFIRMATION OF STONE CONTINUED

WASHINGTON, Feb. 5.—An eleventh hour sensation was sprung at the capitol today when the senate met to give final consideration to the nomination of Attorney General Stone to be a justice of the supreme court. Senator Norris, Nebraska, republican, made public a letter from Willis Sears, Nebraska republican, charging that he had been shadowed by government sleuths since he had been seen with Colonel James Owenby, Colorado promoter who is doggedly fighting against the appointment of Stone.

"I am quite sure this emanated from the department of justice or at least the department had cognizance of it," Sears wrote.

MRS. B. B. LILES DIES IN HOME AT COAHOMA

Friends in Ranger have received word of the sudden death a few days ago of Mrs. B. B. Liles, wife of Dr. Liles, who used to reside in Ranger and left here about three years ago. The family lived in Coahoma, Texas, where Mrs. Liles' death occurred. While in Ranger she was a valued member of the Presbyterian church and had many friends who will regret her passing.

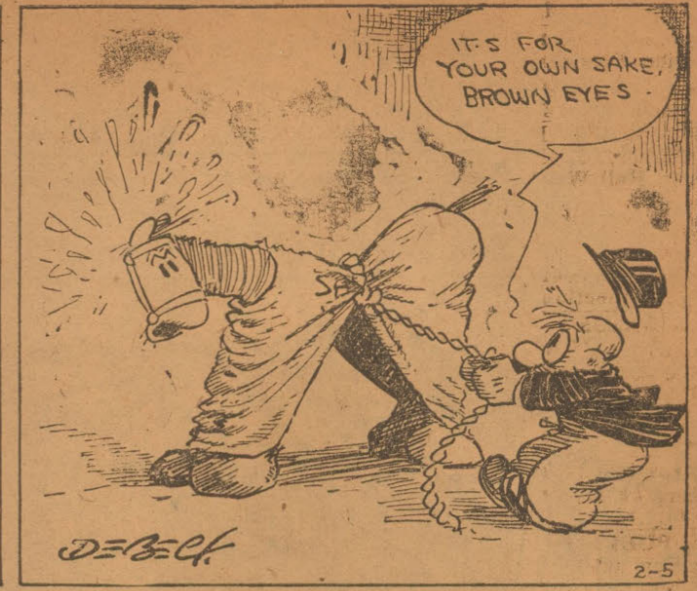
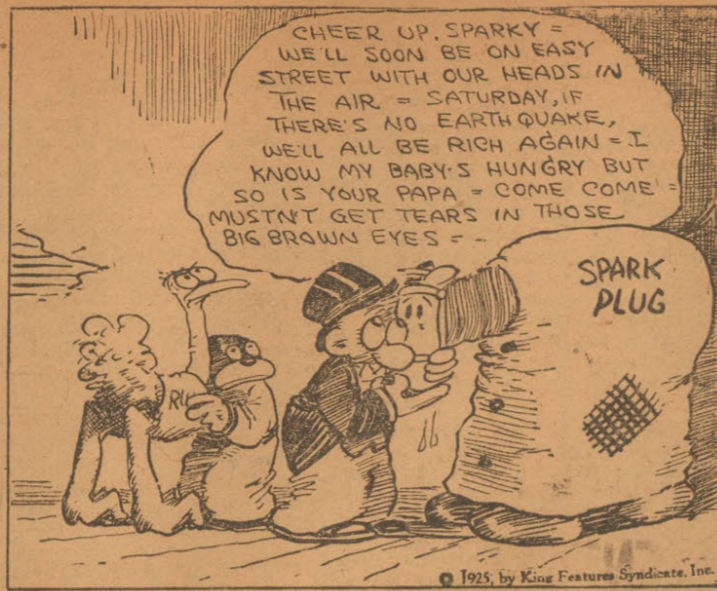
