## BURGLARS RAID MAY, BUT FALL INTO MISHAP

**Touch Off Alarm Which Arouses Citizens and They Escape Empty Handed**

An attempt to burglarize and plunder the stores in the town of May in Brown county and just across the Eastland-Brown county line, was thwarted last night when citizens, aroused by the sounding of a burglar alarm, which the robbers had stumbled onto in their work, arrived on the scene in time to prevent them getting away with a car which they had loaded with goods from the stores. The burglars were not captured.

According to information reaching the officers here, one of the stores of the town had been broken into and several hundred dollars worth of goods carried out and placed in a Ford touring car belonging to the robbers. And while they were burglarizing a second store an electric burglar alarm was touched by one of the burglars and no sooner had it sounded than citizens of the town began to arrive on the scene. One man arrived in time to tear some of the wiring loose on the burglars' car just as they were starting it to get away.

When the burglars, two in number, saw that they could not run their car they abandoned it and fled on foot toward Rising Star.

The car they were captured is said by officers here to have been registered in Eastland county. The license receipt No. is given as No. 6343, license No. 230657 and the engine No. 7474556. The name in which it was registered is given as John J. Howington and his address as Cisco.

## CURRENCY IN LARGE AMOUNT CARRIED WITH SAFETY IN RANGER

Fifty thousand dollars carried through the streets of Ranger in perfect security. This is a feat that would seem very difficult today in many of the large cities of the country, but it was accomplished without trouble in Ranger.

W. W. Housewright, active vice president of the Peoples State Bank, wired Monday to the Federal Reserve bank at Dallas for \$50,000 in currency, thinking it might be needed for emergencies. He did not specify how the money was to be sent, but supposed it would come by express. It had not arrived early Tuesday afternoon, and he was about to start a tracer after it when the janitor walked in with two packages marked "From the Federal Reserve Bank," placed them on the table. They were opened and contained \$50,000.

The money had been sent by registered mail, daylight run, and had been delivered to the janitor by post-office authorities who knew he was employed by the bank as its messenger to collect the bank's mail. The janitor signed for the money without knowing whether it was money or bonds; all he knew was it was valuable and must be guarded with care and he guarded it.

## EXTENSION OF LOAN TO PRISON SYSTEM SOUGHT

AUSTIN, Feb. 4.—A bill to extend for two more years a \$750,000 loan to the prison system by a Wichita, Kan., brokerage concern, was being prepared today for introduction into the senate and house. The loan was first floated four years ago. Because of the prison system's condition another extension was made by chairman of the senate finance committee and James E. Ferguson, according to Senator John Davis.

## ATTORNEY GENERAL NOW WORKING ON FERGUSON VINDICATION PROBLEM

AUSTIN, Feb. 4.—The next move remained with the senate hearing committee today in an effort to obtain from the attorney general's department an opinion on legal phases of the Ferguson vindication move. The first request of the committee was rejected by Attorney General Dan Moody on the grounds that it was insufficient. The committee then submitted a definite question about the validity of an "amnesty or pardon" statute.

Moody replied by letter to Chairman Lloyd E. Price of the committee that his department would forthwith make a preliminary investigation of available authorities in order to furnish the committee at an early date as possible such an answer as "we may be able to give the question." He added, however, that a copy of whatever bill the committee had agreed upon would be necessary in the consideration of the issue.

## FORBES AND THOMPSON SENTENCED TO BE PUNISHED

CHICAGO, Feb. 4.—Sentences of two years in the federal penitentiary and fines of \$10,000 each were imposed here today on Col. Charles R. Forbes, former head of the veterans' bureau, and John W. Thompson, St. Louis contractor, for conspiring to defraud the government in connection with bureau hospitalization contracts.

Federal Judge Carpenter rejected the motion for a new trial and immediately imposed sentence. The sentences are the extreme penalty provided for by law. A stay of sentence for 30 days was later granted in order to allow Forbes and Thompson to carry their appeal to the circuit court of appeals. In passing sentence Judge Carpenter bitterly denounced the two convicted men, aiming most of his shafts at Forbes who shook with emotion throughout the session of court.

## R. H. WORK, ACED FARMER, DIES AFTER SHORT ILLNESS

Funeral services for R. H. Work, 81, farmer residing northwest of Ranger, will be held tomorrow afternoon at Santo. The body will be taken to Santo this afternoon by Killingsworth-Cox funeral company.

Decedent died yesterday afternoon after a short illness and is survived by wife, Mrs. R. H. Work, and two sons and four daughters.

## NEW POSTAL SALARIES INCREASE BILL WRITTEN

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.—A new postal salaries increase bill was reported to the house today. The house postoffice committee working with amazing speed wrote increases in postal rates to raise \$60,000,000 in revenue enough to meet the president's approval and meet a salary increase of \$88,000,000, according to Representative Kelley of Pennsylvania, postal bill champion, substituting this bill for the one adopted by senate which incurred the disapproval of both the house and president Coolidge.

## FOUR BOOZE CARS, TWO DRIVEN BY WOMEN, NOW COMING TOWARDS TEXAS

DALLAS, Feb. 4.—Four liquor-laden cars, two of them driven by women, were reported en route to Dallas from New Orleans today. The machines carry a cargo of 150 cases, they were advised. Other advices said the booze was smuggled ashore from a vessel at the mouth of the Mississippi. Police through Texas were warned to be on a lookout for the cars.

## LA GRANGE MAN FACES CHARGE OF KILLING GIRL

LA GRANGE, Feb. 4.—Charges of murder and assault to murder were filed today against William H. Longhorn Jr., 25, following the slaying of Valerie Zapalac, 17, La Grange school girl, and the brutal beating of her sister, Minnie, 15, on a highway eight miles from here late Thursday night. Feeling is running against the accused man, according to District Attorney Blondell, who told the United Press at noon today that Longhorn in a statement had confessed to the crime.

## "INFANT LUCRETIA BORGIA" MAY BE TELLING TRUTH

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 4.—Police investigating the amazing murder confessions of Alsa Thompson, 7-year-old girl, was pushed with renewed vigor today following developments which, according to authorities, lend color to the girl's story. Alienists who have examined the infant "Lucretia Borgia" declared in preliminary reports that the child's "confessions" that she killed three persons by poison might possibly prove "authentic."

On the strength of the report from authorities at Dauthin, Manitoba, that the twin sister of the baby suspected had died suddenly two years ago from "gastro enteritis," Capt. L. L. McClary of the Hollywood police stated today that a "thorough investigation" would be made.

## ERRORS CREEPING INTO STORY OF BANK CLOSING NOTED AND CORRECTED

The Peoples State Bank of Ranger was first organized by Llano people, J. C. Stribling and his associates, July 15, 1921. The officers were: J. C. Stribling, president; M. M. Moss, vice president; Clay Fowler, cashier; Gray Fowler, director, and Luth Raborn, director.

Later Ranger people interested included: C. E. May and John W. Thurman, and at yet later date other local people interested.

Money for the capital of the proposed Citizens State Bank, which was to take over and succeed the Peoples State Bank, \$50,000 was all subscribed and paid in, and the proposed new bank was to take over all local paper, but would not have assumed any of the liabilities of the old bank.

At the time of the organization of the Peoples State Bank, \$75,000 of its capital stock was deposited in the Llano National Bank at Llano, Texas, and designated as a depository of the bank. The other \$25,000 was deposited in the Rosenberg State Bank.

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# UNIVERSITY SENDING OUT MANY TEACHERS

### School of Education Makes Notable Advance in 34 Years.

(This is the eighth of a series of articles on the University of Texas written by Dr. W. M. W. Splawn, president.)

The work provided by the University of Texas for the professional education of teachers was begun in 1891 with one professor in charge, Dr. Joseph Baldwin, who had devoted many years to the study and the teaching of subjects relating to the profession of teaching. In 1897 Dr. Baldwin became emeritus professor, and Dr. William S. Sutton and Dr. A. Caswell Ellis were added to the education faculty.

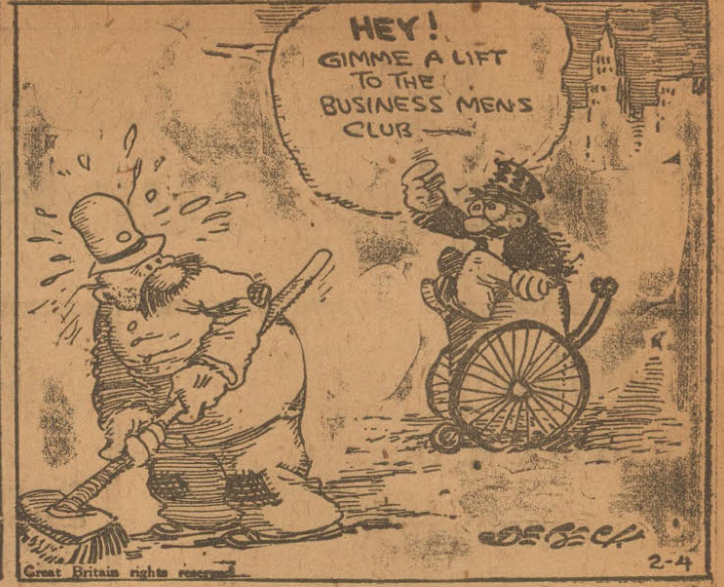
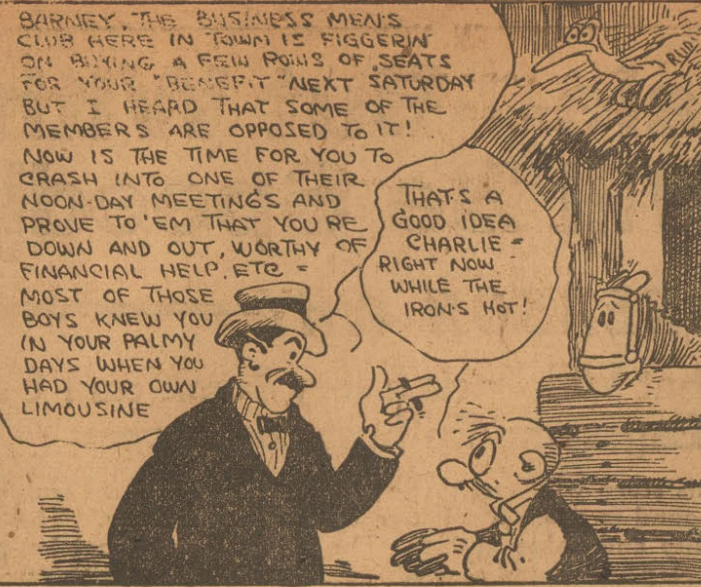
At the present time the school of education consists of a dean, who serves as a professor of educational administration, nine professors, five instructors, and twelve tutors and assistants.

#### Many Students Enroll.

During the year 1897-98 there were registered for education courses 91 students, while in the year 1923-24 the number had increased to 1248. During the intervening years many graduates who had made spe-

cial preparation for teaching were employed as teachers in elementary and high schools, as principals, as superintendents, as college professors, deans, and presidents. The record made by these ex-students of the university is the most convincing evidence of the value of the work that has been done by the faculty of the school of education and by the faculty of the college of arts. There has been a steadily growing demand on the part of the people of the state that the schools be improved, for they realize that the surest way to guarantee poor schools in any community is to put them in charge of superintendents and principals and teach-

ers of little scholarship and little professional training and insight. Another evidence of the growth of the university and of the state in the direction of higher standards, is that, while in 1897 there was no demand whatever for graduate instruction on the part of teachers, there are now in attendance upon the university some 35 students candidates for degrees higher than B. A., and who are prosecuting their major work in the school of education, and 25 other candidates for these higher degrees have each chosen education as a minor. It is altogether probable that, during the next summer session, which is conducted when teachers have their vacation, there will be 400 students who will be candidates for higher degrees, some of whom will be majoring, and others minor- ing, in education.

#### Service to State

The members of the education faculty have continuously assisted in developing throughout the state of Texas a sane and militant public opinion in regard to various and sundry problems relating to school progress. Much of their time has been devoted to the study of rural school questions, and they have, by attendance upon teachers' institutes and associations, by taking active part in such organizations as the Conference of Education, contributed in no mean way to the advancement of our schools. Perhaps the greatest service that the university has rendered to the state is its influence in raising the level as well as increasing the number of secondary schools, and in encouraging rational standards for the organization and administration of colleges and universities in this state.

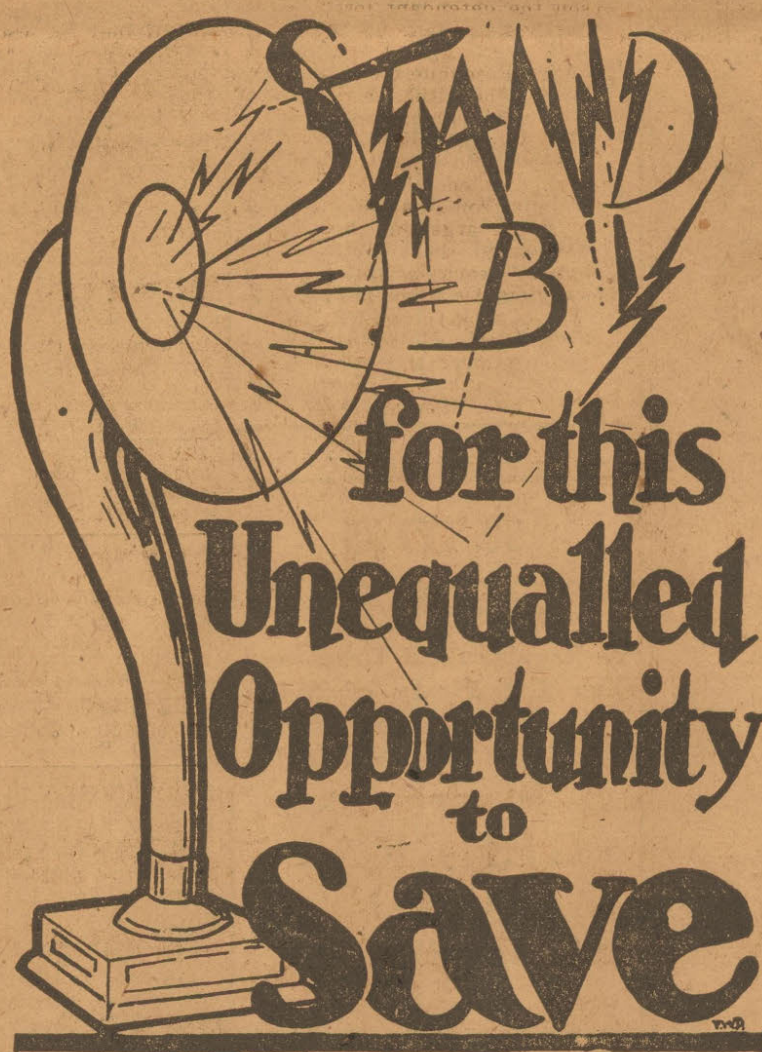

**Court Asked To Open To Consumers All Avenues Of Food Distribution**

**Urge Modification of Packers' Consent Decree in Interest of Public**

WHETHER the consuming public and producers of food articles shall have available all channels of food distribution is the question raised in proceedings recently instituted in the Supreme Court of the District of Columbia. The case involves the so-called packers' consent decree of 1920, under which five of the large packing companies agreed to cease handling certain commodities which are also handled by wholesale grocers.

Since the decree became effective certain growers and canners of fruits and vegetables who were not parties to it have asked to have it changed so that the packers could continue to market their products. These producers, cut off under the decree from distributing through the packers, maintain that distribution of their products to the public is now restricted to wholesale grocers. In other words, one well established and efficient method of reaching the consumer, number of growers and canners of important articles of food consumption.

Two wholesale grocers' associations have opposed any modification of the decree. But so strong has been the demand for a change that the Attorney General some time ago ordered a hearing before a government committee representing the Departments of Justice, Commerce and Agriculture, which decided that the question of modifying the decree should be decided by the court. Last May the Court of Appeals of the District of Columbia decided that the canners had the right to be heard on their request that the decree be modified. And in the pending case the Supreme Court is now asked to decide not only whether the decree should be modified, but also whether it should remain in effect at all. The public interest involved in



The case was significantly pointed out by the Court of Appeals which said:

If the charge... is true, that the wholesale grocers are using the decree against the packers to strengthen and build up a giant monopoly in their various and varied lines of business, there would seem to be demand for a searching inquiry as to whether or not the court is being used as an agency to restrain one monopoly and thereby promote, strengthen and build up another. Clearly it is not the policy of the Anti-Trust Act to accomplish this result. Nor will the decree of the court below, declaring the packers' combina-

tion illegal under the Anti-Trust Act, be sustained if its effect is to safeguard one public interest by the destruction of another.

One of the vital parts of the Consent Decree was a stipulation that it should in no way constitute an admission or finding that the packers in handling the distribution of these so-called unrelated lines were violating any law. Since the decree became effective it has been charged by those who oppose any change in it that the decree did imply such a violation. The packers maintain that such a charge is a violation of the terms of the decree itself and that, therefore, the decree should be annulled.

to Hollywood where he was found flirting with the girls. On cross-examination the witness Collie denied that he instead of the defendant, was the one involved and that the defendant lost much valuable time in keeping him out of trouble. Rodgers of the defense counsel, stated that he was not married, had never been married and never would be married. He also denied that he was a "tooth doctor" and advertised to extract teeth without pain.

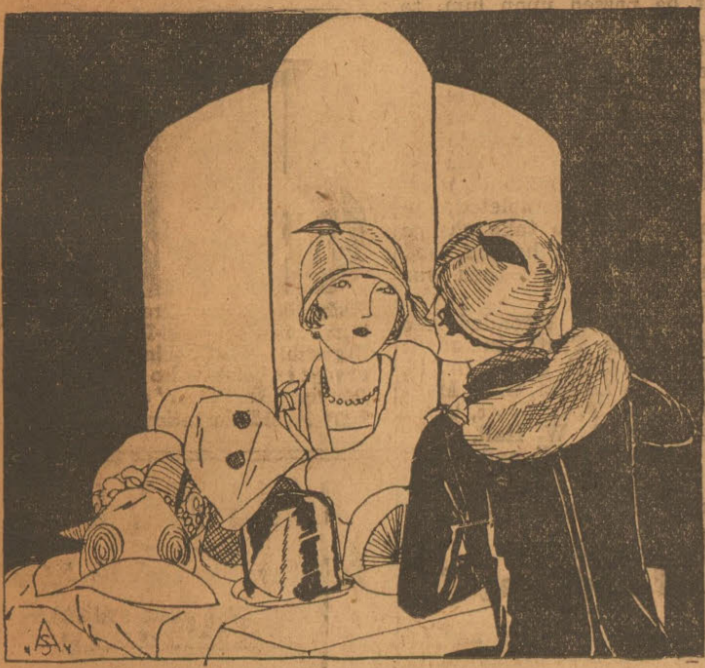

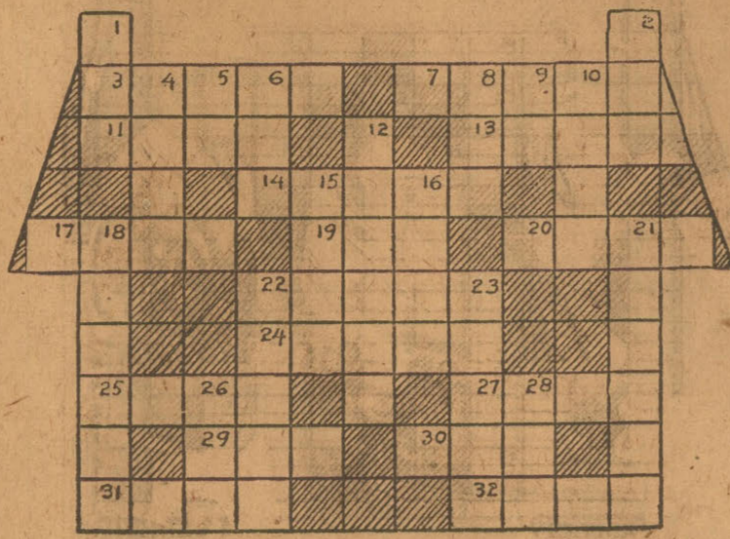

## THREE RECIPES FAVORITES IN MANY HOMES

### Mushrooms, Eggs and Shrimp Prepared in Appetizing Manner.

National dishes quite unknown to many housewives of this country will figure in a series of articles by Helen Harrington Dowling, director of home economics of the Calumet Baking Powder company, Chicago. This will be a series of foreign dishes, beginning this week with English recipes, followed by Norwegian, Russian, French, Swedish, Chinese and German recipes.

**Isle of Wight Mushrooms**—Select 12 mushrooms of medium size. Put in a frying pan 3 tablespoons of butter. When hot, lay in mushrooms, stems up. Sprinkle with salt and a little paprika. Fry slowly for 6 or 8 minutes. Turn and fry on other side until tender. Place thin slices of buttered toast on serving dish. Moisten each with 1 tablespoon of hot cream, lay mushrooms on toast, and surround with thinly cut, delicately browned bacon.

**Devonshire Eggs**—Boil 6 eggs—20 minutes. Remove shells and cut in halves. Mash yolks with a work until smooth and light—then add 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon paprika, 2 tablespoons finely minced ham, enough cream to moisten. Put mixture back between whites of eggs and press together. Lay in shallow baking dish and pour over them 1 cup thick tomato sauce or tomato soup. Sprinkle with bread crumbs and bits of butter. Bake in hot oven.

**Curried Shrimp**—1 small onion, 1 tablespoon salt, 2 tablespoons butter, 1 cup stock, 3 tablespoons grated cocoanut, 1 tablespoon curry powder, 1 cup shrimp, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, 1 cup boiled rice. Slice onion thin and fry a little in the butter. Stir in the cocoanut, curry powder, salt and stock, simmer for half an hour. Add shrimp, cooked, and lemon juice. Place rice in serving dish and pour over it the above mixture, very hot.
