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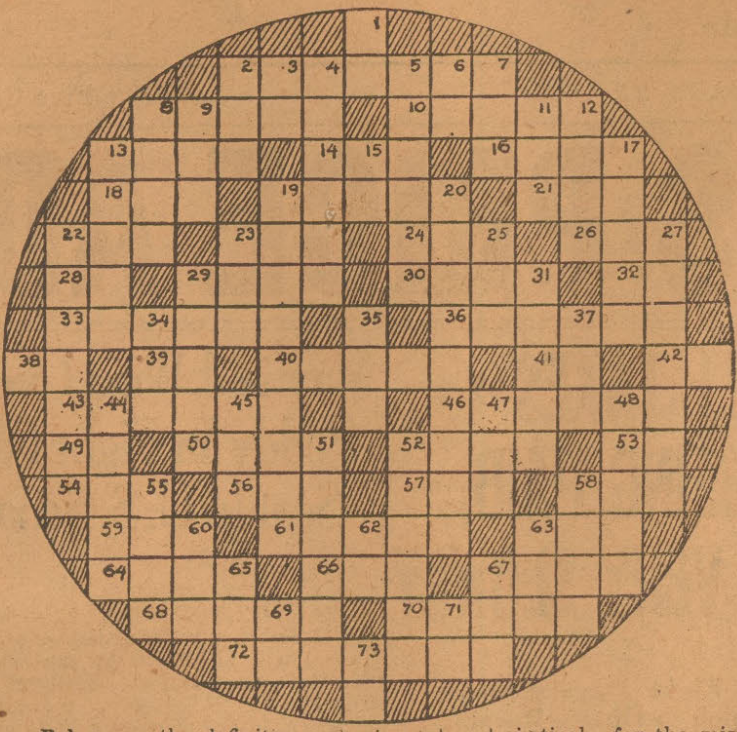

Curb Proposed On Prescriptions For Intoxicating Drams

AUSTIN, Jan. 22.—A knockout blow was aimed at the prescribing of liquor in Texas for other than purely medicinal purposes today. Stringent restrictions on the issuance and filling of prescriptions were contained in a bill introduced by Senators Price and Woodward today. The bill is in keeping with an outstanding demand of the democratic state platform.

Signed application with the prescription would be required setting forth full details of applicant's illness. The application would contain a statement that the applicant had not obtained liquor within 10 days previous before submitting the prescription. The application would be in duplicate copies to go to the district clerk and state comptroller's office.

Doctors issuing the prescriptions would be required to file with the officials a copy of the prescription and an affidavit that they had examined the patient and considered liquor necessary to the preservation of health. Druggists would be required to file reports on their liquor transactions with the district clerk each month.

Doctors before receiving permits to issue prescriptions would be required to obtain a character certificate from a county judge.
