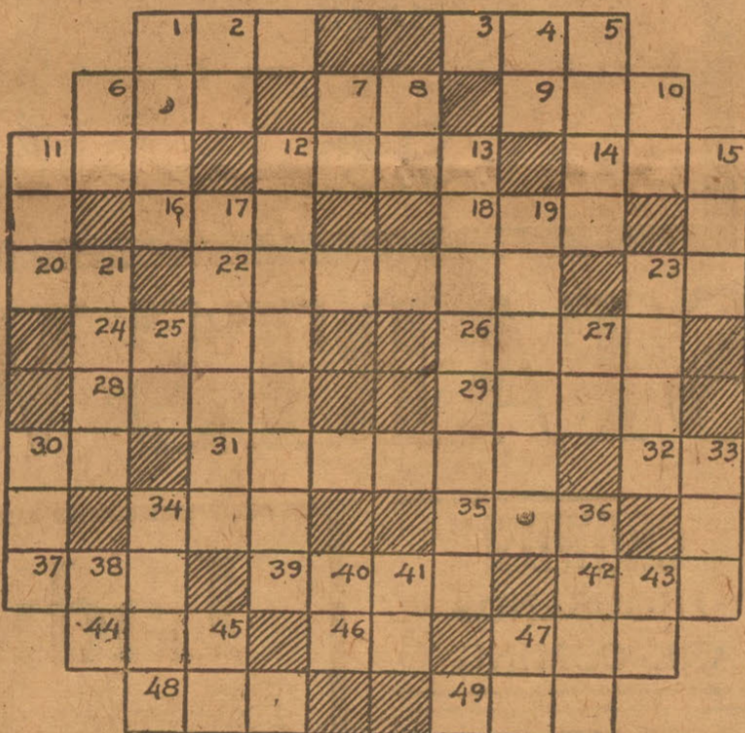

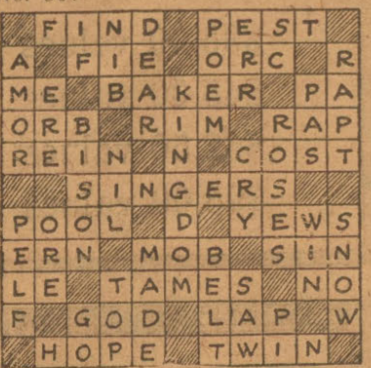

MUCH INTEREST IN FATE OF NEFF'S APPOINTEES

AUSTIN, Jan. 20.—Fate of the recess appointees of Governor Pat Neff under the Ferguson administration will probably be known shortly. The appointments were turned over to a senate committee and the future of the Neff appointees will be made known following an executive session.

Indications have been given that a fight will be made to retain R. B. Walthall on the board of control and Senator Wood of Seguin has served notice that he is in favor of maintaining W. W. Boyd as game, fish and oyster commissioner.

Considerable interest is centered upon the outcome of the Walthall appointment, as he was formerly private secretary to Governor Neff. Walthall was appointed a year ago and his term would nominally end in 1930. The post carries a salary of \$5,000 annually.

HEALTH CERTIFICATES MAY BE ASKED OF BRIDEGROOMS

AUSTIN, Jan. 20.—Certificates showing that persons planning to marry are not infected with venereal disease of any type would be required in event of adoption of a bill placed before the house by Representative W. P. Lane of Harris county.

HILL PROPOSES FUND TO DESTROY PRAIRIE PESTS

AUSTIN, Jan. 20.—Co-operation between the state of Texas and the federal government is called for in a bill prepared for introduction in the house by Representative B. L. Foster of Del Rio.

The measure calls for the appropriation of \$50,000 annually for two years to eradicate prairie dogs, gophers, wild cats and other carnivorous animals, which take a heavy toll from farmers and stockmen yearly. County commissioners would be em-

powered to distribute the eradication funds under direction of the department of agriculture and the state A. & M. college.

Foster also submitted a bill in the house similar to one placed before the senate by Senator Ben Berkely of El Paso authorizing salaried inspectors of the Texas cattle raisers association and the sheep and goat raisers association as peace officers to serve without pay. The bill provides that not more than twenty inspectors are to be authorized from the cattle raisers association and not more than seven from the sheep and goat raisers body.

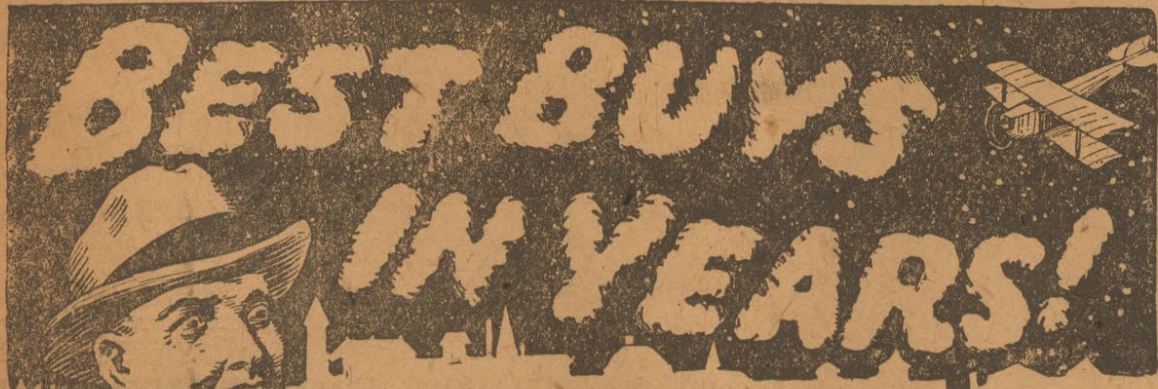

TEXAS Entire Stock Sacrificed

CARBON BLACK FROM OIL IS NOW POSSIBLE

Bureau of Mines Experiments Also Indicate Alcohol By-Product.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19.—The possibility of manufacturing carbon black from oils by an electrical process, which possesses advantages over present methods of making this important industrial material by incomplete combustion of natural gas, is indicated as the result of experiments conducted by the department of the interior at the Federal experiment station of the bureau of mines. Carbon black is a fluffy, finely divided black pigment produced by allowing the yellow flame of natural gas burning with an insufficient supply of aid to impinge against a cool metal surface. Carbon black is used extensively in the making of printers inks, as a filler in automobile tires, and in the manufacture of stove and shoe blacking, phonograph records, black leather, typewriter ribbons, carbon-copy papers, carriage cloths, oil-cloths, linoleum, black opaque photographic papers, celluloid cement, wall tints and colors, marking inks and pencils, and artificial tile.

In certain states the decreasing supply of natural gas, and drastic legislation against carbon black plants, have presented the question that would be economically justified by the increasing use of carbon black in the industries and the gradual rise in price for the better grades of black. At present, the black has to be shipped comparatively long distances to the chief markets, at freight rates that are high because of the bulkiness of the black.

In the course of investigations of the effects of high voltage electrical discharges on hydro-carbons, it was noted by the bureau of mines chemists that, under certain conditions, natural gas could be decomposed and carbon black produced. The effects of several types of electrical discharge on natural gas and on liquid hydro-carbons and other oils was therefore studied by J. J. Jakosky, associate engineer, in an effort to obtain the fundamental factors in the reactions. In the study of natural gas, the possible influence of these factors on the recovery of a larger part of the carbon content of the gas than is now possible was investigated.

Utilizing Cheap Power. In the manufacture of carbon black from oils, by the arc process developed by the bureau of mines, the two main essentials are a cheap electric power and cheap light-oil distillates. The process is suitable for intermittent or intermittent operation and could, therefore, utilize some of the cheap off-peak power available in practically all parts of the United States and in many foreign countries. Because of the abundance of cheap off-peak power in all large industrial centers, carbon black in many places can be manufactured where it is needed, with a considerable saving in freight rates alone. Especially will this be true as to certain eastern states and as to foreign markets. Prices for second-class power differ considerably with local conditions, but enough off-peak power is available in well-scattered regions of this country at prices ranging from 0.01 cent to 0.05 cent per kilowatt hour. Power in many foreign countries is considerably cheaper.

In connection with the electrical manufacture of carbon black by the bureau of mines process, it is probable that the unsaturated gases produced during the decomposition of the oil may constitute profitable by-products if utilized for the manufacture of alcohols. Noncondensable gases formed in connection with the process are suitable for domestic fuel and could probably be sold in those localities where a market exists for domestic gas, thus reducing the total net cost of producing carbon black.

Uses for Carbon Black. About 20 to 25 per cent of the present output of carbon black in the United States is used in printing and the allied industries. The rapid growth of the automobile industry has created an extensive market for carbon black as a toughener in rubber. Addition of carbon black as reinforcing agent has given greater elasticity and tensile strength to the rubber of rubber tires, and is said to have increased the mileage of 20 to 30 per cent. Approximately 30 to 35 per cent of the total output of carbon black in the United States is used in the rubber industry in the manufacture of automobile tires, hard rubber, electrical insulation, radio and auxiliary high-frequency and high-voltage equipment, and so forth.

About 15 to 25 per cent of the carbon black made in the United States is exported for use in the same industries as in this country. Large quantities go to England, France, and Germany for rubber compounding and to Japan and China for manufacture into "India" and other inks, paints, and enamels. Details of these experiments are described in technical paper 351, by J. J. Jakosky, copies of which may be obtained from the supervising engineer of documents, government printing office, Washington, D. C., at a price of 10 cents.

FIVE ALLEGED SINN FINN EXTREMISTS ARE ARRESTED

LONDON, Jan. 19.—Five men and a woman, charged with being Sinn Fein extremists and involved in a plot to blow up British battleships at Portsmouth were under arrest and being questioned here today. The five later were held for possible deportation. The motive for the alleged plot is believed to have been to stir up trouble between Great Britain and the Irish Free state. The arrests followed interception of letters. Two petty officers at the Portsmouth dock are among the five involved.

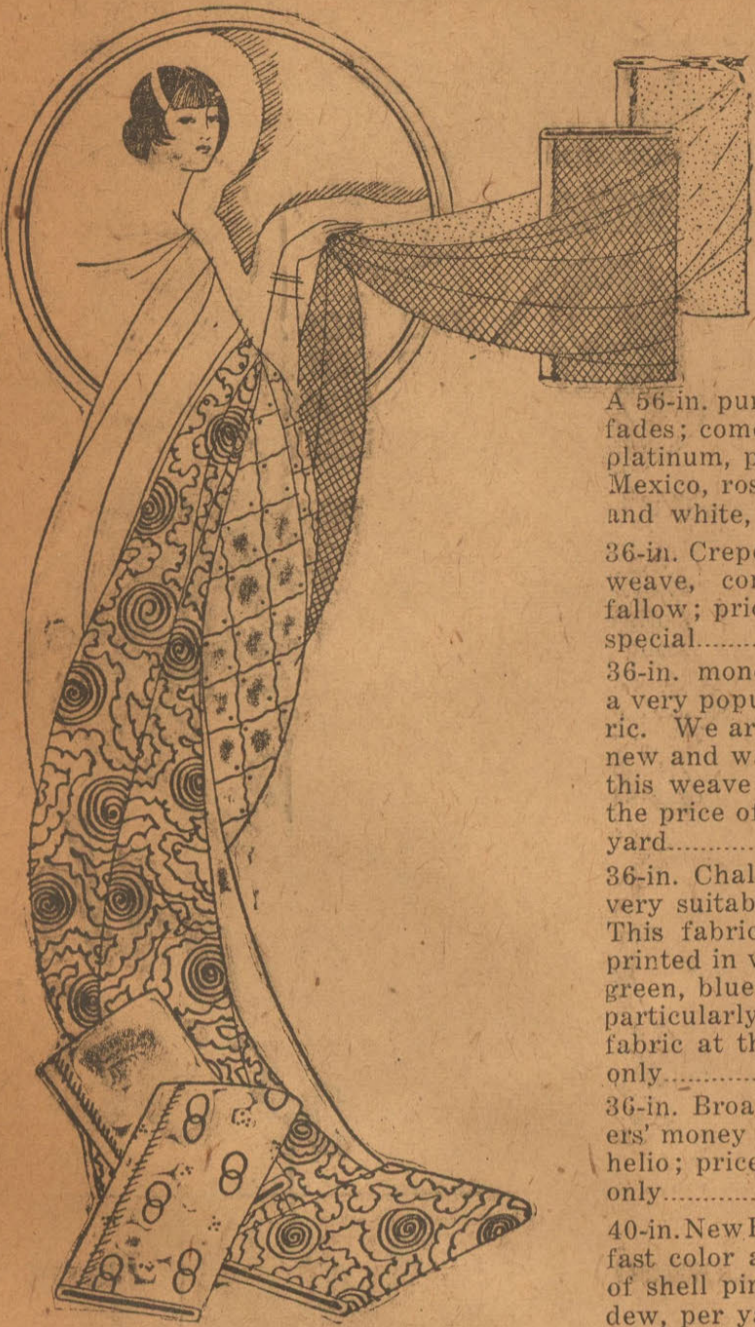

UNIVERSITY LAW SCHOOL GROWS FAST

President Splawn Reviews Its Development Since Establishment in 1883

(This is one of a series of articles on the University of Texas, written by Dr. W. M. W. Splawn, president.)

Many men and not a few women who have achieved notable success in the profession of law in Texas and other parts of the country were former students of the department of law of the University of Texas. This department, which is now called the school of law, opened in 1883, with 52 students and two members of the faculty, Governor O. M. Roberts and Judge Robert S. Gould. The first classes met in the old temporary capitol, then on the vacant lot in front of the governor's mansion. Later, the department was moved in the basement of the main building on the present campus of the university. In 1908 the present law building was completed.

From 1883 to 1909 the entrance requirements were simply a high school education, and the length of the law course was two years until 1903, when it was increased to three. From 1903 to 1920, in addition to the high school credits required for admission to the university, eight college courses were required for the law degree, five of which must have been completed before entrance. Since 1920, 10 college courses have been required. The faculty has under consideration the raising of the requirements to 15 college courses, and eventually to a B. A. degree. A statement from Judge Gould in the catalogue of 1888 well expresses the continued belief and policy of the faculty.

Preparation For Law.
"The professors of the law department would urge young men desiring to enter it, to prepare themselves for the study of law by taking the full course of academic study required for a degree in colleges of established reputation," he wrote. "While it is not deemed advisable to make this a condition of admission as a candidate for the degree of bachelor of laws, the decided opinion is expressed that this is the preparation best adapted to fit young men for studying law to the greatest profit. It is much to be regretted that so many seek to begin that study with so little previous mental training."

The raising of the requirements, both in law and college courses, has been governed by the increase in general educational advantages in the state, the standard being raised as good high schools, colleges and universities have multiplied, making it easier to obtain the requisite college credits. A limited number of mature students, not candidates for degrees, may enter upon individual approval, with less preparation. The personnel of the faculty from the beginning, given in the order in which they were added, follows: Gov. O. M. Roberts, Judge Robert S. Gould, T. S. Miller, R. L. Batts, Victor L. Brooks, John C. Townes, W. S. Sizing, Yancy Lewis, C. H. Huberich, B. D. Tarleton, Samuel Peterson, C. H. Miller, Lauch Mc Laurin, Ira P. Hildebrand, C. S. Potts, R. E. Cofer, George C. Butte, E. W. Patterson, Wilbur M. Cleaves, Leon Green, W. A. Rhea, D. F. Bobbitt, Charles T. McCormick, C. G. Haines, Ireland Graves, and D. K. Woodward.

The enrollment has increased steadily from 52 to the present number—378. During the 41 years of the existence of the school, 2,061 have received the degree of bachelor of laws. The graduates are admitted to the bar without examination.

Law School Library.
The library had acquired 4,000 volumes by 1904. There are now 28,000 carefully selected volumes which are constantly being added to. Among the collections worthy of note are the following:

8. Old and valuable Spanish and English law books, including the year books and publications of the Selden society.
9. Text books of all kinds.
10. Digests, Rose's notes, American decisions, American reports, American state reports, lawyers' reports annotated, annotated lawyers' reports, ruling case law, corpus juris-cy, Shepard's citations for the reporter system, Texas and United States digests, British ruling cases, etc.
11. Law journals, such as American Law Review, Central Law Journal, Columbia Law Review, Cornell Law Quarterly, Journal of Criminal Law and Criminology, Harvard Law Review, Illinois Law Review, Michigan Law Review, Political Science Quarterly, Yale Law Journal, etc.

DEPUTY SHERIFF TELLS HOW NEGRO WAS KILLED WHILE STEALING A HOG

Ex-Sheriff E. P. (Pack) Kilborn, who has had a long and varied experience as a peace officer and who is now deputy sheriff and jailer, tells a story of how a hog that had been killed by a negro who was trying to steal it, played even with the negro and brought about his death also shortly after he had taken the life of the hog.

"I was seated in the Tarrant county sheriff's office in Fort Worth one time talking to the sheriff," Mr. Kilborn said, "when a call came in for him to come out in the country a few miles and investigate the circumstances surrounding the death of a negro of the community, whose dead body had been found hanging on a rail fence.

"Having several hours' time at my disposal before time for my train for Eastland, I accepted the sheriff's invitation to accompany him to make the investigation.

"When we arrived at the place, we found the dead negro as we had been told. He was hanging by the neck across a high rail fence on the other side of which hung a dead hog that looked like it might weigh about 100 pounds. An investigation revealed that the negro had slipped into the pen of one of his white neighbors and knocked one of his hogs in the head with an axe and killed it. He then took a piece of rope and, tying the hog's fore feet together, placed his own head between the fore legs of the hog and lifted the hog to his back, starting to climb over the fence and make his get-away. But the combined weight of the hog and the negro was too much for the top rail of the fence and it broke, the hog falling on one side and the negro on the other. In the fall the negro's neck was broken."

Mr. Kilborn said the coroner's verdict was that the negro was killed by a dead hog.

To clean brushes use benzine, gasoline, turpentine. Varnish and enamel brushes should always be cleaned in turpentine, and shellac brushes in denatured alcohol. After the brushes have been well cleaned they should be washed in soft water and flaxseed and dried with a cloth.

AMERICAN LEGION POST IN EASTLAND LOOKING FOR WILLIAM R. SMITH

K. B. Tanner, commander of the Eastland post, American Legion, has received a letter from the adjutant general of the United States army addressed to William R. Smith in care of the Eastland post American Legion, which is being held by the post, Mr. Smith being unknown in Eastland.

The letter states that the adjutant general has decided that all former officers and enlisted men, who participated in a major operation, are entitled to a defense sector clasp on their victory medal, even though not specifically mentioned in the application, and that the records show that William R. Smith did not receive such a clasp.

The clasp is enclosed in the letter and the officers of the local post are anxious to locate Mr. Smith and deliver the letter and clasp to him.

MINERAL WELLS PLANS TO BUILD AUDITORIUM

MINERAL WELLS, Jan. 20.—Mineral Wells will own its own auditorium with a seating capacity of 500 people as a result of plans which were recently evolved at a meeting of the chamber of commerce.

Nearly \$7,000 has been raised by a drive inaugurated by the chamber of commerce towards \$25,000, which is needed to meet the expenses of bringing the West Texas Chamber of Commerce convention here next May.
