Temporary Injunction Keeps Highway Money Out of Free Bridge

AUSTIN, Oct. 22.—The state highway commission was temporarily restrained today from allotting \$163,000 as a part of the cost of construction of the proposed free interstate highway bridge across the Red river between Burkburnett and Devol, Okla.

Judge George Calhoun, who granted the injunction, indicated it was only temporary. The court ruled that representatives of the two states who had entered into an agreement to build the bridge were without authority to do so, the governors alone being authorized to enter into negotiations which involved two states.

10 1/2-Pound Sweet Potato and Near Rival Displayed

Two mammoth sweet potatoes, weighing 10 1/2 and 6 3/4 pounds respectively, both grown near Ranger, are on display in Ranger at this time. One of them is in the window of the Adams store on Bank street, the other at the Citizens State Bank.

JERSEY COWS ADDED TO HERDS NOW IN RANGER

Mayor Hodges and R. M. Duncan Buy Six Offered At State Fair

Ranger's mayor, R. H. Hodges, and his neighbor, R. M. Duncan, are getting credit for being blamed for stopping the Metzger farm auction sale of registered Jersey cows in Dallas during the State fair.

Mr. Hodges bought three cows and Mr. Duncan three. Those bought by the mayor were Nancy Oxford M. F. 551576, a register of merit cow sired by Noble Oxford; Mary Majesty M. F. 483534, and Bulah Oxford M. F. 588109.

Both Ranger buyers express disappointment at the sale's closing as it is their expressed intention to build up registered herds and contribute to the improvement of dairy stock in the Ranger district.

The council meets Thursday night each week in the clubrooms in the Gholson hotel and plans are now being made to start taking applications for membership in the order so as to hold an initiation, as is done each year by the council. Ranger council now has 107 members and, through transfers from other councils and with new members received by initiation the council hopes to increase the membership to 200 or more.

FORMER INDIAN FIGHTER VISITS NEPHEW'S HOME

'Uncle' Dave Cunningham of Comanche Guest of Judge Tom J. Cunningham.

'Uncle' Dave Cunningham, pioneer settler of this section now residing at Comanche, was in Eastland Wednesday as the guest of his nephew, Judge Tom J. Cunningham of the Eastland county court-at-law.

Mr. Cunningham, who was sheriff of Comanche county in an early day, took part in many of the Indian fights in western Texas and helped to rid the country of that lawless element that were here in such large numbers during the early days. He tells some interesting stories of happenings at that time.

Mr. Cunningham, with 'Uncle' Bill McGough, was in what he called the 'Hog Creek' Indian fight in Eastland county. But little is known about this fight with the Indians and Mr. Cunningham, who is getting old and feeble, did not care to talk about it much.

LOUISIANA BANKER IS ACQUITTED OF MURDER

FARMERSVILLE, La., Oct. 22.—Y. S. Fuller, president of a Bernice, La., bank, was free today of charges of murder in connection with the slaying of M. Green in the Bernice bank last August. The jury, after deliberating about 10 minutes last night, brought in a verdict of 'not guilty.'

The trial created wide interest, partly because the defendants' counsel consisted of his two sons, who are attorneys. A crowded courtroom applauded the verdict.

PLEA OF 'NOT GUILTY' MADE BY TOGO RAY

Selection of Jury Begun and Three Chosen. Efforts for Continuance Fail.

Having disposed of the preliminaries yesterday in the case of the State of Texas vs. Togo Ray, charged with murder, the work of selecting a jury from the special veniremen was begun this morning and at 11:30 three of the 12 jurors needed had been chosen.

Failing in their attempt to have the case continued on the ground of absent witnesses, the defense offered a second motion to quash the venire, this time on the ground that some 20 or 25 of those for whom the sheriff had been given subpoenas were not in court and that the sheriff's return did not show what diligence the officers had exercised in getting them.

The defendant was arraigned before the court this morning and Assistant County Attorney Glivie Hubbard read the indictment and charge against him. When asked by the court if he pleaded guilty or not guilty, the defendant said, 'Not guilty.'

From every indication it will require at least the balance of this week to finish the case.

Officers Nominated For Eastland County Medical Society

Dr. Charles Hale of Cisco was nominated for president, Dr. J. B. Stackable of Ranger, vice president, and Dr. E. L. Graham, secretary, of the Eastland County Medical society, which met last Tuesday in Cisco. The society nominates its officers at its annual meeting in October and elects them at the following meeting in December.

VANDERBILT WIDOW MARRIES U. S. SENATOR PETER GERRY

LONDON, Oct. 22.—While London was scarcely more than awake this morning, United States Senator Peter Golet Gerry, scion of a wealthy and blue-blooded family, and Mrs. Edith Vanderbilt, widow of George Vanderbilt, went to St. George's district registry and were married. The ceremony was performed at 8 o'clock this morning in the presence of about a dozen friends.

TRUCK DRIVER CHARGED WITH THEFT OF TIRE

Joe Manicchia Held for Grand Jury on Bond of \$1,000.

Joe Manicchia, fire truck driver, is being held in the Ranger city jail on a complaint lodged against him by Patrolman J. S. Bradford of the Ranger city police, charging theft of a Ford truck casing alleged to belong to John Haney and having a value of more than \$50. Manicchia waived preliminary examination before L. C. Gorton, justice of the peace, and his bond was fixed at \$1,000 pending action of the grand jury.

Manicchia was first taken into custody for investigation in connection with a disdemanor and evidence said to have been found at his quarters was made the basis of the graver charge. City Attorney A. A. Diehl is authority for the statement that irrespective of this case, or through testimony brought to light while this case is pending, other charges may be filed in the near future.

Eastland and Breckenridge authorities are said to be collaborating with the Ranger authorities in an effort to break up a gang of automobile thieves operating in Central West Texas for some time and thus far baffling sheriff and police. Dicky Green, who has figured in boxing bouts in Ranger, was arrested Wednesday afternoon, but released. The police declined to state on what grounds this arrest was made, except to say it was for investigation.

Earth Tremors In California Arouse Folks During Night

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 22.—A distinct earth tremor was felt here at 1:30 a. m. today. Many residents were awakened by the jolt, which lasted about eight seconds.

PASADENA, Oct. 22.—Pasadena was shaken at 1:32 a. m. today by an earth tremor, which lasted about eight seconds and rattled windows.

SITUATION IN NEAR EAST IS RATHER CLOUDY

Greek Troops Hovering on Bulgarian Frontier Preparing to Attack.

Greece and Bulgaria are locked in combat near the rim of Macedonia, and reports out of the Balkans today say that numerous casualties have already occurred.

A Sofia United Press message recounted that the Bulgarian cabinet was called to meet tonight to decide if Bulgaria should declare war upon Greece. Meantime diplomats at Sofia and Athens were reported trying to stem the war spirit. But neither nation has even answered the other's demands arising from what the Greeks call the 'Greek invasion of Macedonia,' and what the Bulgarians call an invasion of their territory.

The Bulgar village of Coula was occupied by the Greeks following the taking of Petritsi yesterday and fighting was in full swing when the cablegrams were filed.

Bulgaria, thinking of preparing for war, is ill equipped to wage it, since her armament is practically non-existent as a result of the allied conditions imposed upon her. However, London messages said, they were anxiously lest the present trouble fire the 'powder keg' at a time when Europe was dreaming of peace.

VIENNA, Oct. 22.—Sofia advices today said the Bulgarian cabinet had decided to protest to the League of Nations against what it termed the 'Greek invasion of the Patristis' and to appeal to the allies to permit Bulgaria to mobilize sufficiently to defend her sovereignty.

ATHENS, Oct. 22.—Greek troops propose to attack during the forenoon Bulgarian forces still occupying a portion of Greek territory in vicinity of Demirhis in northern Macedonia. Greek airplanes today were reconnoitering over Bulgar positions. The situation was not clear early today, but contained elements which may lead to complications in the Balkans.

Greek occupation of the Patristis district was confirmed today. This was undertaken by the Greeks in order to enforce its demand for reparation in connection with the Comitdjas raids.

Texas Republicans Planning For Their Primary Election

DALLAS, Oct. 22.—Making plans to hold its first primary in the history of Texas, 200 republicans from all parts of the state gathered here today for the first called meeting of the state executive committee.

'Unsatisfactory conditions exist in the state,' said R. B. Creager, member from Texas of the national republican executive committee. 'If we are wise enough to put up the right kind of candidates we will elect a republican governor next year.'

COLONEL MITCHELL AWAITS ORDER OF HIS ARREST

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22.—Col. William Mitchell today continued to await for formal notification by the war department that he is to be court-martialed for his sensational charges.

Contrary to public reports Mitchell has not yet been given the notice which the military law requires. The department still has 24 hours in which to comply with the law, and Mitchell is expecting to receive notice today that he is to be placed under technical arrest.

GREEK BONDS DECLINE.

NEW YORK, Oct. 22.—The Greek government 7 per cent bonds listed on the New York stock exchange fell 3/4 point to 86, following news of trouble between Greece and Bulgaria. The Bulgarian government has no obligations listed on the local market.

STOCK EXCHANGE SEAT SALE.

NEW YORK, Oct. 22.—Ascend in the New York stock exchange sold today for \$135,000. The sale was approved by the board.

CONTRACTS TO KEEP UP ROADS BEING PROBED

Some Members of Texas Legislature Thought Interested in Maintenance Awards.

AUSTIN, Oct. 22.—According to authentic information here today, several members of the Texas legislature have been summoned before the grand jury investigating the state highway commission. Attorney General Dan Moody is reported to have quizzed them to prove or disprove rumors that some members of the body are also road maintenance contractors.

It was reported from reliable sources that members of the legislature are interested in corporations holding road maintenance contracts awarded by the present highway commission. This is considered very important in view of the pending session of the legislature awaiting the report of the grand jury.

Should it appear that members of the legislature are interested in road maintenance contracts they would be disbarred from voting on any highway matters in any special session that may be called.

Cleburne Chamber of Commerce Secretary Killed In His Yard

CLEBURNE, Texas, Oct. 22.—The possibility that the death of H. A. Oliver, secretary of the local Chamber of Commerce, may have followed threats of alleged blackmailers is being investigated today. Oliver's body was found in his backyard, a bullet having entered behind his ear. It is believed that he received threatening letters, for he is said to have intimated to friends that his life was in danger.

Curtis J. Gridley of Chicago, one of the men held in connection with reported blackmail plots, confessed and implicated three others, the police said. The three others are said to be from New York.

TICKETS GOING FAST FOR TEXAS-A. & M. GAME

AUSTIN, Oct. 22.—Tickets for the Texas-A. & M. game Thanksgiving have been sold so rapidly that the comparatively few seats left are on the 10-yard line and behind the goals, according to Wiley Glaze, in charge of the University of Texas' part of the tickets. Students tickets are to go on sale three days before the game, Glaze stated.

NEW SCHEDULE OF INCOME TAX RATE SUGGESTED

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22.—A new schedule of normal income tax rates, slashing about 25 per cent from the present schedule, were set out today in a letter from Secretary Mellon to Chairman Green of the house ways and means committee. It would provide a tax of 1 per cent on incomes of \$3,000, 2 per cent on the next two thousand, 3 per cent on the next four thousand and 5 per cent thereafter.

MOTHER AND DAUGHTER DIE WHEN FAMILY HOME BURNS

ATHENS, Ohio, Oct. 22.—Mrs. Hattie Dunsce, wife of a coal miner, and Laura, her five-year-old daughter, were burned to death here today when fire destroyed her home. Two other children were painfully burned and two others escaped, the four fleeing from the blazing bedroom just as the roof fell in.

JUGO-SLAVIA RAPIDLY CONCENTRATING HER TROOPS

VIENNA, Oct. 22.—Jugo-Slavia is rushing concentration of her troops as a precautionary measure in view of the fighting between Bulgaria and Greece, according to Belgrade advices today. Troop concentration in Jugo-Slavia has been under way for a week, but has suddenly increased.

YOUNG MAN KILLED IN CRASH OF AUTOMOBILE

PITTSBURG, Texas, Oct. 22.—Tucker Nutt, 25, was killed and Hiram Lowe seriously injured when their auto was wrecked near here last night. Robert Jumpers, driver, escaped uninjured. They were returning from a fair at Mount Vernon.

POMONA FEELS TREMORS.

POMONA, Calif., Oct. 22.—Pomona residents were aroused at 1:32 today by distinct earth tremors. Dishes rattled and other noises prevailed.

## Real Evolution Trial Now Under Way In Little Town of New Hampshire

By United Press.  
FRANKLIN, N. H., Oct. 22.—The Tennessee evolution trial is having its aftermath in this little town in the New Hampshire Hills.

Billy and Dwina are playing the leading roles in a unique experiment which is a direct development of the one-horse town court case that interested the nation.

Billy and Dwina are West African chimpanzees that are expected to answer the question: "How much does a monkey know?"

The Institute of Psychology at Yale University is conducting the experiment. Dr. Robert M. Yerkes, one of the leading psychologists of the United States and now professor of psychology at the institute, is directing the study of the chimpanzees.

Dr. Harold C. Bingham, research associate in psychology at the institute, is conducting a series of experiments in an effort to obtain more complete and accurate information on the working of a monkey's brain.

As a means of obtaining the necessary contrast between the functioning of a monkey brain and human brain, Dr. Bingham is subjecting his children to the same tests put to the chimpanzees.

"What we are studying particularly is the ideational conduct of the chimpanzees," declared Dr. Yerkes. "That is, we are trying to find out to how great an extent their brains are capable of entertaining and relating ideas, how much initiative they have and how they will approach problems with which they have never before been confronted.

"For example, Dr. Bingham fastens to the floor a long-necked bottle, lying on its side. In another part of the room he places a piece of wire with a hooked end. In the bottle he puts a piece of banana, a favorite food with the chimpanzees. "The problem is to see whether they will figure out the connection between the wire and the bottle—whether they will discover that they can hook the banana out with the wire.

"In another test the banana is hung from the ceiling and the stick is put in another part of the room. Here there are three possibilities. They can either knock the banana down with the stick or set the stick upright on the floor, climb swiftly to the top of it and seize the fruit, or swing themselves out from another rope and reach the banana."

## Only One Hard Game Will Be Played In Sixteenth District

It is now admitted by practically all sport writers that this week will see the elimination of only one team from the sixteenth district contest. And that team will be either Ranger or Eastland.
