Italy is very much exercised over the failure of France to effect a satisfactory settlement of her debt to the United States, fearing that Ital-ian negotiations will meet the same fate. Mr. Johnson expresses the belief that this ratio runs throughout the entire alien population of the United States. Yerkes, one of the leading psychologists of the United States and now professor of psychology at the institute, is direct-ing the study of the chimpanzees. Dr. Harold C. Bingham, research associate in psychology at the insti-tute, is conducting a series of experi-ments in an effort to obtain more complete and accurate information on the working of a monkey's brain. As a means of obtaining the needs sary contrast between the function-ing of a monkey brain and human brain, Dr. Bingham is subjecting his children to the same tests put to the chimpanzees. "What we are studying particular-ly is the ideational conduct of the chimpanzees," declared Dr. Yerkes. "That is, we are trying to find out to how great an extent their brains are capable of entertaining and re-lating ideas, how much initiative they have and how they will approach problems with which they have never before been confronted. "For example, Dr. Bingham fas-tens to the floor a long-necked bot-
