Albert Florence of Cisco, charged with murder of Arthur Toombs, Cisco garage man, pled guilty before Judge George L. Davenport of the Ninetyfirst district court, sitting as a juvenile court, this morning and was sentenced to confinement in the state industrial school at Gatesville, Texas, for more than four years, or until he has reached the age of 21 years.




