BULLDOGS WIN EXCITING GAME OFF BUCKAROOS

Breckenridge Breaks Badly in Last Quarter, but Steadily Outplayed. Score 38 to 3.

RANGER HIGH NEEDS LIBRARY FOR PROGRESS

Group of Citizens Organize Campaign for This and Other Improvements.

A group of citizens representing the various organizations of Ranger met last night in the sewing room of the High school to discuss ways and means of improving the library of the High school. Mrs. M. H. Hagaman was chairman of the meeting and presented the matter briefly to the group, calling upon Professor Holloway, superintendent of the Ranger city schools, to explain the real situation and the great need for library facilities. Among the important reasons Professor Holloway stated were: First, that 90 per cent of the children attending high school would get only the cultural advantages they would ever have right there in the High school, and that beyond the "bread and butter" instruction they were to get there they would also have as much as possible of those things that would make their lives fuller and happier when school days are over; second, that the state department of education requires that a certain number of books be carried in the library for reference purposes in every class in the state; third, that many of these books have to be carried in duplicates of 25 or 30, because if a lesson is assigned to a room of 30 students there must be enough of those books to meet the need, or it will not be possible for every student in the class to get the proper references.

Dick Elliott Urges Duty of Former Service Men to Join and Work With Other Members of the American Legion

The following address was delivered by Dick Elliott, local representative of the Texas company, before the Lions' club at last Thursday's meeting, on the American Legion membership drive, now being planned:

"Mr. Chairman and Fellow Members of the Lions' Club:

"I have a few words to say to you as a Legionnaire and not as a brother Lion. My subject is relative to a membership drive which the Legion is putting on for the next two months for members for the year 1926. We are going to make an appeal to every organization in Ranger for assistance. I am asking the Lions' club from a patriotic standpoint and not as a civic matter.

"Should I ask you for help as a civic matter, it probably would weaken my appeal but should I do so with an eye for advertising and city building, you should respond. I say this for this reason that when the seventeenth district convention meets they keep an ear propped open to hear what Ranger delegation has to say. As Ranger has the largest post in this district and the most active one in the state they look to us to take the lead. Also at the state convention it is known that the Ranger post is among the seven or eight largest in the state and the seventeenth district is the largest district in the state and they look forward to the seventeenth district for their progressive ideas and Ranger of course taking the lead from the district delegation. Therefore it is known by some 25,000 ex-service men that Ranger has a bunch of men that are sticking together. Should an ex-service man see fit to make a change in his place of residence he would naturally have an eye on Ranger. This also solves the problem of unsettlement that usually exists among ex-service men, so far as Ranger is concerned. That is the reason I say that you could respond from a civic standpoint.

"I do not hesitate to ask from a patriotic standpoint, inasmuch, if we do not take care of the several thousand war orphaned children and the dependents of the soldiers who did not come back, it won't be a very good inducement for boys to go to the next war. Personally I would go if needed on the promise of bread and water.

"We are and have been for some time doing relief work right here in Ranger. We have footed the bill for food, bed, clothes and medical care to several worthy ex-service men and their families. In our new home we have reserved a bed-room for the unfortunate buddy who may appeal to us. This will enable us to do our work on a more economical basis.

"As it would also weaken my subject I am not going to ask for a vote of endorsement but am going to put this plan into operation. I expected to have a number of application blanks to the Legion today but will have them for next Thursday. I am going to hand two blanks to each eligible legionnaire and ask him to fill one out for himself and to have a buddy fill out the other one. Each member of the Lions' club who was not in the service, I am going to hand one blank and ask that he get some friend who is eligible and hand it in to me. I have a list of the members of the Lions' club and am not going to let any member alone until he has turned in the blank properly filled and with the \$5 attached. I am asking this as a patriotic favor and yet don't feel that I am asking much."

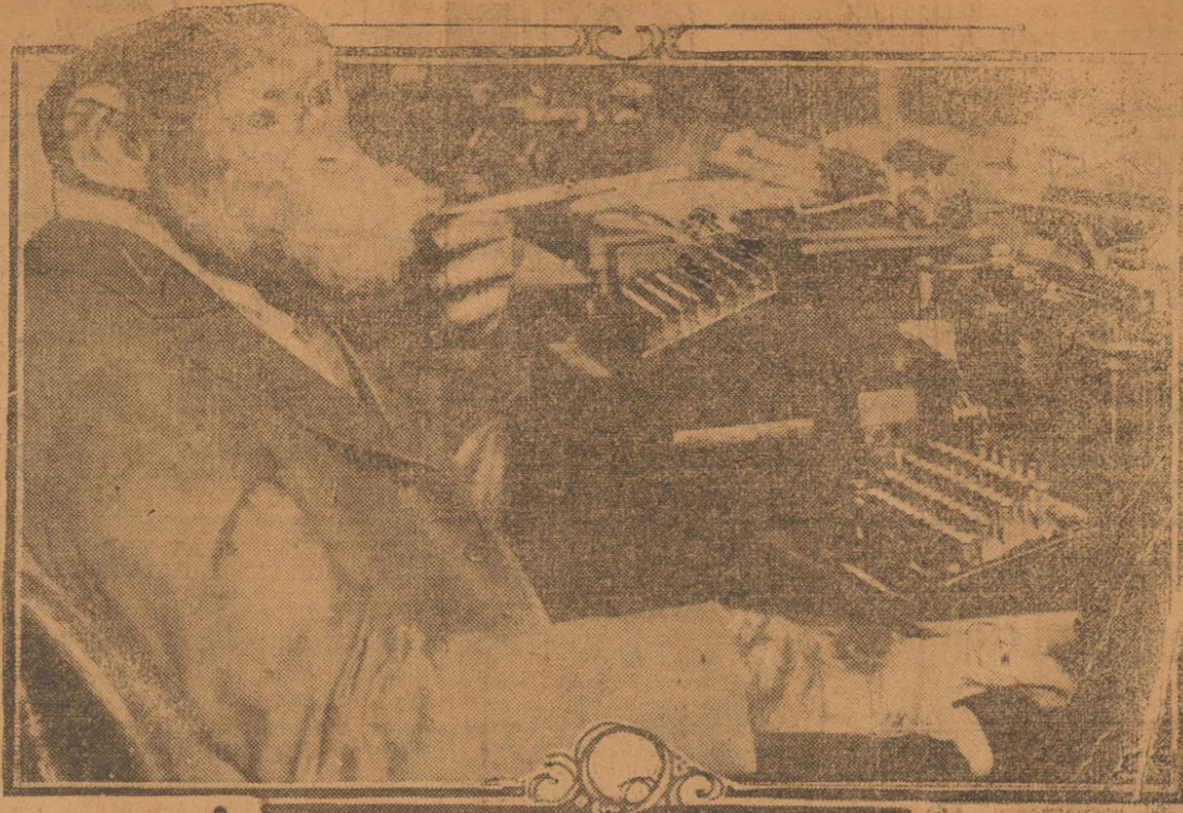

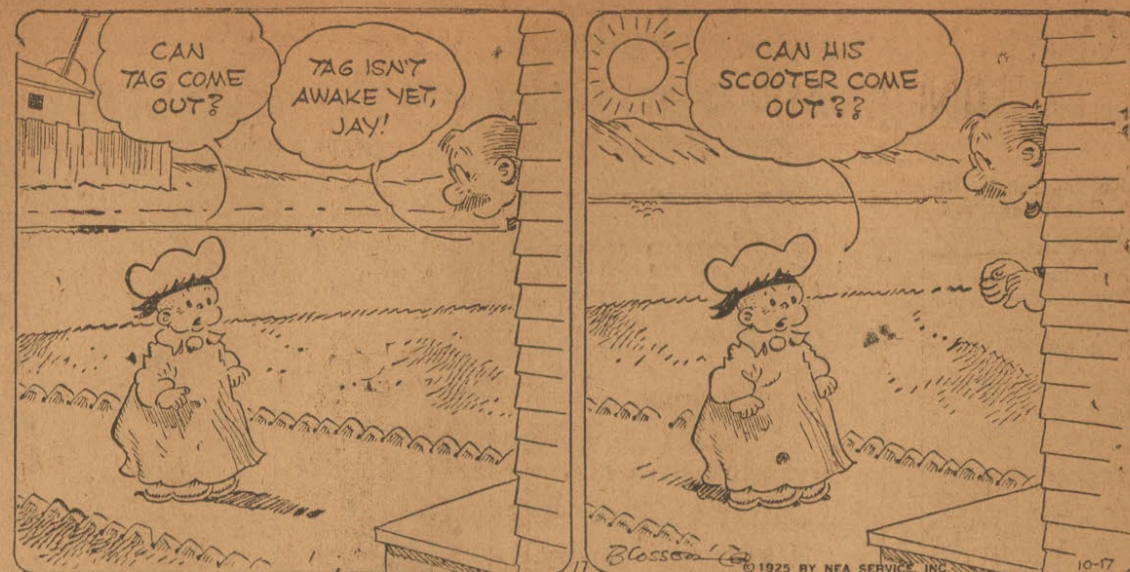

FRECKLES AND HIS FRIENDS



Prize Essay on "Fire Prevention" Written By Jeanette Yonker of Ranger

Miss Jeanette Yonkers of Summitt avenue won the prize given to a Ranger school student writing the best essay on "Fire Prevention" during the observance of fire prevention week recently. Many excellent essays were submitted, indicating, it was said, much interest among the students on the subject. Following is the prize essay:

In the last few years the loss of life as well as money and property has been very great. We should try in every conceivable way to prevent such disaster and loss.

It should be the first duty of builders, housewives, children, servants, in fact all people, in all walks of life, to keep in mind this most unnecessary waste, and exercise every caution in performing their various duties.

Let the builders make safe their work by the proper construction of flues, chimneys and all like fuel consuming appliances, and wherever possible, make the buildings fireproof throughout.

The electrician should use every means of safeguarding his work, no matter how expensive the same may be.

A housewife should practice great care in the use of electrical appliances, always disconnecting the same when finished with her work. Upon leaving home it is quite as essential to cut off the current by use of a switch as well as turning off the gas. The housewife should be very careful with the use of oil mops and dusters or the accumulation of other oil materials which might cause fire by spontaneous combustion.

Too great care cannot be taken in the storing of matches. They should be placed in an iron or fireproof receptacle, never leaving them on tables, dressers, window sills and the like, the greatest care should be taken against dropping them on the floor.

Children should avoid playing with matches as the careless dropping of a lighted match at any time or any place may cause serious damage.

Smokers should be cautioned against careless dropping of partly smoked cigarettes and cigars. Even the emptying of the ashes from a pipe on an unusually dry surface may cause disaster.

Picnicers and campers should be very careful in extinguishing all fires built for their use or pleasure. It is not an uncommon occurrence that a match carelessly thrown or the spark from such a fire to cause the worst damage in forests has been known.

Defective piping or the use of the rubber hose in the use of natural gas should be completely tabooed, insisting on solid connections and carefully inspected work. Every town or village would find it a profitable outlay to employ such inspectors and insist upon a regular and conscientious fulfillment of his duties.

If all persons were instructed as to the precautions necessary in the use of inflammable substances as gasoline, benzine and like products, loss of life and like tragedies could be easily avoided.

In using fireworks care should be taken that we are not close to the buildings, dry fields and other inflammable substances. The punk used in lighting fireworks is very dangerous if left near anything easily burned.

In the storing of ammunitions and other explosives, care should be taken to have them away from inhabited districts.

The shipping of explosives or other dangerous substances, proper labeling and inspection of carriers as well as the handling should be insisted upon.

In short, if every man, woman and child were to appoint himself a committee of one to insist upon and to comply with the observance of every caution known to them or prescribed by others we, as a nation, could reduce our losses to minimum. And by united efforts we would be able to lead all other nations in sparing these lives.

As a nation we should feel it our duty to reduce these casualties, inasmuch as 85 per cent are due to carelessness.

COOKING DEMONSTRATIONS PROMISED IN RANGER

That Ranger is to have a little cooking school all its own was revealed Saturday when Killingsworth & Cox announced that Miss Anna L. Luden, expert sent out by the manufacturers of the Acorn gas ranges, will be in Ranger for four days, October 20 to 23, inclusive, and give demonstrations in cooking and pass out delicacies to visitors fresh from the Acorn ovens.

The elimination of cooking troubles is announced as the theme of Miss Luden's addresses. It is said her work is of a highly practical nature and ladies who attend these demonstrations will obtain information quite as valuable as they would if the vatted advanced domestic science classes or cooking schools which charge high tuitions. The demonstrations and all tasty favors from the oven are to be free; it is announced. Miss Luden's title is practical home economist and economy will be the key note of the demonstrations, her managers say.

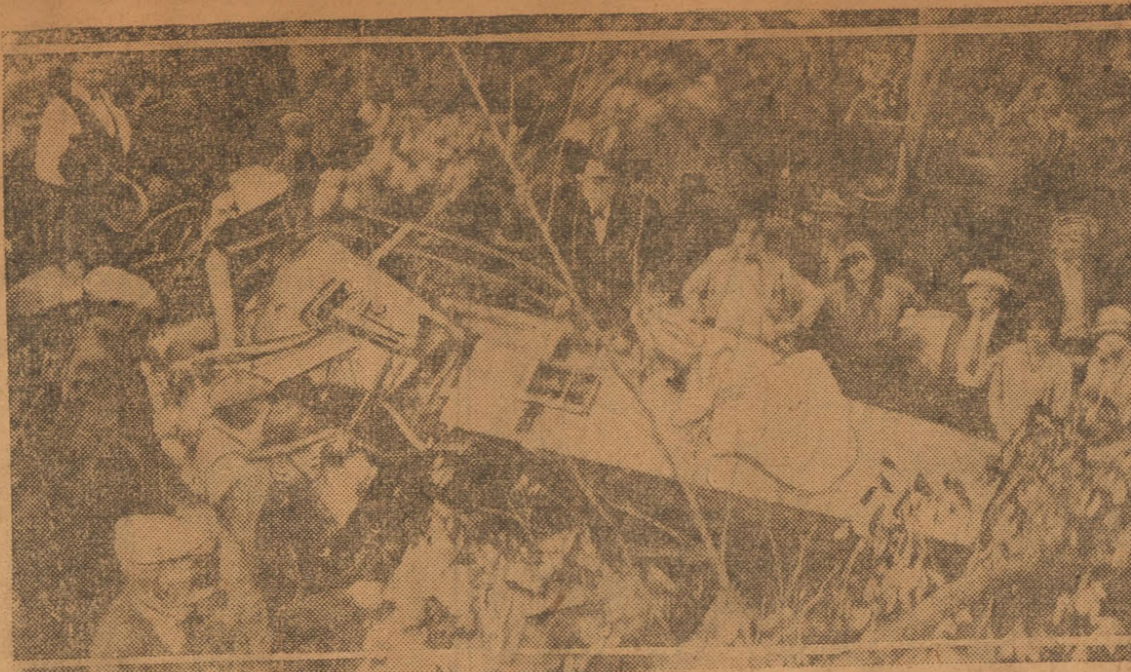

Stewart's Washington Letter

WASHINGTON—Diplomacy in Washington is greatly shocked at the Chinese ministry of justice's charge that the foreigners' consular courts in China show favoritism toward their own nationals when called on to try them for offenses against natives.

All the same, everybody who ever had any experience in the far east knows that these courts' decisions almost always are on the side of the foreigners and against the natives.

It's hardly to be expected of human nature that the situation should be otherwise.

An American, for instance, is arraigned in the American consular court say at Shanghai, on charges which Chinese accusers, or perhaps European residents of the foreign settlement, are pressing against him.

The judge may well feel some

little prejudice in favor of his own countryman without being the least bit crooked, and still more so the jury. The extraterritorial system, in its nature, obviously lends itself to injustice.

In my own time in China I recall the case of one little occidental country which maintained a consul at Shanghai for the benefit of just a single one of its citizens. The consul's official income naturally was very small but his resident fellow countryman brought it up to a handsome figure out of his own pocket.

This individual ran a gambling house in the international settlement. The foreign authorities who governed the settlement didn't like it and had their police arrest the gambling house proprietor repeatedly.

While the international police could arrest him, however, they had to turn him over to his own consul for trial. One guess is sufficient to tell anybody what invariably happened.

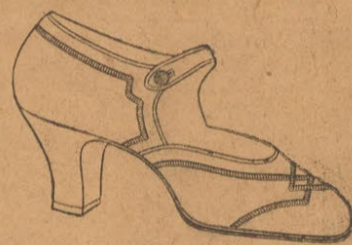

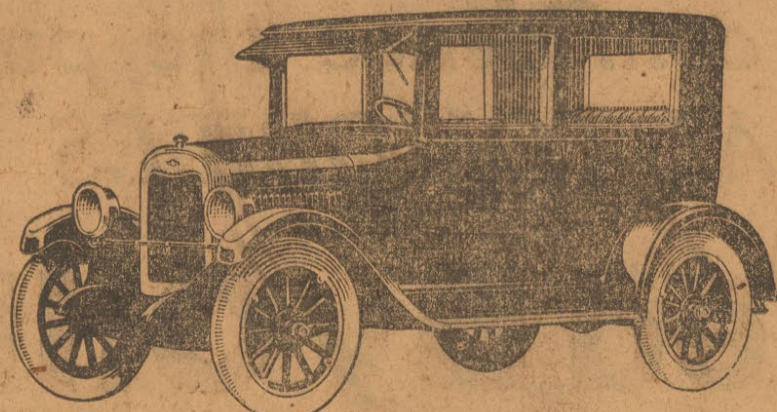

FINAL HONORS PAID TO LATE SAMUEL M. RALSTON

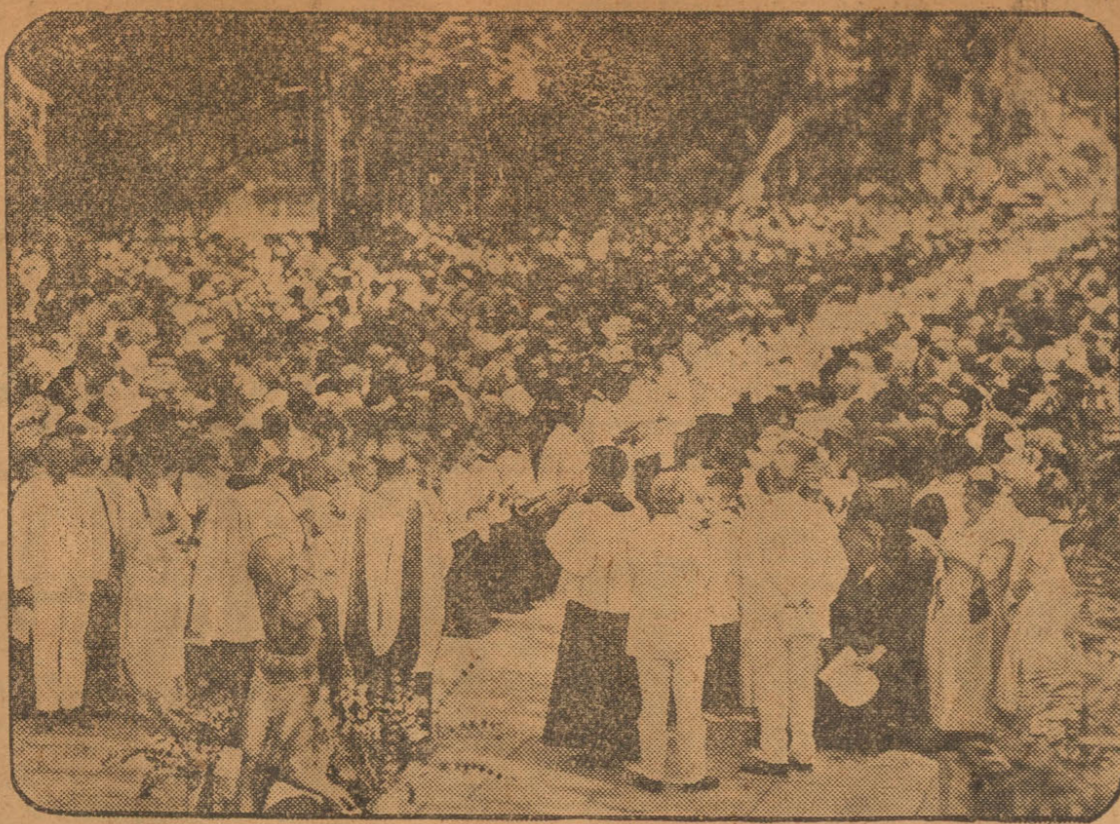

She looked at May questioningly. "Will you come?" she asked.

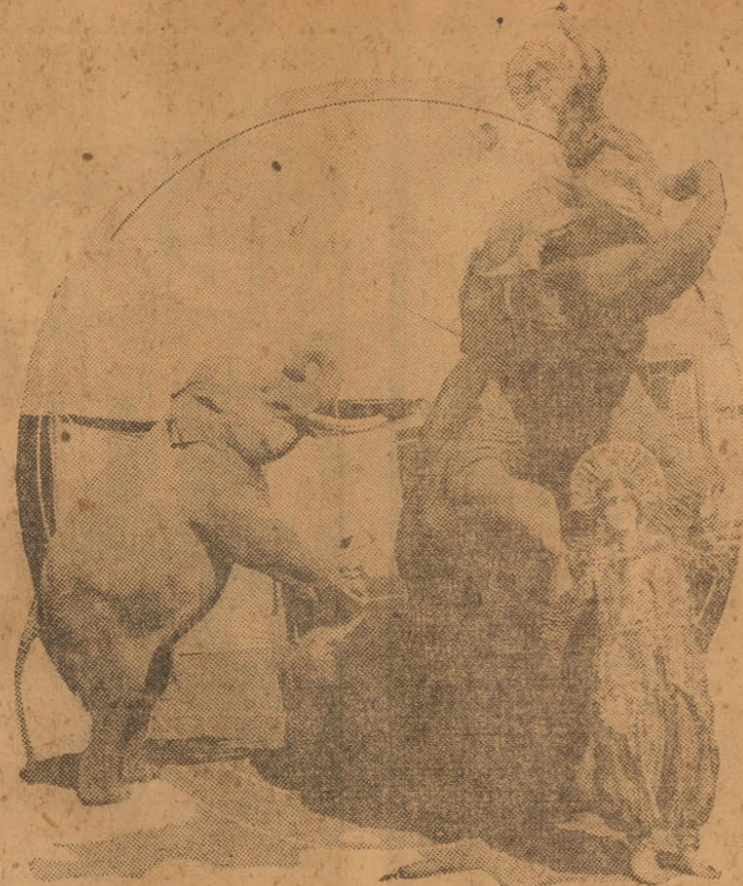
May's thoughts rapidly returned to Herbert Waterbury . . . Hadn't he said something about spending his winters in California?
