

BOTTOM MAY DROP OUT OF STEEL PRICES

 WASHINGTON, April 15.—Drastic reductions in steel prices announced by Judge Gary, chairman of the United States Steel corporation may cause a country-wide steel price scuttling, it was believed today.
 "At least cheaper steel will tend to bring prices to the consumer of scores of commodities of every-day use," said Ethelbert Stewart, government price expert today.
 "It may be some weeks before the buying public will experience benefits but the result is certain if the lower steel prices are maintained."
 "One result which was a general 10 per cent reduction in the price of farm machinery. Cheaper farm machinery means a larger margin for 6,500,000 farm owners who will thus be encouraged in the direction of increased production.

WOMAN JUDGE EULOGIZES HEROINES OF SEX'S FREEDOM

 CLEVELAND, Ohio, April 15.—Speaking at the feature meeting of the second annual convention of the National League of Women Voters Judge Florence E. Allen of Cuyahoga county common pleas court at Cleveland, reviewed the struggles of the pioneers in the seventy-three years since the movement to enfranchise women was born in Seneca Falls in 1848.
 During that period, she said, the women who battled for the vote were subjected to rigorous tests which they successfully stood and that the monument to their greatness is women's freedom.
 "It came to us," Judge Allen said, "with such incredible swiftness, historically speaking, that to most of us in this audience, excluding those whose service is so manifest that I need not mention it—to most of us a truth we inherit a land for which we did not labor, we dwell in cities which we built not, and of vineyard which we planted not do we eat."
 "That struggle threw into high light the calibre of the pioneers. But it was not our testing. Our testing has only just begun. It is here and now."
 "We have said that our participation in politics would be of value;

that our vote would not merely double the result; that women would not be whipped into line by machine domination to quite the same degree as men; that women would and should indeed enter the parties, but that they would carry something of a new spirit with them; and that the century old regard of women for the race would manifest itself in a cleaning of political standards.

Women Face Issue.
 "Men have said this, too. The men who believed in freedom for others as well as for themselves, the men who honored a gallant fight even if it was fought by women—in the days of jeers and scoffing—they said that women had a new element to contribute to the commonwealth. They believed what they said. And now we face the issue."
 "We face the issue at a dangerous time."
 "We must seek new paths of steadfastness and morality and constructive effort if the civilized world is to go on."
 "How will the women answer to their testing?"
 "There are some who would not have us answer. They would have us look into the shell of things, and spend ourselves in academic theories of government."
 "I, for one, believe that women will respond to the test; that they will have the intellectual courage to face the actualities of government, and spiritual courage to demand that the nation put into political effect the same moral standards which we commonly observe as individuals."
 "Our heritage demands of us that we display this mental and moral courage as we enter politics—Lucy Stone and Susan B. Anthony and the other great women behind us demand it. It is our sacred responsibility to use the ballot with the same devotion and intelligent purpose which they displayed in securing it for us—and only in so using it can we be found worthy in our testing even as the women who went before us."

20,000 BODIES OF AMERICANS SHIPPED HOME

PARIS, April 15.—Twenty thousand bodies of American soldiers who fell in France has either been shipped to the United States or are now in process of being returned for burial in their native country.

With 102 officers of the American army and a personnel of more than 2,000 men working night and day in many sections of France, the graves registration service of the American army has reached a point where it is possible to forward 4,000 bodies a month. The work of sending back the 52,311 bodies designated for interment in America will be completed by the end of next October, if present plans are fulfilled.

The bodies of the Americans have been taken from every cemetery in the south of France. The greater part of the effort is now being concentrated in the zone of the armies—the Argonne, etc. Seventy-seven bodies of American soldiers who died in Italy will be removed to the United States next month.

The graves registration service now is working in Berlin on arrangements for shipping the bodies of 130 American soldiers who are buried in various parts of unoccupied Germany. This latter work was rendered very difficult because the location of many of the graves was unknown. An expert has been going over the German burial records in Berlin for several weeks and virtually all the graves have been found. The German government has afforded every facility to the graves registration service.

More than 20,000 bodies will be buried in the four permanent cemeteries which the American government will maintain in France.

The fine arts commission of the American war memorial council has arrived in Paris for a series of meetings and a tour of inspection of the permanent cemeteries. The commission has in contemplation plans for the beautification of the cemeteries and will determine the character of headstones to be used and the general decorative scheme to be followed. The commission will probably consult with leading French landscape artists.

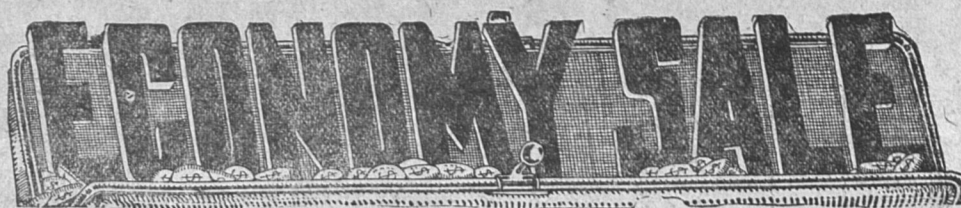
STIMSON WILL RESIGN AS U. S. ENVOY TO ARGENTINA

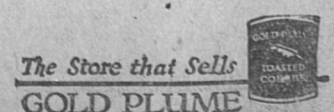
