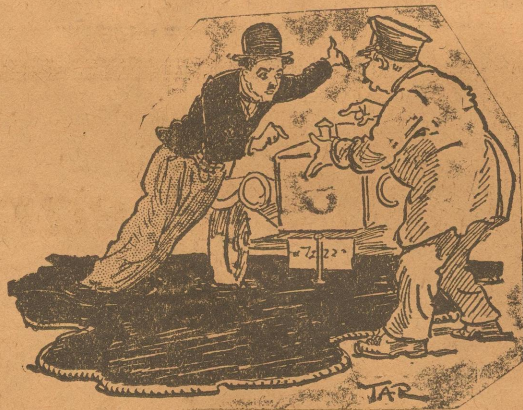

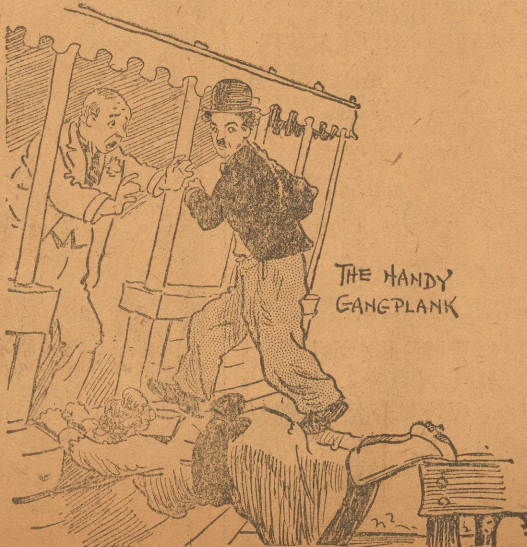

### PUBLICITY.

Publicity is push through print. That definition, necessarily limited, as any definition must be when referring to a twentieth century enterprise of such widespread uses, covers much of the ground.

Publicity is the opposite of "hiding your light under a bushel." It is letting the world know what you have. It is the most valuable force of salesmanship that has developed since Caxton first turned the bar that made the first crude impression that was printing.

It is not exactly ballyhoo, or putting all the red, ripe apples at the top of the barrel, though the shirt-sleeved, harsh-voiced, impassive-faced gentleman whose harangue holds the crowd on their way to the main entrance, and the tradesman who arranges the barrel so that the eyes meet the choicest apples both are students, in a measure, of the psychology of publicity.

Publicity is the means by which countries are voted dry, women gain the vote and popular priced motor cars become known in every corner of the world.

Ban Johnson, it was, who summed up his appreciation of the worth of publicity to a baseball magnate when he told a gathering of sport writers, "Say anything you want to about me, boys, just so you say it."

Ranger has had some of the sort of advertising of an uncomplimentary nature when its mud, its crowds, its poor accommodations in the early days were advertised to the world by visitors, drifters and incoming correspondents. That sort, with the tales of the fabulous wealth of the Ranger field, put the name of the city and field in every newspaper in the country and made it known even in Germany and China.

Now comes the adverse publicity of the pessimist, who sees in the steady- ing of the town that it is "on the hoggan," who carries and repeats the

doleful stories that outgoing drifters have told and circulates rumors unfair to the city, unbased in fact and flatly contradicted by the business done, by the bank statements, by the income tax reports.

And to meet it, at a meeting of representative and wise business men who know the untruth of the malicious reports that have been sent out, is suggested the best remedy in the world—publicity.

Ranger has a host of advantages of which the world has not yet heard, and of which it is eager to be told. While its gushers and dust and mud and crowds were on every tongue, there was no one to tell of the steps that were being taken toward betterment and there are still many stories of the city that may well be presented: its payroll, its wealth, its organizations, its improvements, its possibilities. There are many little tales that have never been brought to light. The men whose advantage would be best served by the development of these stories have been too busy to dig them out.

These needs were talked and the steps to meet the need are under way. Any article can be sold, with sufficient publicity.

## SYRIAN KING PUTS BOYCOTT ON THE ALLIES

By Associated Press.

BEIRUT, March 23.—Emir Feisal, king of Syria, has declared a boycott against the countries occupying the territories of the Arabs, in which France and England have organized a commission to bring the Moslems and Christians into better understanding.

Posters are being displayed at Damascus, where the Syrian congress has proclaimed the independence of that country, declare:

"In spite of himself, the Moslem is a brother of the Christian and Jew. Arabs existed before Christ, Moses or Mohammed, and independence is the right of Syria. Its religion is of God and the fatherland belongs to His children."

At the time of the armistice, the American army was holding 21 per cent of the front line, the British 18 per cent.

### PLAN PHONES AT MILE POSTS ON OHIO HIGHWAYS

COLUMBUS, Ohio.—The proposal that public telephone pay stations be installed along Ohio's highways has been made here.

The suggestion was made by City Councilman Milton W. Westlake. The plan is designed to aid tourists and other persons who are in need of aid. Westlake will urge the telephone companies to co-operate in putting into operation the proposal that a telephone be installed at each mile post. Then, in the event of a breakdown, a blowout or other troubles, the traveler would be not more than a half-mile from a telephone.

A small fee placed in the box would bring about a connection with the nearest telephone exchange. With a list of phone numbers available inside the booth, prompt communication could be had with garages, service stations, physicians, city officials, or other persons desired by the traveler.

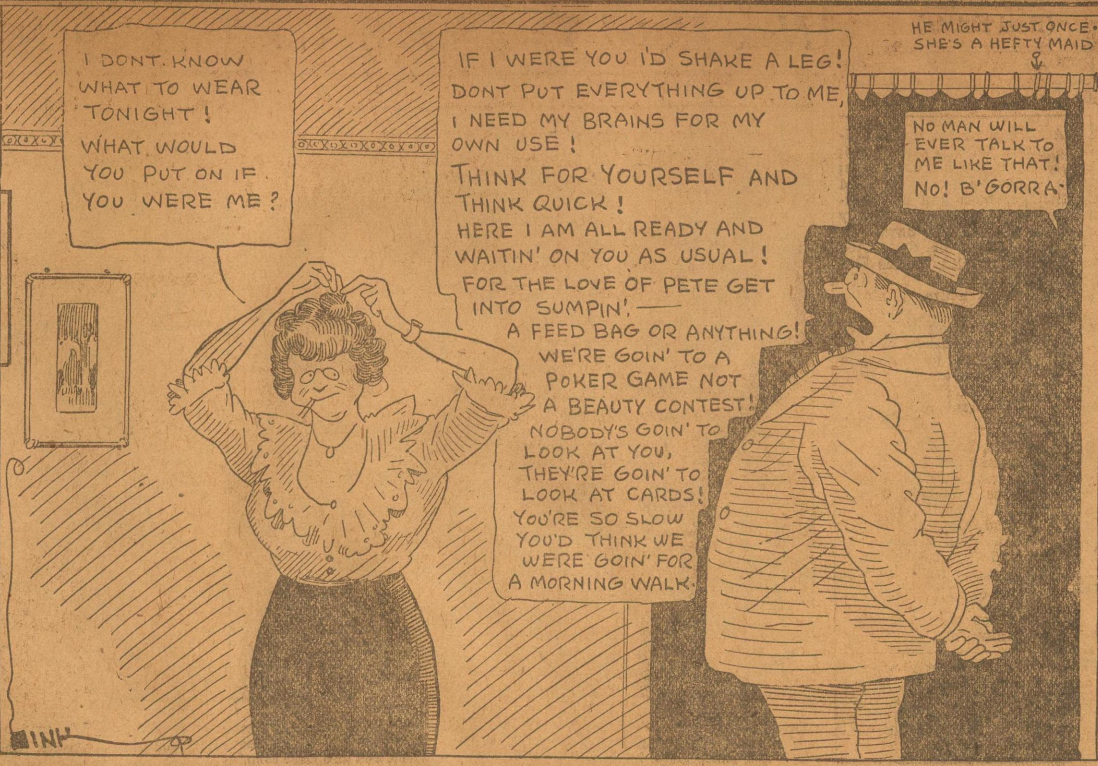

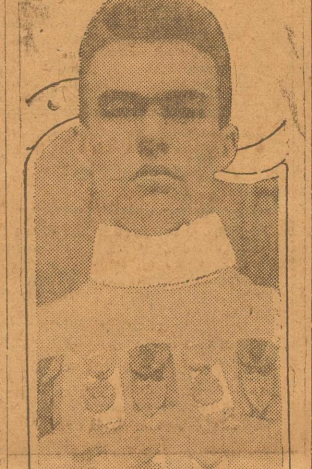

For these are the questions which every student at Boston University School of Business administration is being asked. Under the direction of Dr. Edwin M. Chamberlain, head of the department of psychology the tests went on, and young business brows are wrinkling as the sheep are divided from the goats. Here follow some of the posers which students are answering.

Test A.—If a company makes two aeroplanes a day for six days, how many aeroplanes does it make in all?

There you are for an arithmetical proposition.  
Test C.—Two words, meaning either the same thing or different, are placed side by side. If they mean the same thing the student underlines "same," which is printed on the paper. If they mean opposite, why, vice versa. Now eyes open—no napping. Here are the words:

Fractions. Germs.—Same. Opposite.  
Civil. Political.—Same. Opposite.

Gravely the student reads on his paper—"Actress powder and sometimes paint applies," or, yet again, "Snow black all is," or else, "Fish a swims."

Is he supposed to restore order to this chaos of a sentence?  
He is not. He is simply supposed to read said sentence and after reading it, in correct order, to underline on the right hand side of the page the word true or false.

But the acid test comes with test E. The student is given sentences which he could finish with the correct word. Here is some of the sentences:

"Men talk with the ears—hands—mouth—eyes."

Be it announced to all untutored minds that the correct way for any young business aspirant to answer this question is—"men talk with the mouth."

#### AEROPLANE DELIVERY OF MOTION PICTURE FILMS

EL PASO, March 22.—Airplane delivery of motion picture films for entertaining air service men stationed at Lajintas, Texas, a lonely landing field in the heart of the wilds of the Big Bend district, has been recommended by headquarters of the El Paso military district at Fort Bliss.

Lajintas is only fifty miles distant by plane from Marfa but is twenty-four hours from Marfa by motor truck which must traverse the rugged mountain trails. It is situated on the Rio Grande in a stretch of probably the roughest country along the Texas-Mexican border. Part of "B" Flight, 104th aero squadron, is stationed there.

There are said to be but two light delivery trucks to serve a dozen or more airmen at this district of the air-twisting trails and it is difficult to maintain a regular schedule of "movie" films for the diversion of the men.

Acting upon application of headquarters of the 104th squadron at Marfa, the commanding officer at Fort Bliss recommended to Colonel J. E. Fehet, southern department air officer at Fort Sam Houston that border patrol planes be permitted to carry films to Lajintas from Marfa once a week.

All films run at border patrol stations pertain to educational work of the army.

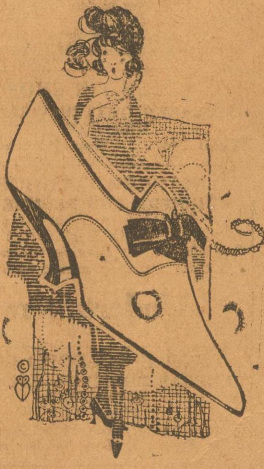
