# GWARRES RESIDENT

Cherokee Tribe Files. Claim To Oil Field Lands Totalling 14,000,000 Acres, Including Two Cities

Alleged Title Takes in Cities of Tulsa and Oklahoma City and Practically Entire Burkburnett Oil Field; Document Discovered By Accident.

WASHNGITON, April 9-Claim to 14,000,000 acres of land in Texas and Oklahoma, including the cities of Oklahoma City and Tulsa and practically the entire Burkburnett oil field, was filed in the supreme court today on behalf of the Cherokee Indian nation and supported by a government patent issued by President Van Buren and certified to as authentic by the interior

NATURE OF CLAIM. The claim is in the form of a petition for permission to intervene in the Red river oil lands case, an original suit between Texas and Oklahoma involving jurisdiction over valuable oil

fields along the common boundary.

John M. Taylor, grand nephew of General Zachary Taylor, attorney for the Cherokee nation, filed the motion. He said the patent was discovered accidentally among the papers of a deceased chief of the tribe.

## **SANITARY LAWS** ITALIAN FEUD OF CITY ARE TO BE ENFORCED

From this day forward the sanitary laws of the city of Ranger will be enforced to the letter, and persons in control of property where flies are permitted to roam at will over eatables, and where closed garbage cans are not provided according to law will be arrested and upon conviction fined. This statement was made in emphatic terms today by City Sanitary Inspector W. H. Stowe.

"The people in Ranger know the law in this regard," Mr. Stowe said, and there will be no more notices given of what this department intends to do to maintain sanitary conditions in the city. The summer season is upon us, and for the sufety of all concerned the precautionary measures provided by law to be observed by restaurants, cafes, hamburger stands and grocery stores must be carried out.

"All business places of this character must be well screened, and metal garbage cans with tight lids must be provided, and all persons who occupy or control property subject to the sanitary regulations will be held responsible for the sanitary condition of such property."
