Says German People Must Pay Among States Joining Movement, Latest Report.

> SAN ANTONIO, Feb. 5 .- Three more Mexican states are in revolt against the Obregon government, according to United States agents here today. The latest states to join the rebellion are Chihuahua, Oaxaca and Chiapas. The new revolt is the result of the federal government's efforts to reduce armed forces, federal agents said.

> The states reported as being involved bring the total area up to two-thirds of the entire republic. General Babino Sahdoval, formerly connected with both Carranza and Villa, is leading the uprising in Chihuahua.

He has a well armed force of 2,000 men and is gaining strength.

The Oaxaen revolution is led by Heledero Moreno, former high political official.

General Ricardo Culabra is leadng the revolt in the third state. Reports from the border that the eleven Arrieta brothers control the entire state was confirmed today. Other states reported in revolt are Vera Cruz, Pueblo and Coahuila. In the state of Tabasco, where two revolutions were in progress, it is reported that the leaders have formed an alliance.




