SAN ANTONIO, Feb. 3.-Department of justice operatives here today refused to either confirm or deny reports that Obregon's regime is threatened by any revolutions, but admit the situation has assumed a serious tone. Illness of President Obregon, several times reported in press dispatches from Mexico City but ater officially denied by the government is said to be the encouraging factor which has caused revolutionary activity.

In the state of Durango, where the eleven Arieta brothers are in complete control of the state, the revolutionists are led by General Domingo Arieta, for ner governor of Durango and a forme Obregon adherent. The Obregon garrison at Durango City has gone over to the Arieta brothers and it is reported that the governor has fled.

In addition, information reaching United States agents here is that six different garrisons, all supposedly loyal to the Obregon government, have mutinied The report persists that Francisco Villa may lead a revolution of his own The former bandit has been asked to lead a force against the Arieta brothers

THIRD GAS EXPLOSION TRAFFIC IN CITY SCHOOLS LAID TO MISCREANTS' ACTS

Buildings Have Been Entered Many Times and Ransacked: Gas Allowed to Accumulate Under Boilers.




