PLAINFIELD, N. J., March 1.— The Nixon Nitration plant, adjoining Camp Rariton, at Nixon, N. J., was rocked by a terrific explosion today. The shock was felt in lower New York, in Brooklyn and also as far away as Mineola, Long Island. It was felt distinctly 30 miles away, while the houses trembled and windows were shattered in nearby towns Sixteen of the injured had been accounted for at 12:30 o'clock today. One died just after arriving at the hospital in New Brunswick. Ambu-lances were rushed to the scene from

ice to carry the injured. All telephone lines near Nixon went down as a result of the explosion and for a time it was impossible to locate the disaster, causing some delay in sending relief. The terrific shock caused thousands on the streets in nearby towns to pause in horror as as the earth trembled beneath them. The Police and newspaper men rushed to the telephones seeking information. 



By United Press. WASHINGTON, March 1.—"It's all bunk. There is no oil in the department of justice."

This was the reply given today by William J. Burnes to charges that he had tipped off Edward B. Mc-Lean that department of justice officials were investigating him. Burns is head of the bureau of investigation and formerly headed the Burns Detective Agency.

"This department has never investigated McLean," he said. "We have never been asked to do so. Further, I have never had any communication with McLean. If any message to that effect was sent, it is a lie. I have had nothing to do with Teaoot Dome and I hope the committee calls me so I can tell them so."

Burns said that code messages between William O. Duckstein, confidential employe of McLean, the Washington publisher, are not written in the present department of justice cipher.






