It is a well known fact that it is impossible to stand still. Progress must be made forward or retrogression backward; there is no backward progress.

Cities and towns are like human beings in that they must progress or retrograde, they must climb or fall, they must keep busy or go asleep.

To go forward, to progress, requires work; united, co-operative, co-ordinated work. It is silly to believe that a community, any more than an individual, can advance without making the effort to do so. It is selfish for any member of a community to try to stand still, so far as personal efforts are concerned, yet expect to advance with the community when it is pushed ahead by the work of others. It is as futile as self-

A city is no bigger than its people make it. The people must have vision, they must have confidence, they must work, they must work together, connectedly, continually. These things bring results and, in city building, will overcome any obstacle. And this does not mean may-be.

It is the duty of every citizen of Ranger to support the Chamber of Commerce, not with money alone, but with work and cooperation and confidence. No one of these elements in achieving success should be omitted; each must have the support of all the others.

What business man would embark in trade without some capital for his initial investment, or, after starting, would refuse to give the enterprise the necessary work, confidence, study and financial support for its maintenance and growth?
