CONSTANTINOPLE IS BEING MADE

BING (United Press Staff Corespondent) CONSTANTINOPLE, March 11.— Since the transfer of the Turkish government to Angora and the abolition of the temporal powers of the Caliph, Constantinople, center and capital of the civilized world 1600 years ago and still a treasure house of architectural and scenic splendor, is trying to make up for its loss of political influence, by developing into a great international tourist center, organized on modern Western lines


