Dallas Cotton School Proving Big Success.

 DALLAS, March 21.—The Dallas school of cotton, organized in 1924, already has turned out many successful cotton men. It is backed by leading Dallas cotton men and, in an eight-week course, gives practical instruction in classing, stapling, buying, selling f. o. b. interior, shipping, brokerage, office system and the rules governing both purchase and sale of spot and future cotton.
 It is said there is a scarcity of good cotton classers in Texas, the greatest of cotton producing states, for which reason this school was organized by a group of practical and long experienced cotton men of Dallas to offer intelligent training to men for this profession. Eight weeks is required for the course, during which for five and one-half hours each day a student sees and hears only cotton. Students may enroll any time.

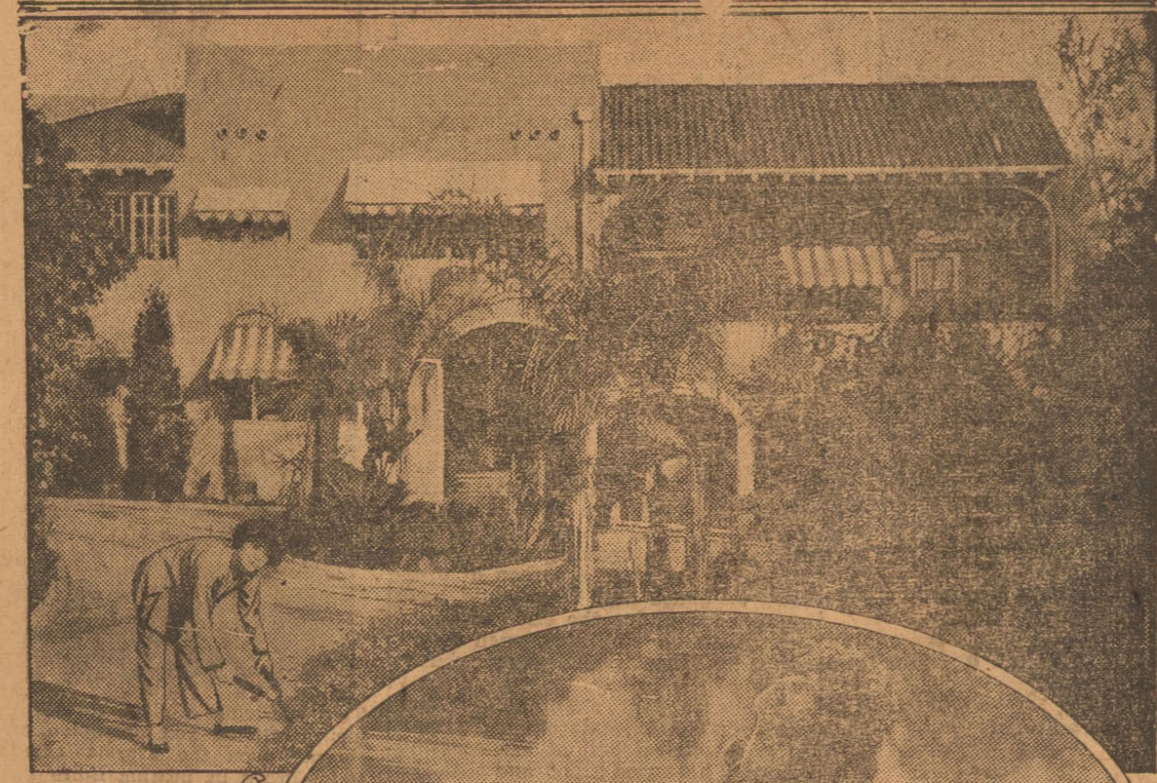

 Everybody knows, of course, that she has always been a favorite of men picture-lovers everywhere. Her alluring glances, her perfect form, her marvelous dancing—here's a collection of charms to which no man could possibly be indifferent.
 But a far more significant thing is this: She's at the same time that greatly to be envied rarity, a woman's woman. It's the women who are commenting most upon her perennial youthfulness and who comment not in a spirit of envy, but, rather, with a wealth of admiration—and awe.
 Nazimova is young, and she keeps her precious youth by owning a multitude of varied interests. She differs from the traditional artiste who passes the hours of the stage or the production lot in solitude and the nursing of her temperament. She loves life. She's not content in those about her. She belongs. And foremost among her interests is her home.
 In Hollywood is an artistic little house that the barker on the rubber-neck wagons point out as "The house that Nazimova built." Between pictures Nazimova, having turned over and over in her mind her conception of a homey nest, sketched it on paper just as she wanted it. She did more than draw a few lines and curves. She figured out everything according to scale.
 She did not stop hearing until she drew the exact floor distance from the bottom step of the porch to the top of the roof. She even

placed the drain-pipes—on paper—with the exact indications of the space they were to occupy. And when she submitted the specifications to an architect there was mighty little left for that trained expert to do.
 Now there is no disputing that a woman who, in building a home, is her own architect and engineer hasn't time to grow old, at least until the house is ready for occupancy. Even then Nazimova didn't sit down and bid the wrinkles come. When the carpenters and plasterers moved out the interior decorator moved in, and that was Nazimova at her superlative best. Not for her is a room merely a room. She determined that each should be endowed with individuality; should express the particular mood which was hers at the moment she gave attention to it. Purples, greens, oranges and yellows predominated, not in a melange, but as separate emotional expressions.
 Interiorly the house has never been finished—perhaps never will be—for she is constantly revising the color scheme. Logically, if one's emotions change from day to day, so also must emotion-expressing decorations.

Nazimova, don't forget, is the Polish girl who entered America by the melting-pot route, whose home for months was on New York's sordid, throbbing East Side, just as for a long time before that it had been in London's drab, teeming Whitechapel—because she could afford no other. There's a wealth of romance in her rise to fame and affluence.
 When she acted first in London it was in the production of the first Russian play that city had ever seen. Owen Johnson, the American novelist, who is a Russian scholar, was there at the time, and was of great assistance in acquainting her with English customs and the mysteries of the London

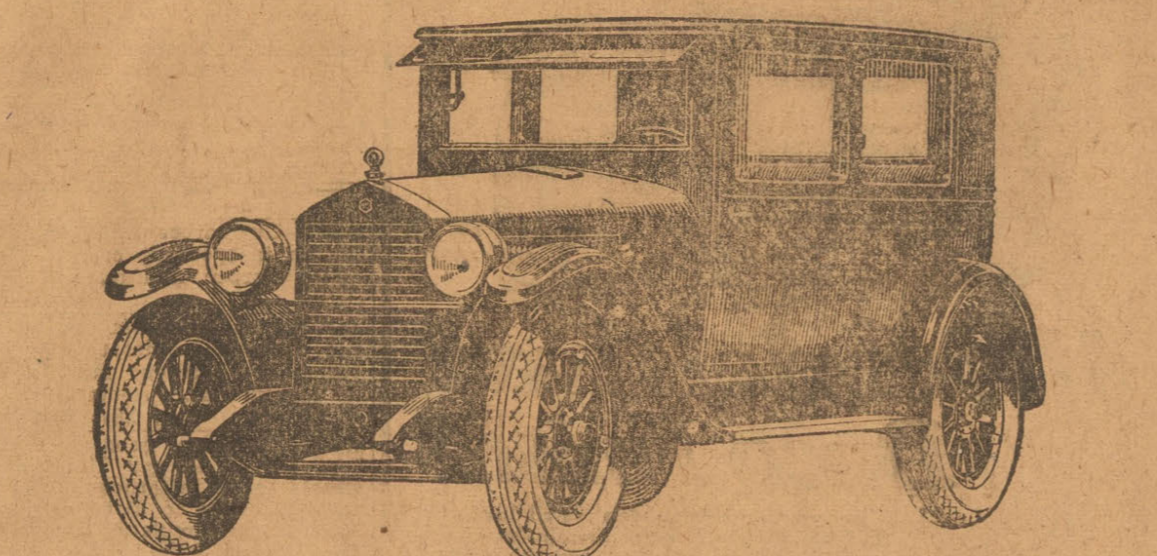

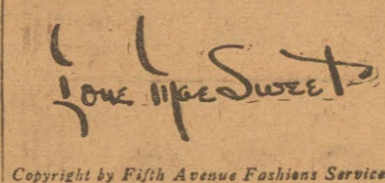

Hunt's Washington Letter

WASHINGTON — Two active War service men landed in the United States Senate as a result of recent elections.

Both Means and Bingham saw overseas service in the recent war with Germany.

Something of the attitude these two civilian fighters may be expected to reveal toward soldier legislation during their terms in the Senate was disclosed during the debate on a measure providing for retirement with pay equivalent to that allowed regular army officers of similar rank and disability.

"We now have," says Means, "for the first time in the United States, a definite military policy. That policy is that there shall be a small standing army, and that in time of need we will depend upon our civilian soldiers.

will depend upon them and their ability to lead men.

"We say to them: 'When we take you into the army we will give you the same rank, the same uniform, the same pay and emoluments of office—everything that an army officer has.

"But—if you go to the front and are wounded, you will not receive the retirement privilege or the compensation that will be received by the regular army officer.

BINGHAM, championing equality with Means the proposal for disability retirement for reserve officers, equal with that of regulars, maintains further that officers retired because of equal disabilities, should have equal pay, regardless of their respective rank.

"Under the proposed retirement schedule," Bingham told his fellow senators, "if I had been disabled while flying as a major, and had lost two fingers of one hand, I would be entitled to be placed upon the retired list of the army and for the rest of my life receive a salary of \$2250 a year.

"But if my mechanic, riding in the front seat, having only the grade of sergeant, had been similarly injured, he would receive for that same disability only \$370 a year.

"Some of us were more lucky than others and got higher ranks. Because of my luck in having been commissioned a major, I would have received, under the plan proposed, if disabled, seven times as much as my sergeant.

"That is not justice to the service man—at least it does not seem so to me."

Menus for a Family
SISTER MARY

Breakfast—Stewed dried peaches, cereal, thin cream, French toast, sirup, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Eggs in potato cases, raisin brown bread and butter sandwiches, scalloped bananas and apples, milk, tea.

Dinner—Baked calf's heart, baked potatoes, carrot timbales, grapefruit salad, whole wheat rolls, cottage pudding, milk.

A broiled lamb chop or finely chopped beef patty should be provided for juniors under 10 years of age in the dinner menu.

Eggs in Potato Cases
Four eggs, 2 large potatoes, 4 tablespoons grated cheese, 1 tablespoon butter, 3/4 cup white sauce, coarse stale bread crumbs.

Scrub potatoes and bake in a hot oven until done. Cut in half lengthwise and scoop out the mealy inside. Poach eggs in scalding, salted water. Season the potato pulp with salt, pepper and butter and line each potato shell with the seasoned pulp. Add one tablespoon white sauce and the poached egg. Add half the cheese to the remaining sauce and cover eggs with the sauce. Sprinkle with bread crumbs, grated cheese and dot with bits of butter. Put into a hot oven to brown the crumbs and melt the cheese.

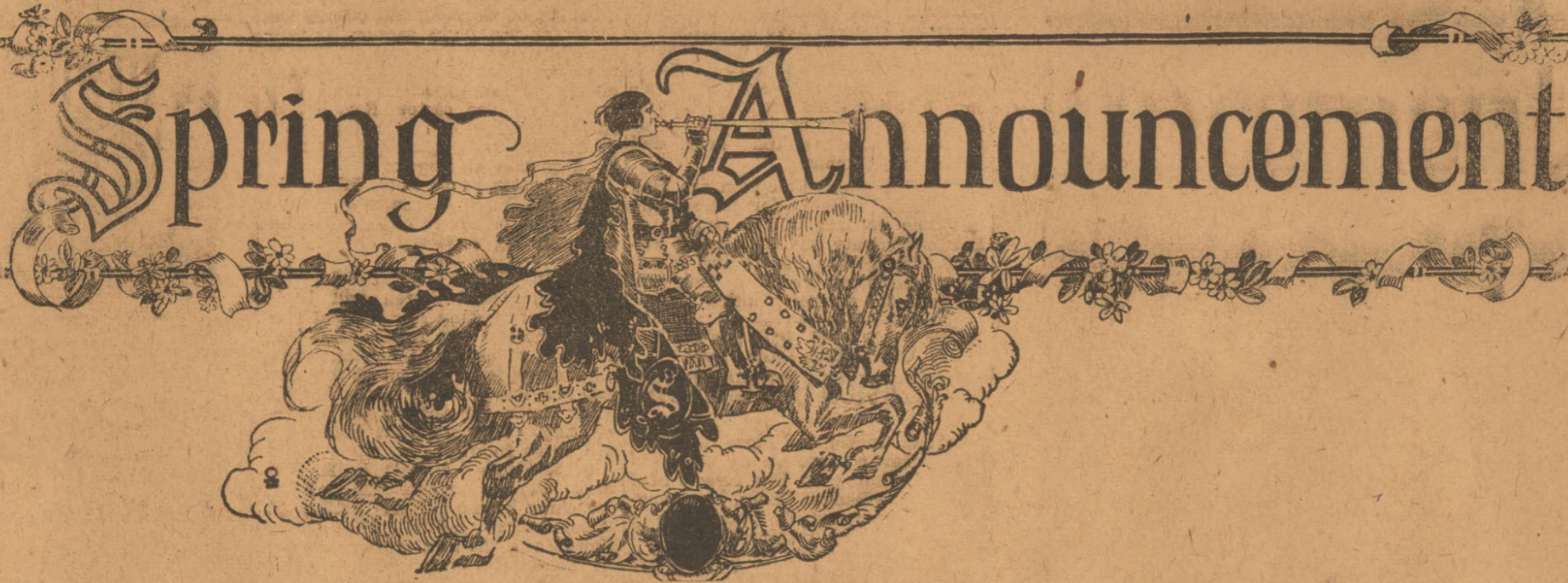

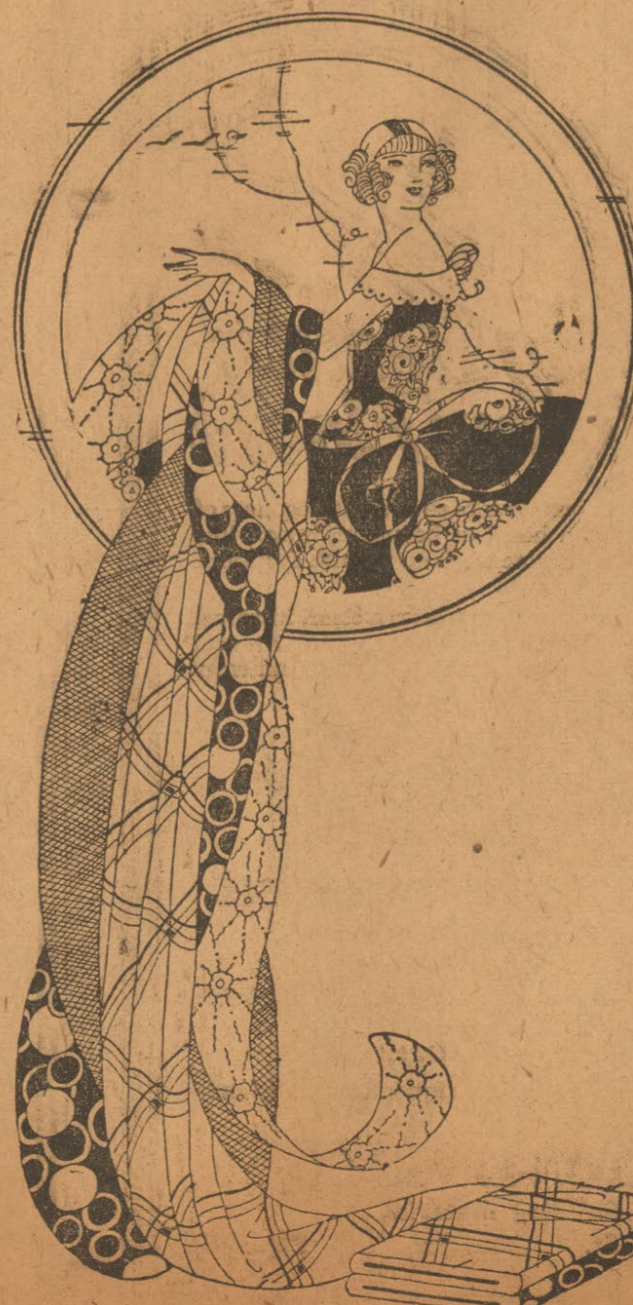

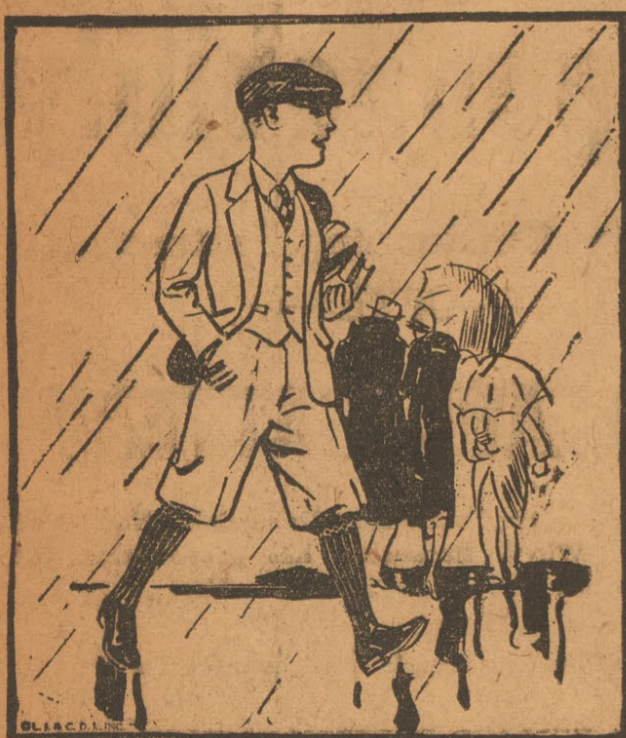

S. P. & S. S. A. Meets In Dallas March 30

AUSTIN.—The Southwestern Political and Social Science association will hold its sixth annual meeting in Dallas, March 29-April 1. The program will soon be announced by Dr. C. W. Ramsdell, of the University of Texas, who is chairman of the program committee. President W. M. W. Splawn of the University of Texas, is president of the association. Six sections of political and social science will be represented at the conference, including history, international relations, economics, sociology, government, and social psychology.

COLLEGE STATION.—Texas A. & M. with its record of being the only one of the large institutions in the United States showing a large increase in students who elect to study agriculture has been selected as an example to illustrate the value of giving men an opportunity to study the business as well as the productive side of agriculture by the leading agricultural journal of the United States. The recently added course in agricultural administration is one of the chief reasons for the increase of students here.

YEGGMEN SCORE TWO BANK JOB FAILURES

WACO, March 20—Yeggmen failed Thursday morning to rob the First State bank at Holland, 12 miles south of Temple, and the Ben Arnold State bank, 45 miles south of Waco. They left an acetylene torch in the Ben Arnold bank after burning a hole in the outer vault door, apparently being frightened away. They tried to burn their way into the bank vault at Holland, but failed and scooped up about \$40 in pennies. They held the night watchman at Holland a prisoner while they were trying to break into the vault and left him tied to a pole on the outside of the bank when they drove away.

COLLEGE STATION.—The prospect of fourteen or fifteen cent pork this fall is another strong argument for joining the 1925 Ton Litter contest advises A. L. Ward, extension swine husbandry of A. & M. Over \$100 in prizes will be offered also as inducement. Litters farrowed between February 15 and May 15 are eligible when ear marked by the county agent within ten days after farrowing.

Horticulturist Joins Ranger Nursery Plant

C. A. Meisenheimer, an experienced horticulturist, has arrived in Ranger to become associated with T. R. Valliant, who is building up an extensive nursery in Ranger below the cliffs of Ranger heights. Mr. Meisenheimer came to Ranger from Okmulgee, Okla., his home for several years, but previously he was propagandist for the Vestals in Little Rock. He is an expert in handling flowers and will have the direction of the nurseries.

COLLEGE STATION.—In teaching machine gunnery at Texas A. & M. this year \$11,000 worth of ammunition will be fired by the students. Texas A. & M. is the only school in the United States that is allowed to fire this course by the federal government, which means that this institution is the only place in the United States besides the regular army posts or schools where a man may qualify for the government designation of marksman or sharpshooter.

TORNILLO.—Movement under way for construction of bridge across Rio Grande river, two miles from here.

U. S. Patent Office Seeking Examiners

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The Civil Service commission has announced an examination to be held on April 22 and 23 for positions of assistant examiner in the United States patent office at Washington.

The entrance salary is \$1,860 a year. Promotions are provided for from time to time as high as \$5,000 a year. Full information and application blanks may be obtained from the U. S. Civil Service commission, Washington, D. C., or from the secretary of the U. S. Civil service board at the post office or customhouse in any city.

Last year the patent office received over 80,000 applications for patents. Of these, about 53,000 were allowed. More than 5,000 cases were forfeited after allowance by failure of the applicant to pay the issue fee. About one-third of all patents now issued by our government relate to some phase of the automobile industry.

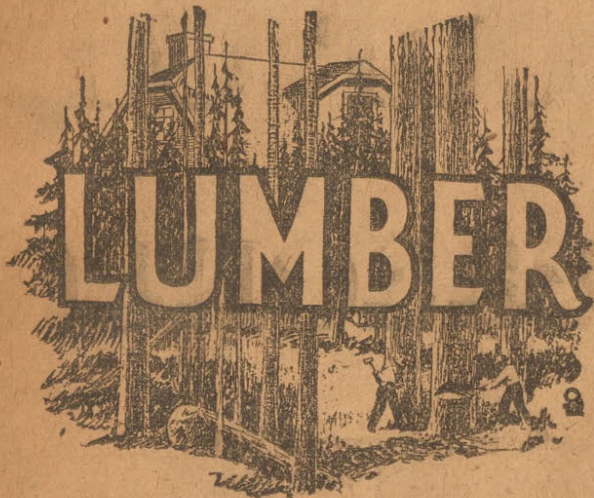

Increasing Service To Radio Listeners

Discussing radio, Secretary Hoover of the department of commerce says:

"There can be but one point of view in the consideration of radio regulation and development. That is to assure increasing service to the listener. The radio is steadily enriching our homes. More particularly to our farmer folks it is bringing more of those contacts that the town population have long enjoyed up to this time. The road of progress is to stimulate the development of the art; to secure greater perfection of reception, increase in the number of alternative programs and better programs."

Concerning charges of radio monopoly which have been made, Mr. Hoover says:

"There is no monopoly of radio broadcasting or any sign of it. There are only four or five concerns in the entire United States which own or operate more than one station and of the total 563 stations in action, not more than four belong to any one of them."

"Millionaire Orphan's" Death Recalls Other Nefarious and Baffling "Baccili" Murder Plots

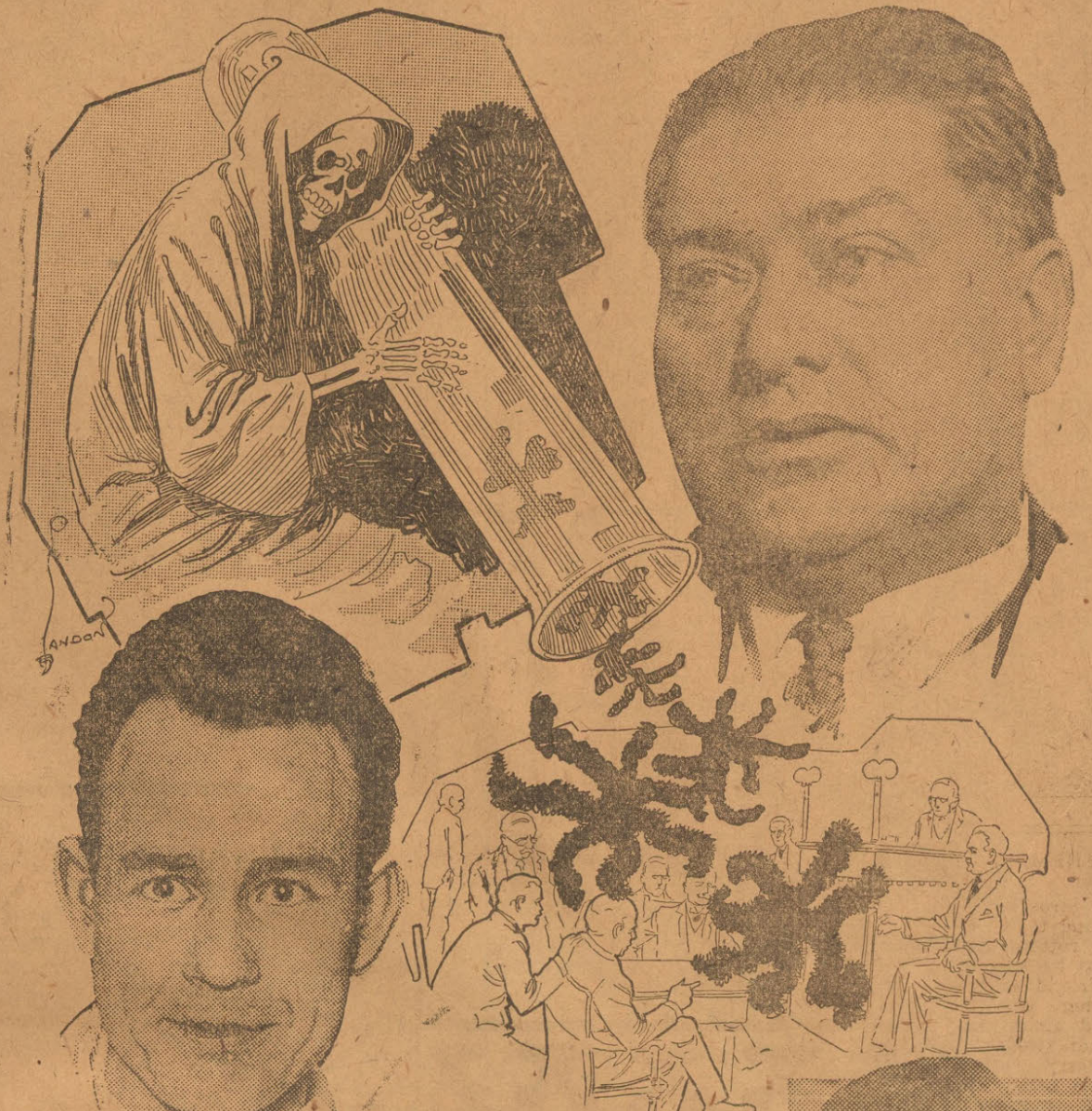

CHICAGO, March 21.—Germs! Terrible, subtle, cowardly weapons of murder! Yet germ murders are rare. Three proven cases are of record. These will be closely investigated by state and defense attorneys in the death of William McClintock, "millionaire orphan," for whose death William Shepherd and

Dr. C. C. Faiman have been indicted.
Of all possible methods of malicious homicide, the administration of disease germs is most apt to excite the imagination. Some of the most intricate and dramatic trials in history have occurred in connection with poison cases. One such, still less than a decade old, is recalled. Dr. Arthur Warren Waite was a young and promising dentist of New York city. He lived with his young wife in an uptown residential neighborhood. He was socially acceptable and had won some distinction as a tennis player. Believed in Innocence. When he was accused of having murdered his wife's father and

wife, Madame Jeanne Girard, and a friend, Mademoiselle Josephine Doucteau.
Girard died awaiting trial. His wife and friend were sentenced to 20 years' imprisonment. Girard had supported the women in luxury for years. He was an insurance agent, who in spare time studied bacteriology.
His procedure in crime was always the same. He cultivated acquaintances, ingratiated himself into their friendship and sold them insurance. The policy would be taken out in the victim's name, but Girard would forge his acceptance and application, and using an assumed name for a beneficiary. Then,

taking advantage of a meal in common, he dosed his victims with one of his strange alkaloid drugs or infected them with the germs of disease—typhoid or pneumonia. As soon as his victim died, he would collect the insurance.
Recent Attempt.
A recent germ poisoning attempt which did not end fatally for the victim was the efforts of Clarence O. Baring of New York to poison his wife.
Mrs. Baring, a witness against her husband, told of quarrels over her husband's devotion to another woman. On Baring's plea for forgiveness they became reconciled.
Returning from a trip to Europe,

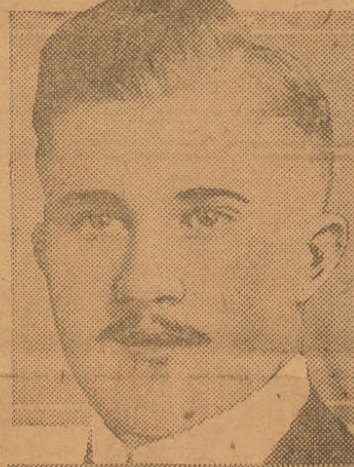
Mrs. Baring became ill. Investigation led to the arrest of her husband and he confessed that he had given his wife arsenic and diphtheria and pneumonia germs. He was confined to a sanitarium.
Case of Dr. Hyde.
In 1919 Dr. Hyde, a former village doctor who had married millionaire Colonel Swope's daughter in Kansas City, was accused of killing his wealthy father-in-law by slowly inoculating his system with deadly typhoid fever germs. After three trials over a period of years the case was dropped by the Kansas City prosecutor because the county commissioners refused to appropriate further funds to convict Hyde.

mother by administering to them doses of poison and disease germs his numerous acquaintances were incredulous and angry.
But, he was arrested and in court under oath he unfolded an amazing story of bacteria, poisons and intricate murder plots as no sane fic-

tionist would have dared to invent. In September, 1915, Dr. Waite married Miss Clara Peck, daughter of J. E. Peck, wealthy retired druggist of Grand Rapids, Mich. Soon after New Year's the bride's parents visited their daughter in New York. The health of the elder Mrs.



Peck failed, and on Jan. 30, 1916, she died, supposedly of Bright's disease.
Dr. Waite accompanied the body to Grand Rapids and arranged the funeral. Then J. E. Peck began to fail, and six weeks later, March 12, he died.
Again the doctor went to Michigan with the body. He suggested cremation but the family refused. A mysterious note asked the family to have an autopsy performed. This was done, and led to the arrest and confession of Dr. Waite.
Pays With Life.
He had committed the murders, he said, to place his wife in possession of her parents' fortune. He was electrocuted at Sing Sing.
A dramatic story of crime and intrigue was disclosed in the arrest in Paris of "Gentleman" Girard, his

Menus for a Family

Breakfast—Baked apples, cereal, thin cream, cinnamon toast, creamed mutton on toast, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Noodle soup, toast, raisin and pepper salad, strawberry jam cake, milk, tea.

Dinner—Stewed brisket of beef, mashed potatoes, buttered parsnips, spring salad, whole wheat bread, jellied prune pudding, milk, coffee.

The cinnamon toast adds a piquant touch to an otherwise mildly flavored breakfast.

The creamed mutton is planned to use up some of the "left-over" of a braised mutton dinner.

Stewed Brisket of Beef

Six pounds fresh brisket of beef, vinegar, salt, 3 carrots, 1 small turnip, 2 onions, 10 peppercorns, "bouquet-garni," 2 tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons flour. Wipe meat with a damp cloth and rub well with vinegar and salt. Use as much vinegar as the meat will absorb and about 3 teaspoons salt. Let stand three hours. Put into a kettle just large enough to hold the meat and pour over boiling water to cover. Bring to the boiling point and skim well. Simmer for one hour and add carrots and turnips diced and onion cut in thin slices. Mince the herbs in the "bouquet-garni" and add with two teaspoons salt and peppercorns to meat. Cover closely and cook two hours longer. Melt butter, stir in flour and cook, stirring constantly until a rich brown. When meat is tender, put on a hot platter, remove bones and surround with vegetables. Strain stock, add enough boiling water to make two cups, and add to browned butter. Stir until boiling. Let boil two minutes, season with salt and pepper and serve.

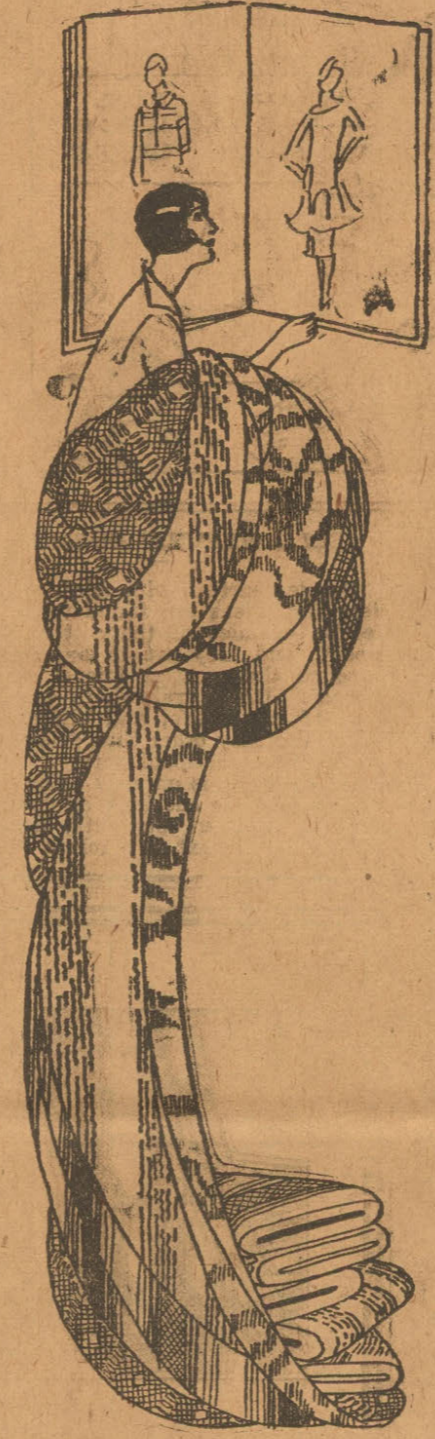
