Shepherd's Attorneys Launch Legal Battle To Free Their Client

CHICAGO, March 21 .--- William D. Shepherd, temporarily stalled in his efforts to be released on bond, must continue as a prisoner in the county jail. The man who is accused of murdering his millionaire ward Billie McClintock, appeared in court today while his attorneys argued with Judge Hopkins to release him on bond. The motion was bitterly contested by State Attorney Robert E. Crowe.



### National Red Cross Heads Think 'Dread **Pestilence'** Frenzy

CHICAGO, March 21 .- Spurred on by courage that refused to acknowl-edge defeat, the survivors of the tornado, Wednesday. that wrought destruction in southern Illinois and the "pocket" of Indiana tonight were engaged in the work of reconstruc-Doctors and other relief work ers devoted their efforts to prevent-ing outbreaks of a pestilence. Anti-toxins to prevent spread of pnue-monia, lockiaw and other ills were being brought into the stricken dis-tricts. Fully \$1,000,000 was raised in Chicago for relief work. National Red Gross officials reports indicate the 'anticipated pestilence outbreak' is decidedly over rated.

CHICAGO, March 21.—With 54 dead reported from Kentucky, Ala-bama and Tennessee, the total dead stoed tonight at 843 as the toll of Wednesday's cyclone.

ST. LOUIS, March 21.—The major problem in Illinois and Indiana areas devastated by cyclonic fury Wednes-day is how to feed and clothe the homeless and ward off pestilence. Relief work is proceeding satisfactorily, according to United Press advices today.



Collier declared he shot young Robertson to prevent him from tak-ing his daughter, Mary Frances, to live in the Robertson home, which he knew to be of ill repute.

"After my wife had told me about what Robertson had done to my daughter and that he was going to take her to his house, I lost my mind. I lost my self-control," Collier de-clared, admitting he shot the boy.



The jury found that Wheat approached the crossing at a greaten rate of speed than a person of ordi-nary prodence and care would have approached under the circumstance but failed to find that such negligence by Wheat was the approximate cause of the injury.

The defendant maintained it was not required to maintain a flagman or an electrical bell at the crossing where Wheat was killed and that the deceased had been guilty of contribu-tory negligence in failing to see the approaching train and driving onto the crossing

### Los Angeles May Get **1928 Olympic Games**

By United Press. THE HAGUE, March 21.-The Olympic games for 1928 may, after all, go to Los Angeles, if Holland fails to raise the necessary funds. Much to the surprise of the government, great opposition has de-veloped to the proposal of the min-ister of education for an appropriation of 1,000,000 florins-roughly \$400,000-for the support of the Olympic games, scheduled for Am-sterdam in 1928.

If the government is defeated, then Holland will have to consider he question of supporting the games by private subscription. Failing that, then the Olympic committee, will have to reconsider Los Angeles' pe-tition for the games in 1928.

At present the government's request for an appropriation has been referred to 'the special committee for new bills in the chamber, where great opposition from the protestant party "on principle" has developed. This opposition, plus that of the Catholic party and of certain social emocrats, makes it extremely unkely that the appropriation will be granted

Failing a government appropria tion due to public sentiment, pro-ponents of the games will have to struggle for a public subscription. If that fails, then Los Angeles stands an excellent chance of capturing the games.
