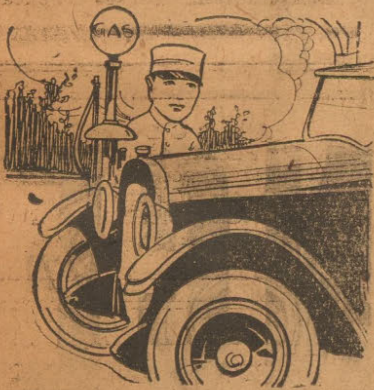

## Flaring Headlights In Texas Soon Will Be Thing of Past

Special Correspondence.

AUSTIN—For the past two weeks the photometric laboratory of the University of Texas has been carrying on extensive experiments and trials concerning the new motor vehicle law. The purpose of this work is to perfect and test the various proposed methods for prevention of glaring and blinding headlights. The law requires a sufficient intensity of light on the road, and limits the intensity above the road to the level of the eyes of a driver 100 feet away. It has been found that at this distance, light of over 800 observed candlepower blinds the approaching motorist.

This station which has been officially designated by the state is one of the three stations in the United States which are carrying on work of this nature, the others being the Electrical Testing Laboratory of New York, and the Bureau of Standards at Washington.

The anti-glare law becomes effective Sept. 1, and by this time 3,500 testing stations will be established throughout the state. In Travis county alone, 31 garages have been designated as testing stations, and all car owners of the state of Texas are required to have their car lights tested on or before Sept. 1, 1925, and all defects adjusted.

It is estimated that 75 per cent of the present automobiles have lights that are capable of being adjusted, with nominal expense, to meet the requirements of the new law, according to officials of the photometric laboratory. At each state station there will be a fee for examination of 25 cents, plus any charge for adjustment, and all car owners will be required to show a certificate of such examination.

LANDSLIDE-MADE LAKE BEING CLOSELY WATCHED

JACKSON, Mon., July 2.—Seepage of the water through the avalanche which last week transformed the Gros Ventre river valley into a 5,000 acre lake, was being closely watched today by residents of the lower valley.

Fear of destruction by flood has not entirely abated among residents of the section. It was feared the cascading river might tear its way through the mile-wide dam loosely packed with boulders. The main road into the region was not interfered with by either of the two slides into the valley.

Congressmen Would Be Intelligent If They Would Eat Right, Says Solon

If you cherish the opinion that the level of intelligence among our national legislators is declining, you're barking up the wrong tree, according to Royal S. Copeland, United States Senator from New York. Senator Copeland, who is also a physician, writes in Liberty, that our national legislators would be allright if they didn't clog their bodies and brains by persistent overeating. "If the fate of this country and other nations depended knowledge, so ill founded and defective as the average statesman shows in the selection of his food, the world would go to the 'how-wows,'" says Senator Copeland. "This may seem an extravagant statement of the situation but one does not have to be an expert to observe the steady increase of girth and embonpoint of statesmen which takes place between the beginning and the end of a congressional session."

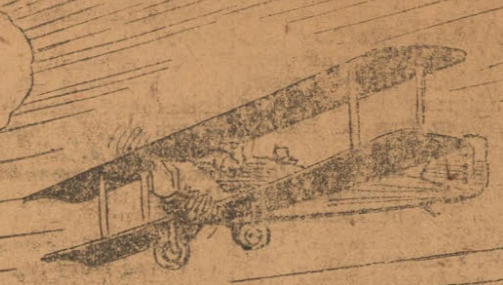

# Stewart's Washington Letter

WASHINGTON—Upon the next twelvemonth's political developments growing out of Senator Robert M. La Follette's death depends national Progressivism's future, perhaps for many years.  
Is Progressivism a movement of which La Follette was no more than a part—a mighty important part—but only a part?  
Or was he the whole thing?  
If the former's the case, of course, even the death of a strong leader can spell no more than a temporary setback, a little more delay.  
If the latter, the cause, too, is dead.  
To be sure, there'll be progress, with a small "p," but the group the Wisconsin senator led inevitably will break up—various political careers probably will end with the expiration of current terms.

ONE thing which suggests weakness, at first thought, may prove to be Progressivism's strength—though referred to as a "bloc," it never was a hard-and-fast alignment, like a party, with regular adherents, requiring to be led.  
Still, La Follette did sound the call for every rally which the independents made.  
Will somebody else be found to do this in his places? Or is no particular leader needed?  
The next session of Congress will begin to show. Administration spokesmen profess to feel sure already that insurgency is a thing of the past.  
In reality, nobody can tell without a definite test.

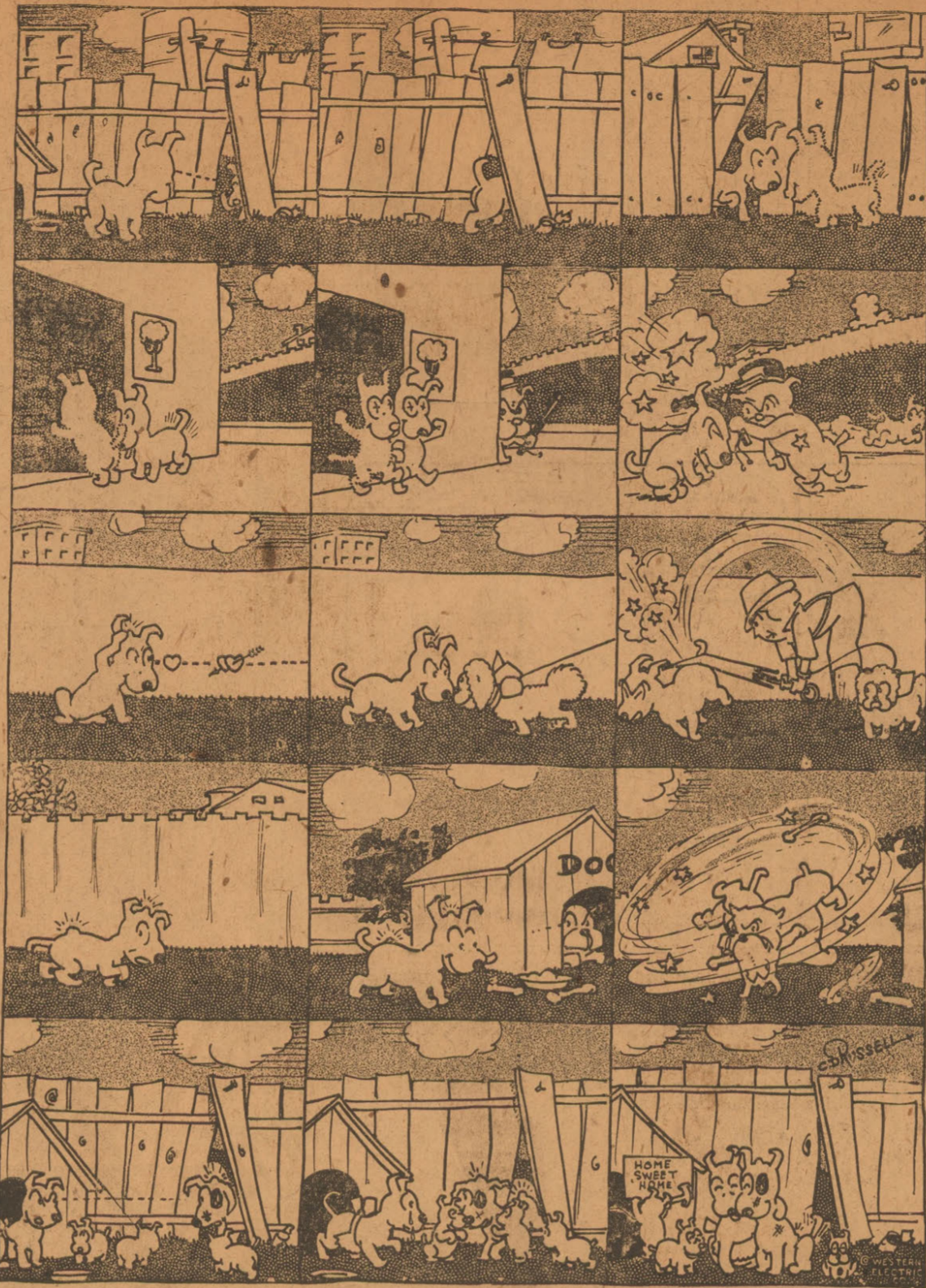
Progressivism's fate depends on a successor to La Follette who can fill his shoes, nobody's in sight.  
Senator Borah has the necessary qualities of strength, courage and magnetism, but he isn't a Progressive—with a big "P"—all the time. A follower may be a partner, but a leader must be consistently on the job.  
Senator Norris is so regular in his Progressive-ism as to be almost the real thing, but he hasn't

the pugnacity La Follette possessed. He can put up a terrific fight when he likes, but he doesn't always like.  
Senator Wheeler's a "whole hog" Progressive and nobody ever was readier for a scrap, but he isn't as yet, a political heavyweight, which is essential in this case.  
Besides, he's a Democrat, and to be effective at this time, Progressivism needs to draw from the Republicans' strength.  
That about exhausts the list of availables.  
Progressivism, if it's to survive without La Follette, must survive on its own merits. It can't hope to be pulled through by virtue of strong leadership.  
This, of course, refers to the Progressivism which was launched at the Cleveland conference of a year ago.  
Something else may develop later along the same lines. That's a different thing.

NEEDLESS to say, the regular Republicans will spare no effort, having been afflicted far worse by Progressivism than it has troubled the Democrats, to make Wisconsin safe for regularity at the election of 1926.  
With La Follette gone, they are much more hopeful of Senator Lenroot's return to the upper house and hopes are expressed of putting a regular in La Follette's own seat.  
They can't do this until November of next year, since the vacancy will be filled temporarily by Governor Blaine's appointment, and, as he is a Progressive himself, a Progressive will be his choice.

ONE remark by Senator Wheeler may prove significant—that "La Follette dead will be more powerful even than La Follette alive."  
This isn't impossible. His name may become one to conjure by.  
With his death, much of the bitterness which was felt toward him living will disappear.  
Idealized, it is quite likely there will be immense strength for the cause he preached in his memory—perhaps a strength greater than his own, a living man on the Senate floor.

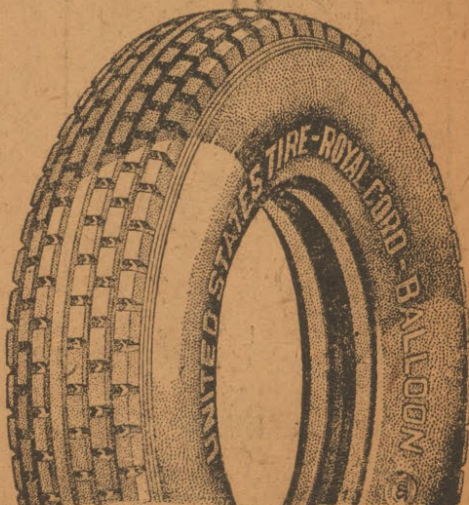

*Tested by SISTER MARY*

**Breakfast**—Chilled cantaloupe, poached eggs and spinach on toast, milk, coffee.

**Luncheon**—Jellied vegetable salad, cream cheese sandwiches, steamed cherry pudding, milk, tea.

**Dinner**—Broiled halibut steaks, lemon butter, baked potatoes, buttered new beets, sliced tomatoes, orange ice, sponge cake, rye bread, milk, coffee.

With the exception of the melon and the luncheon dessert there are no dishes suggested in the menus that cannot be served to children as young as four years. The tomatoes should be perfectly ripe, pared, seeds removed and finely cut. The beets should be minced. A small dish of the ice, eaten slowly will be greatly relished by a small person.

**Steamed Cherry Pudding**  
 One egg, 2-3 cup sugar, 1-2 cup molasses, 1-2 cup white flour, 1-1-4 cups Graham flour, 4 tablespoons butter, 1-2 cup hot water, 1 teaspoon soda, 2 cups stoned cherries, 1-8 teaspoon salt, 1-2 teaspoon cinnamon.  
 Cream butter and beat in sugar and molasses. Mix flours and add to first mixture. Add salt and cinnamon. Add egg well beaten. Stir in cherries and add hot water with soda dissolved in it. Beat well and turn into a buttered mold. Steam two hours and serve with sugar and cream, lemon sauce or hard sauce.
