Crummer Investment company, bond dealers, by the terms of which the latter are to refund the city's bonded indebtedness, which will mean a sav-ing to Eastland city taxpayers of \$707,000 in a period of 37 years, the length of time the bonds are to run. This service is to cost the city ab-solutely nothing. The city's bonded indebtedness is \$815,000, which is in the form of 6 per cent 40-year bonds. These are

per cent 40-year bonds. These are what are termed term bonds and no part of the principal can be paid un-til the entire lot has matured, unless the 20-year option is exercised, which would make it necessary for the city to pay interest on the full amount of the bonded indebtedness for 35 years, which is the number of years the bonds are yet to run. This interest amounts to \$48,900 per year or \$1,711,500 on the 35 years. The city must also set aside one-fortieth of the amount of the bonds each vegr as a sibling fund with which the year as a sinking fund with which to pay off the bonds when they have matured. This sinking fund caunot be paid to the bondholders, but remains a liability to the city for the

entire time. By refunding these bonds and exchanging for the 6 per cent term bonds a like amount of 5 per cent serial bonds, the great saving is made because of the fact that the serial bonds are paid, interest and principal, yearly, thereby eliminat-ing interest. 





Immense Gasser is Flowing Near Graham From 715-Foot Level

GRAHAM, July 17 .- One of the biggest gassers ever found in Young county was uncovered Thursday aft-ernoon at 715 feet by the Hubbard Drilling company on its Tom Price No. 14, 14 miles south of Graham, en Fish creek.

The gas flow measures more than 20,000,000 feet and may rank the well as the biggest shallow gasser in

the country. The well is a wildcat, three miles The well is a wildcat, three miles south of the Bashara pool and sev-eral miles east of the Ray shallow gasser in Throckmorton county, which was discovered a year and a half ago and is still producing over 5,000,000 feet of gas.

TWO BURNED TO DEATH AFTER AUTO OVERTURNS GAS AND GASOLINE GET MIXED IN NEWS REPORT


