OIL PUMP PERIOD NEEDED FOR COOL MOTOR

The action of the oil pump is is one of the most important functions of any in the engine cooling cycle, and must be carefully watched or trouble is very liable to ensue.

When the oil pump breaks or be-

comes inoperative for any reason, oil cannot be circulated throughout the parts that need circulation. The rnubbing steel surfaces then become dry and friction sets in. During each second, in a six-cylinder engine of 3 1-4 inch stroke and 4 1-2 inch bore, the six pistons travel a com-bined lineal distance of 195feet, rub-bing over a total surface area of 165 3-4 square feet per second—or 9945 square feet per minute. The important function of the oil pump is apparent then as this large area must

be adequately lubricated. Before the invention of the heat in-dicating device placed on the radiator cap, the motorist of course was not to blame if his engine burned out or the cylinders became scored. But ince this instrument, which signal the driver when his motor is overheat ing has been placed on most auto-mobiles, such an accident from this ource is almost inexcusable.



Federal taxes are coming down. There's no bluff about that. State, county and city taxes are increas-

ing steadily The former are not being cut and cannot be cut and nobody has a right to ask that they be cut as

fast as the latter are rising. What does it profit the taxlopped off his federal burden if twice that many per cent are added onto his local burden?

NCOME taxes almost certainly will be trimmed by another 25 per cent next winter. This doesn't necessarily mean, how-ever, that the man of moderate in-come will be relieved another 25 per cent, on top of his last year's

Secretary of the Treasury Mellon is determined to give a large share of the benefit this time to sur-taxpayers—a little of it to the smaller fry, but most of it to the

How this will come out nobody knows yet. There'll be a per capita decrease, but some millions of people may not come in on the per capita. Next December will tell, most likely.
