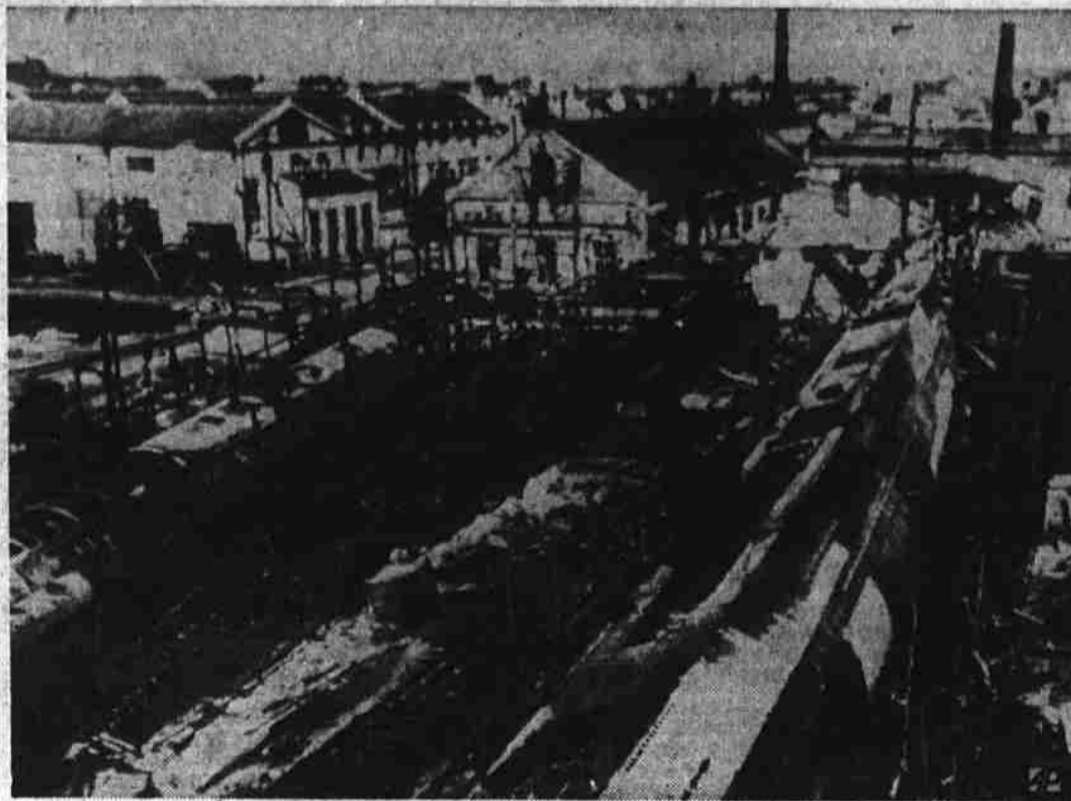

Promising U. S. Cooperation — Churchill Warns Japanese

LONDON, Aug. 25 (AP)—Prime Minister Churchill warned Japan yesterday that her campaign of military expansion must stop and pledged Great Britain to range herself beside the United States should the latter's efforts to secure to peaceful settlement in the Pacific fail.

Churchill said that the British people are now best, that the American people are now best, and that the British newspapers today. The Japanese, he said, "now stretch a grasping hand into the southern seas of China. They snatch Indo-China from the wretched Vichy French. They menace the Singapore-British link with Australia and menace the Philippines Islands which are under the protection of the United States."
