WASHINGTON, July 3.—Threat of a general strike of the nation's half-million coal miners, which would completely tie up next winter's fuel supply, has aroused the anxiety of government officials, who are watching the situation growing in intensity between operators and miners and threatening the life of the union organization, with both sides preparing to fight it out.

The trouble has been brewing for weeks. It had its origin in Northwestern Virginia fields, where the union was driven out. Coal mine operators, claiming they could not operate their mines except at a loss at the \$7.25 union wage scale, closed their pits, only to reopen them a few weeks later with miners to whom they paid a wage scale of \$4 to \$5. 


