Auto Fatalities During the First Six Months of This Year. WASHINGTON.—The department of commerce announces that reports of automobile fatalities in 1925 have been received from 77 cities of 100,000 population or more.

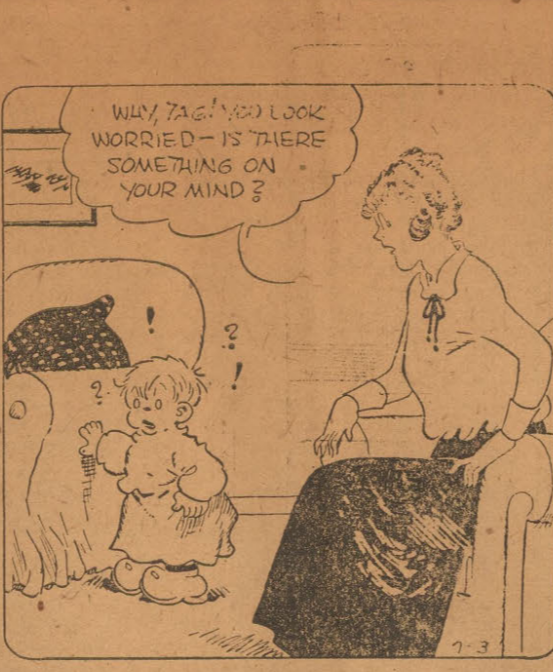
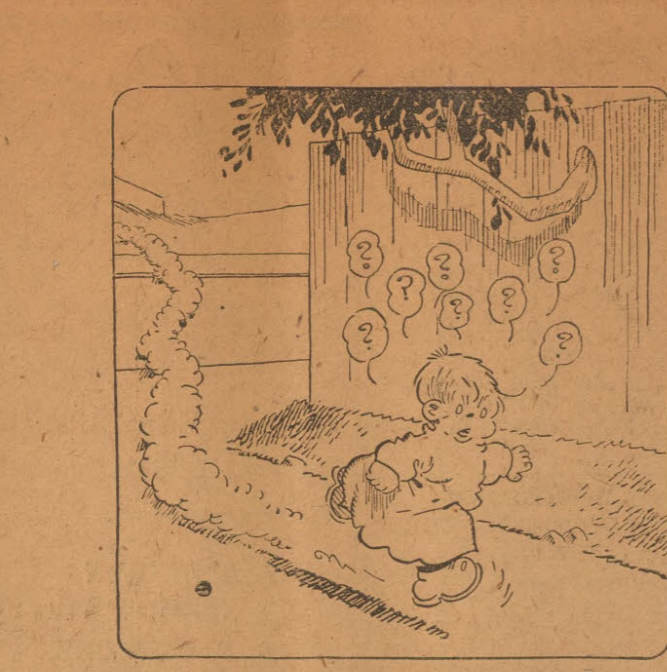

Any Old Kind of Whisky Declared Good Enough For Bootlegging Trade Among Lawbreakers of United States

LONDON (By mail to the United Press.)—Any old sort of hooch is good enough for the United States. This is the conclusion that British distillers here have drawn as to the German attitude toward whisky destined for export to America. It is based on a clipping just received in London from the Berlin agent of a local whisky house, which appeared in the "Answers to Correspondents" column of a German newspaper.

"How can whisky be prepared so as to avoid a prolonged period of maturing in cask? The whisky is destined for export. Quality is not required—the main question is one of cheap and rapid manufacture, so as to obtain whisky at the cheapest possible price."

And here is the answer:

"In Scotland and Ireland the following raw materials are used in the making of whisky: malt, barley, oats, wheat and rye. The proportions vary. As quality is not a consideration a mixture of 30 per cent rye and 40 per cent oats should meet your case. To obtain the characteristic odor smoked malt must be used. When the link has been fired

it should be stoked with oak logs which should be sprinkled with water thereby giving off much smoke, resulting in empyromatic and creosotic by-products. "The malt thus treated is then mixed with the mash and gives the distilled product the taste of genuine whisky. In case the smoky aroma is too noticeable an addition of neutral alcohol is recommended to obtain in a short time the milder taste which otherwise can only be obtained by storing in cherry casks for a long time."

BODY OF FOURTEENTH QUAKE VICTIM RECOVERED

SANTA BARBARA, July 3.—The ruins of Santa Barbara gave up the body of another earthquake victim today, when the body of Charles Knudson was found in the ruins of a rooming house. This brings the toll of death in the recent earthquake to 14.

Mrs. Mary Skibo, 39, has confessed that she killed her husband, Frank Skibo, at Michigan City, Ind., by beating him with a crow bar as he lay in a drunken stupor. She is held on a charge of murder.

But before confessing, she tried to fasten the blame on her daughter, Mary, 19, who she said had quarreled with Skibo over a loan of \$5.

The girl professed her innocence, however, and police finally got Mrs. Skibo to admit the killing. She murdered Skibo, she said, because he drank, squandered his money and made her take boarders.

After keeping his body in her room for 24 hours, Mrs. Skibo laid it in an alley, where passersby found it.

Powerful Wireless Station Presented By Republic of Mexico to Guatemala

GUATEMALA CITY, Guatemala (By mail to United Press.)—Guatemala is proud of the wireless station inaugurated in May. President Orellana, all the members of his cabinet, the Mexican Minister Mr. Gravioto, his Secretary and Legal Advisory Mr. de Huerta and all the members of the diplomatic corps, attended the formalities on the event of the inauguration accompanied by their wives and families, as well as many prominent members of the foreign colonies and of the best social circles of this capital.

Engineer Flores, chief of the wireless department in Mexico City, was the expert sent by the Mexican government to install the new apparatus (telefunken) and arrange the antennae belonging to the former installation. The new apparatus is a present of the Mexican republic to Guatemala and accordingly the Mexican minister delivered a speech appropriate to the occasion which was answered by the president of Guatemala.

Engineer Flores stated that the station's power is 10,000 watts, and its radius of action reaches 3,750 kilometers. Although not the most powerful in Spanish America, the new Guatemala City station, is far superior to any other there for practical purposes, as its waves are so "clean" that their communicative intensity facilitates the transmission of messages when other stations are unable to work owing to adverse atmospheric conditions.

At the time the inauguration was celebrated, President J. M. Orellana of Guatemala, and General Elias Calles, president of Mexico trans-

mitted through the new station reciprocal salutations appropriate to the occasion. The secretaries of state of both countries also exchanged messages expressive of friendship.

Guatemala has three wireless stations, New York, San Francisco, Washington, New Orleans, etc., may soon enjoy the music of the Mayas played by pure Indian natives on their aboriginal instrument, the "marimba."

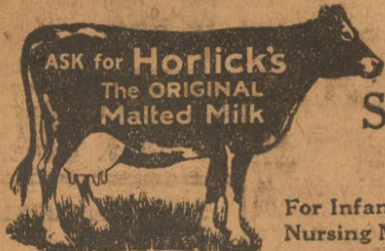
