

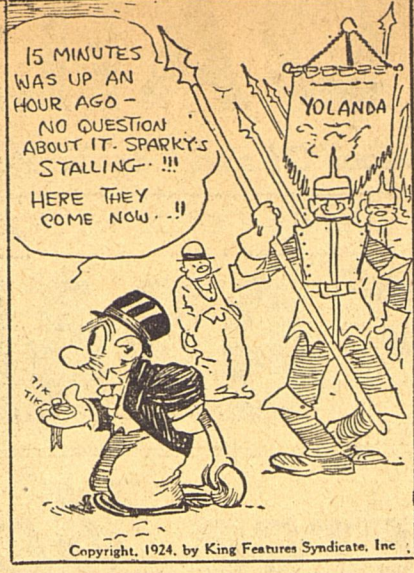
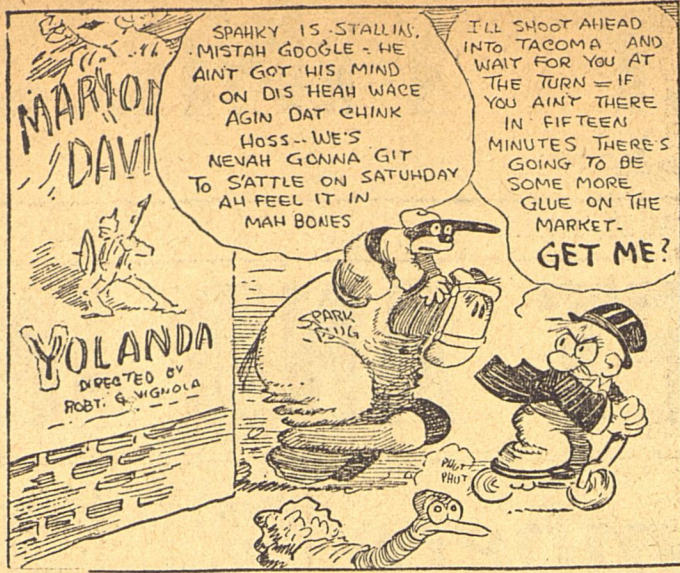

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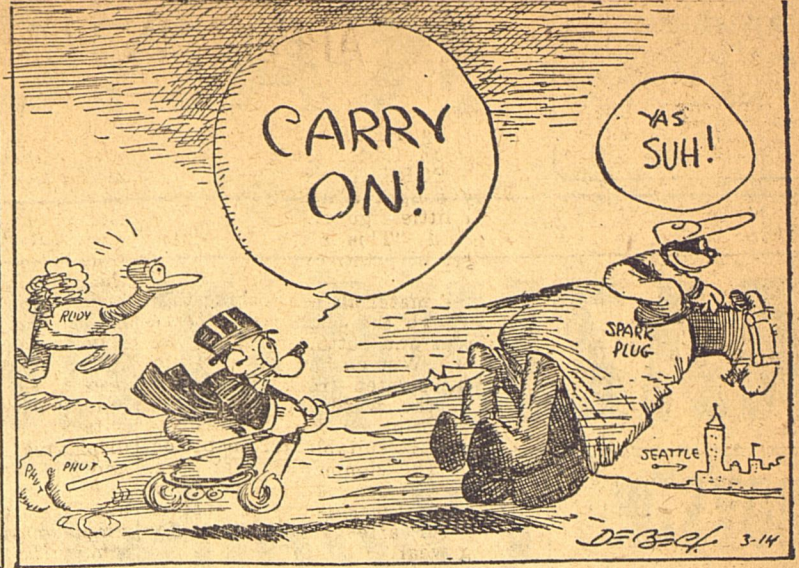

CONFUSION OF LAWS
Secretary Hughes asserts that while we have vindicated the right of self government, the United States falls in good government because of a profusion and confusion of laws. He says that each year 12,000 statutes and 13,000 recorded rulings of highest courts set forth in 175,000 pages of decisions. Even courts and lawyers know little about them, nor care very much until some one of them has been violated and no one knows what constitutes a violation of a given statute until a court of high authority has passed on that particular case.

Thirty years ago, says Mr. Hughes, there were 50,000 unconvicted murderers at large in the land and there may be twice that many now. Evidently our system is near the point of breaking down under its own weight. Instead of multiplying statutes, the work of repealing them should begin. If codification has become impracticable, as Mr. Hughes intimates, and if multiplicity of precedents tangles the administration of justice year by year, what recourse remains unless it be to establish what might be called a philosophy of law or a broad restatement of general principles to be applied by judges to the particular case.

It might thus be practicable to enforce the spirit if not the letter of the law; and perhaps no more is needful, since we are told that the letter killeth, but the spirit giveth life.

WHAT IS A "YANKEE?"
A "Yankee" is a New Englander and one of several generations of New England descent. New England inhabitancy, not some special strain of blood, is the criterion. Many "Yankee" families bear German names. Many of the original New Englanders were British, and many more were Irish—not all Presbyterians either. The Huguenot French were a very large element.

The "Yankee" owes some of his traits to his surroundings. He lives in a land of long winters, and the habit of saving the abundance of summer to support life in the cold season has made him frugal, perhaps parsimonious. Economy was a necessity with him. Learning to make the most of what lay to hand, adversity overcome, has sharpened his wits, made him ingenious, full of "Yankee tricks." He has become opulent through sheer force of unremitting industry, intellectual and physical effort. No sudden endowments of nature helped him, no mines of precious metals, scarcely even of the baser metals, no oil wells, no soil stuffed with the riches of decayed verdure of ages, as in the prairie states. What he won he fought for against hard odds, and, as has always been the case throughout history when a race conquers resisting nature instead of supinely receiving her largesse, reached a high mental development.

The following notice has been placed in the lobby of the Hotel Cleveland, Cleveland, Ohio, by the management: "Any employe who is found to be selling, bartering, giving away, accepting orders for the sale of, or handling liquor in any form, or even advising any guest where he may obtain liquor in any form, will be instantly discharged and turned over to the federal authorities."

The governor of Argentina's northern territory has decreed that saloons in that state shall be 80 miles apart. A franchise of that character in the United States would be worth the cost of a presidential campaign—at least.

BURKETT URGES COMPENSATION FOR SOLDIERS

In Absence of Federal Enactment, Would Have Texas Provide for Her Own.

Senator Joe Burkett, candidate for governor, who has been ill for some three weeks with influenza, is able to get about again, but is not yet strong enough to begin campaigning. When seen by a correspondent of this paper and asked with reference to his views upon the soldier bonus bill, now pending before congress, and as a possible state issue he said: "I am very much disappointed that congress has not really reported out and agreed upon an honest-to-goodness adjusted compensation bill for ex-service men. Of course, paid-up insurance will be some aid to the ex-service man in the way of taking care of his relatives and family, but he has to die to win the insurance. I feel that it is the solemn duty of the federal government to compensate our soldier boys for their service and the federal government failing to do so, then I believe that such solemn duty falls upon the state, and I am in favor of Texas passing a compensation bill for Texas' soldier boys who gave of their time, their blood and their lives in the great World war.

Unfair to Soldiers.
"Of course, during that war it became necessary for the United States government to take over, for government purposes, the railways, telegraphs, coal mines, ship docks and a great many other industries, in order that our resources might be marshaled to the greatest advantage. The men—and women—for that matter, who worked in such industries, of course, should have been compensated, but they are not and were not entitled to a whit more compensation, if as much, as the boys and men who went to the camps, to the battlefields and to hospitals and their graves. The government readjusted the pay of the telegraph operators, the railway men and miners, the shipbuilders and other industrialists who were already receiving from three to seven dollars per day, but it has not seen fit yet to compensate the soldier boys who were only receiving \$30 per month.

Good Wages at Home.
"Most of us who remained at home received a good price for our labor and for our products, and enjoyed the greatest era of prosperity we have experienced in a long time and our soldier boys were only making the paltry pittance of \$30 per month while we were prospering at home. It is not right and it is not fair for their meager compensation not to be readjusted to a reasonable degree. They are not asking for a thing that is not right. It is not a premium on patriotism but it would be simply an award of just compensation, long delayed, and I, for one, am in favor of Texas passing, as other states have passed, a reasonable compensation bill for our soldier boys of the World war."

TWO BOYS FACE CHARGE OF KILLING NEGRO GIRL

It is alleged they became enraged at the girl and her mother when they alighted from a street car in front of them, and pelted the two with stones, fatally injuring the girl.

Printed materials are pushing their way through the plain satins, taffetas, crepes and cottons as spring approaches. Women have grown to include the printed frock as indispensable in the wardrobe. Surely, a flowered print or Paisley makes a gown that is suitable for many occasions. The summer traveler finds it the most successful material for knock-about wear, as it is just as suitable for afternoon wear as for morning wear.

The season brings out a great variety of patterned materials, ranging from huge flowered effects to tiny Chinese figures. mailed out within a few days, it was said.

Meeting is interesting.
Every speaker on the program arranged for last night was on hand with a pocketful of facts and a headful of wit and wisdom. The program went with a snap, for none expressed a wish to speak very long, the chairman invariably frowning after a 12-minute limit was reached. Consequently they boiled much into short time and few words.

Previous to the speaking a buffet supper was served, just a little cheese, a few hot dogs, some potatoes, pickles, salad, near-beer and coffee, quite enough to satisfy the appetites and whet the imagination. Walter Murray, chairman of the committee on arrangements, presided, and kept events stirring. Raymond Teal led in song.

President O. D. Dillingham stated the purpose of the meeting, told of the efforts made in the last year to advance the interests of Ranger and suggesting that the city, while it has made material advance, was just at the point where concentrated and co-operative effort would accomplish much more in the next year. He declared that politics had not had and should not have any place in Chamber of Commerce work, that united work was necessary for the advancement of any city and that the hearty and co-ordinated efforts of the people of Ranger would put this city among the foremost of all in West Texas.

B. F. Bennett, secretary for the last year, who is retiring from that office April 1 to return to the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, reviewed accomplishments in Ranger through the allied business interests during the year and, while expressing his regret that he was soon to leave, predicted that Ranger was in position now to go forward faster and to a greater extent than ever thought possible heretofore.

Encourage Farming
Encouragement of farming was urged by E. H. Mills, who urged the splendid wealth making prospects from cotton, melons and various other field crops for which both climate and soil in the Ranger territory are very well suited. He recalled that the cotton gin here ginned 754 bales of cotton last year and forecast it would grow more than twice this amount from the crop of 1924. He said that twice as much farming was being done about Ranger this year than last year, and that a fine class of farmers was being attracted this way.

Indorsing every word that Mr. Mills had said, Dr. L. G. Buchanan said that "civic improvements" in Ranger would contribute to a more stable and prosperous citizenship and make better business for the farmers. He had heard it said altogether too often, "I don't know how long I shall stay in Ranger." It was made the excuse for not owning a home. He challenged any person to show how he had better prospects to succeed elsewhere, and suggested that the person who feared he would be "fired" from his job was the only one who had any right to suggest that he might have to leave Ranger to better himself. "You are meeting with greater success right here than you would anywhere else and you know it," said Dr. Buchanan. "Why not be good citizens and own your own homes." He was referring to comparatively few of those present, for a large number of them are home owners, but speaking of their shoulders to many absentees who do not own their homes.

Shopping in Ranger

An interesting talk on "Ranger as a Shopping Center" was made by Mrs. J. M. White, who declared that Ranger in that respect surpasses any city of similar size anywhere in the country. She suggested that Ranger should have a slogan, as in Dallas and Fort Worth, indicating unswerving devotion and loyalty to the city. "Co-operation" was the subject on which Albert Joseph always speaks both interestingly and effectively and he did so again. He urged co-operation both between the citizens and business people of Ranger, and also between the people of this city and the people of the country.

The Rev. G. D. Robinson, president of the Ranger Ministerial association, discussed "Ranger Schools and Churches," and insisted that persons who supported one would invariably support the other.

FORMER AGENT OF DEPARTMENT GIVES EVIDENCE

Gaston B. Means Says He Asks No Quarter and Needs No Immunity.

WASHINGTON, March 14.—Owing to the illness of Mrs. Roxie Stinson, the former wife of Jess W. Smith, the dead friend of Attorney General Daugherty, who is the present star witness before the senate Daugherty investigating committee, Gaston B. Means, former department of justice agent, took the stand as the first witness today. Senator Wheeler questioned him privately earlier in the day regarding alleged bribes which the latter, who is under indictment in New York for alleged liquor frauds, is reported to have known.

Paul Howland, attorney for Daugherty, inquired if the witnesses for whom he requested subpoenas yesterday had been called. Chairman Brookhart told him they had not, as the prosecuting witnesses were to take all the committee's time for the next few days. Howland asked that Mrs. Stinson be held under subpoena until she had been cross-examined by Daugherty's attorneys.

"She will be held," said Senator Wheeler. Rush Holland, assistant attorney general, who has been acting as "official observer" for President Coolidge in the oil investigation, took a seat in the crowd when the hearing began.

A statement sent to the committee by the attorney general protesting against Means appearing before the Teapot Dome and Daugherty investigating committee, on the ground that he might obtain immunity from other indictments by coming here, was read by Wheeler. The committee agreed to call witnesses for the defense after the nature of their testimony had been determined.

"We want to know beforehand what is to be expected from these witnesses," said Wheeler. When Daugherty's objection to permitting Means to testify was read, Means said: "I waive immunity and I ask no quarter. I need no immunity."

ATTENDANCE AT RANGER HIGH SCHOOL HOLDING UP TO ITS HIGH MARK

Fewer pupils are dropping out in the second semester than in the first semester, according to a comparison of enrollment and attendance figures of the Ranger High school. This indicates more stable conditions in the city, high school authorities say.

The enrollment for the first six weeks of school ending Oct. 19 was 336 and the attendance 320, whereas for the six weeks ending on Feb. 21 the enrollment was 343 and the attendance 338. The loss for the first six weeks was 16 while for the six weeks ending Feb. 21 only five. The figure 343 represents the enrollment solely for the second semester.

The average daily attendance is at the highest figure known this year. The attendance for the first six weeks ending Feb. 21, had climbed to 304.9. This is considerable surprising, because of the widespread prevalence of the measles and mumps among school children last month.

Enrollment and attendance figures for every six weeks of the school year are kept up to date by J. W. Overall, high school principal.

WOLVES INFEST NICHES BOTTOMS NEAR PORT ARTHUR

PORT ARTHUR, March 14.—Frontier days were recalled when Bert Conner reported the killing of two timber wolves in the "Groves," wide open spaces near here.

Each of the wolves, standing three and a half feet high, fought desperately for its life, growing fierce-

ly at the hunters in the face of open death. They were chased through miles of swamps and open country before they were brought to bay. Hunters say the "Groves" and the bottoms along the Neches river are infested with wolves.

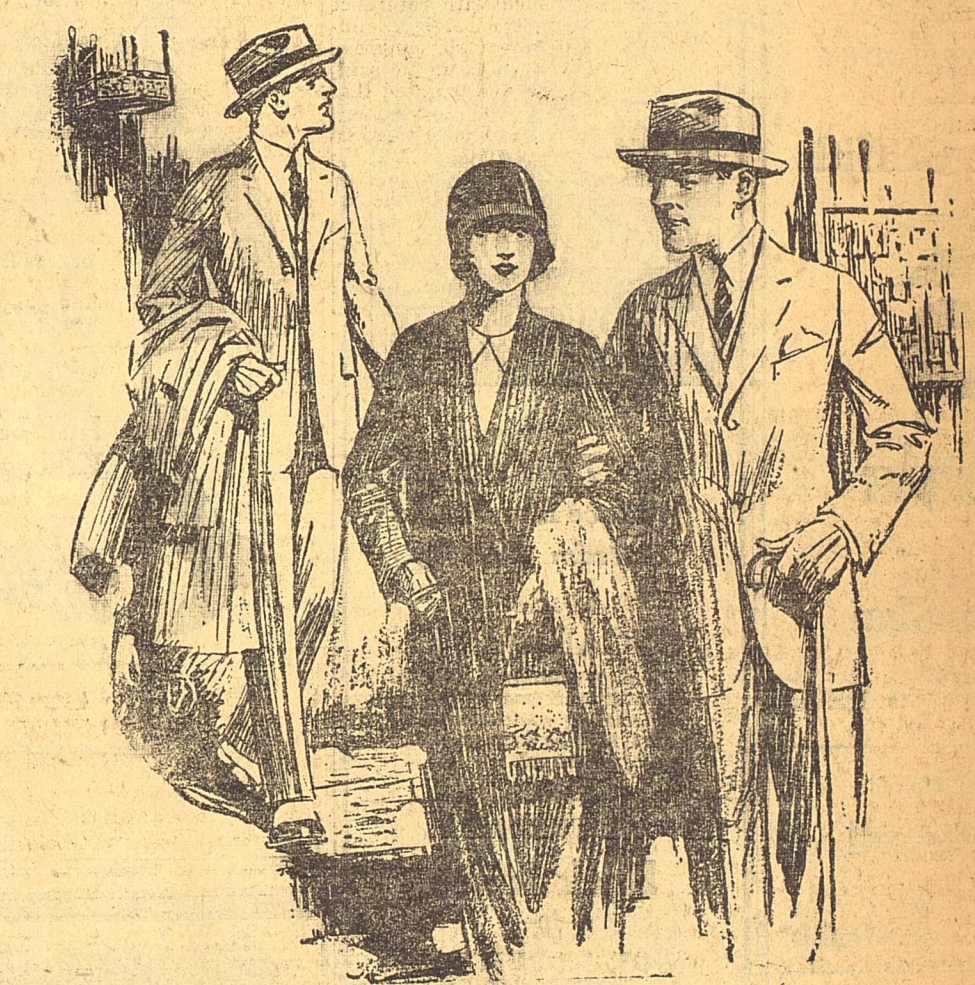

ONE MODERN LIGHT PLANT

The little town of Djal-ogli is the proud possessor of the only modern electric lighting plant in the country. This is due to a young American, a resident director of the Near East relief. He discovered an abandoned water mill perched on the banks of

a swiftly running stream. He repaired the mill and installed a dynamo which generates 85 horse power. Now the orphanage, the hospital and nearly every house in the village are lighted with electricity, to the astonishment of the natives, many of whom had never seen an electric light before.

FORT WORTH—Extensions of service of electric power and light are to be made at once by the Fort Worth Power & Light company to meet demands in the suburban section of the city. The expenditure for this purpose is expected to be about half a million dollars.

MARKET OPINION ISSUED TO JESS TAYLOR & COMPANY

NEW ORLEANS, March 14.—H. & B. Beer wired Jess Taylor & Co. of Cisco, as follows: Unlike Wednesday, the market gave a better account of itself by the responding to the very unfavorable weather in the western and central portions of the cotton region, with prospects of the bad weather working into the eastern portion of the belt in the immediate future.

Rains were general over the southern half of the western half of the belt, rain, snow and sleet over the northern portion, and rain

is indicated for the South Atlantic, perhaps snow in the north portion.

The unfavorable weather will serve to delay farm work all the more, in all sections of the cotton region, and unless the last half of March provides better climatic conditions in the interior, it is likely that the new crop will get off to a late start, especially in the early producing sections of South Texas and Southern Georgia.

This feature of the situation, larger spot sales at Liverpool, 12,000, of which 4,700 were American, and the important recovery in the frame influenced much buying.

The forecast is for fair weather for West Texas, and it is likely that the weather will improve in the Southwest, although it will probably become worse in the southeastern portion of the belt.

Since the weather is the principal sustaining influence, it is likely that it would lose some of its influence in event of better weather being indicated for the western belt over the week-end.

The British board of trade report for February made a favorable showing, exports of cloth being the largest thus far this season.

ROMERO HAS ALL THE CIRCUS COLOR OF FIRPO; COMING TO THIS COUNTRY

NEW YORK, March 14.—Quintin Romero, heavyweight champion of Chili, who is being brought to this country by Tex Rickard for a shot at the heavyweight championship, may turn out to be an attraction just as big as Luis Firpo.

Romero has all the circus color of Firpo, and he has more of an advantage in coming out at a time when a vogue has been established for his race. He has another thing in his favor because he arrives with something of a reputation and considerable noise, while Firpo sneaked in from South America unknown and unheralded.

Firpo, however, had friendly hands to clear the way for him after he got started, but Romero will have to pull himself up practically alone if he succeeds in getting up.

While Firpo was allowed to feat on set-ups, Romero will be forced to prove himself. Rickard says that Romero can't get a shot at Dempsey until he has beaten three fighters to be selected from Jack Renaldt, George Godfrey, Floyd Johnson and Fred Fulton.

There may be better fighters than the four tentatively selected by Rickard to put the test to Romero, but they are better than the third or four-raters that were picked for Firpo.

Firpo worked up to a championship bout by beating Bill Brennan, Jim Hubbard, Jack McAuliffe, Jack Herman, Jess Willard, Joe Burke, Homer Smith, Charley Weinert and Joe Downey.

Brennan and Willard were old, worn out and through when they fought Firpo, and the others were beaten before they went into the ring.

As the outdoor season approaches there is a great demand for another fight between Dempsey and Firpo. The match is what promoters call a "natural," because it needs no steaming up. Firpo can get the match without doing anything more to prove that he would have a better chance to beat Dempsey the second time than he did on the occasion of their first bout.

Firpo knocked Dempsey to his knees twice and blasted him clear out of the ring once and that qualified him then and there for another chance at the title. The belief that Dempsey won the fight by the use of foul tactics was enough to guarantee the success of a second meeting without any further exactions from Firpo.

It is quite possible, however, that a return bout between Dempsey and Firpo could be made secondary in interest to a contest between Romero and Dempsey.

If Romero should knock out Renaldt, Godfrey, Johnson or Fulton and show the same ferocity of attack, the same style of fighting and the same color that Firpo did against his set-ups, he would become a "natural" for Dempsey.

The Eastland South ward basketball girls played the Cisco Grammar school team to decide the ward school championship of the county Wednesday afternoon in the Cisco

gym. The thrilling and hard fought battle resulted in Eastland winning, 9 to 8. The first half was in favor of Cisco, 7 to 6. The handsome cup trophy will be awarded the South ward school. Cooper school in Ranger won the cup last year.

Tomorrow at 7:30 p. m., the basketball boys will play the Ranger school sophomore boys in the athletic club gymnasium in Eastland. This will be an exciting event, as each team has won one game each, and the tie will be played off.

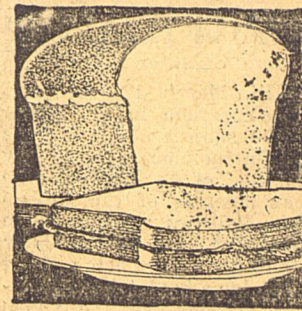

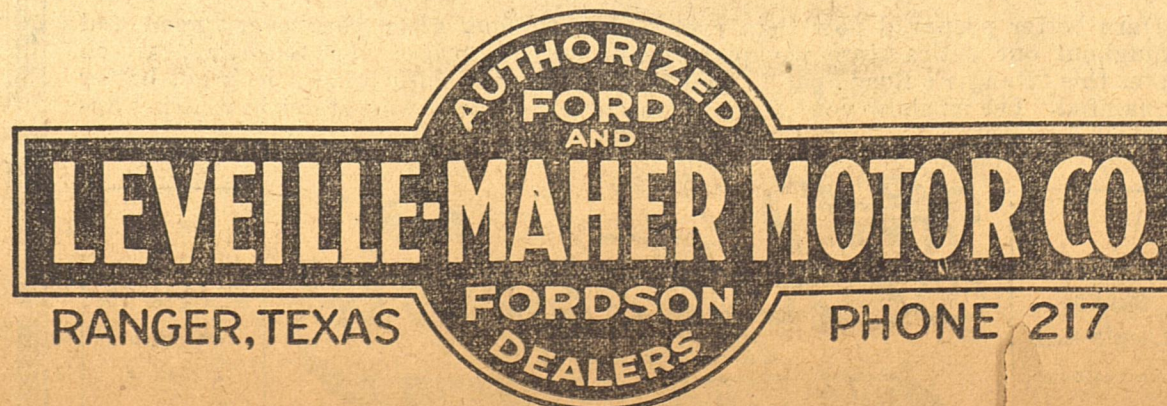

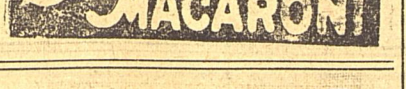
Separation of commercial traffic from that of the pleasure automobile type is desirable and should be secured where possible.


