## **CROPS PROMISE GOOD RETURNS**

Eastland County Farmers Look For Good Returns At Harvest Time.

Crop conditions in Eastland county, with the exception of being late, are the most promising in the past four years, according to County Agent R. H. Bush. Cotton, with a 5 per cent acreage increase over year, promises a yield of 20,000 bales, whereas the county produced only about 13,000 bales last year. Though late cotton is developing rapidly and is now blooming and setting

Though late cotton is developing rapidly and is now blooming and setting bolls. So far there has been little or no damage from boll weevils.

Feed crops, including maize, feterita and other sorghum crops, are generally good and very promising although they are late. The peanut crop is also fine but the acreage is considerably less than last year.

Garden truck and melons are pretty plentiful, especially melons, and they are of fine quality. Considerable trouble was experienced during the growing period of truck erops on account of green aphis or honey dew, which did more or less damage. Th farmers, however, have learned how to overcome this insect and prevent the damage it causes by spraying their crops with tobacco extracts.

Farmers over the county are pretty well up with their work and most of them have their crops clean and in good condition.

Generally speaking Eastland county farmers are in good financial condition. Their homes and other farm buildings are in a good state of repair and but few of them have gone in debt to make their year's crop. Most of them have been able to sell enough produce from the farm, inin debt to make their year's crop. Most of them have been able to sell enough produce from the farm, including eggs and poultry, to provide the necessary funds with which to support themselves and pay the operating expenses of the farm. In many cases, where considerable flocks of chickens were kept, the farm owners have been able to bank money.
