

Some few years ago the Lone Star C. Gregg, Austin. Gas company began a \$5,000,000 extension program, which included the building of an 18-inch line from Dallas to Fort Worth to West Texas fields. The line was completed as far as Judd in Palo Pinto county. The work was suspended because of the slump in business.

The company now proposes to extend this 18-inch line to Strawn and then branch out with a 16-inch line to Ranger and Eastland fields, and a 12-inch line to Desdemona fields, making a total of 50 miles of pipe line work.

The Lone Star Gas company furnishes gas for about 100 cities and towns for domestic and industrial purposes in North and Central Texas. At present it obtains the bulk of its gas from southern Oklahoma. 



The new income tax figures tell a plain story with a plain lesson. In one year, the number of Americans paying taxes on incomes above \$100,-000 decreased from 3,600 to 2,300. That is a loss of 1,300.

The governments of the United States are practically inviting people to evade their taxes by seeking relief through investment in tax-free securities.

The governments, local and national, lay before the man of large income a great mass of their securities, every few days, and say to him: If you will hand over some of your money in exchange for these securities, we will see that you pay no taxes on the income that you draw from the loan.

Many taxpayers accept this invitation and thus evade, or dodge, taxes, thereby loading a fierce tax burden on the rest of us.

So long as the governments impose enormous taxes, and at the same time offer a ready way out, the present abuse will go on.



JESS WILLARD, 40, **MEETS FIRPO IN THE EAST TODAY**

By PAUL R. MALLON,

United Press Staff Correspondent. NEW YORK, July 12 .- When Luis Firpo climbs into the ring in the great wooden saucer in Jersey City with Jess Willard this evening, it will be decided once and for all just exactly what happens when an irresistible force meets an immovable object.

Firpo, the Argentine madman, ferocious and bull-like when he is aroused, is listed in the fight records as an irresistible force.

Willard, cool, stubborn giant, is the immovable object. He always has been with the exception of one day out in Toledo when he met Jack Dempsey and his foot slipped. He is trying to prove today that only his foot slipped and that he really is worthy of another match for the championship.

Great crowds of New Yorkers and fight fans from all over the world migrated via ferry and subway under the Hudson river and besieged the great stadium where 90,000 persons two years ago saw Jack Dempsey knock out Georges Carpentier.

Interest in the match is high and the betting is free. The fans have been interested since the milk fund bouts at the Polo Grounds when Willard knocked out Floyd Johnson a few minutes after Firpo had finished polishing off young "Jack MacAuliffe II."


Tex Reckard, the premier of pro-moters, as soon as Willard had passed the final blow, waxed enthusiastic over the prospects of a match, and it was concluded quickly.

Firpo will enter the ring at around 219 pounds, while Willard fights his best around 240, the mark he has been trying to reach.

The Argentinian has the advantage in age. He is only 26. Willard confessed to the New Jersey state boxing commission that he was 38, but in-vestigations indicated he is about 42. The record books have him exactly 40, born in Pottawatomie county, Kansas, in December, 1883.






