Mrs. Bedinger left her home at 9:30 o'clock Friday night after telling her mother, Mrs. Catherine Moeller, she had received a telephone call informing her that Bedinger had been injured in an automobile accident and was at Good Samaritan hospital.

Mrs. Bedinger put on a white turban hat, took her purse, containing \$35, and left, ostensibly to go to the hospital. She never reached the institution nor has she been seen since. One of the scores of letters receiv-

ed by Bedinger from persons interested in the search for his wife caused him last night to direct his attention toward West Virginia.

The letter was from Ravenswood, W. Va. The writer stated a woman answering the description of Mrs. Bedinger had been seen in Ravenswood early Monday morning. The letter was signed "A Railroad Conductor."

According to the letter, the woman got off a Baltimore & Ohio railroad train in Ravenswood and said she was going to Pleasant View, W. Va., a small town about three miles from Ravenswood. The woman wore a hat, dress and shoes similar to those worn by Mrs. Bedinger when she disappeared, according to the letter.

Bedinger immediately wired a description of his wife to Ravenswood. He requested that authorities there interview the woman who went to Pleasant View.

Hopes that Mrs. Bedinger might have gone to the home of relatives in Evansville were abandoned yesterday when letters were received from Evansville containing information that she was not here.


A Costume Which Makes Character its Own Reward


