Secretaries Weeks, Hoover and Wallace will complete their intimate studies bearing on Alaskan condition with hearings to be held in Anchoragie and Seward and these officials will then confer with the president, also enlisting the aid of newspaper men with the party, many of whom have given close study to Alaskan problems.

President Harding will work out a general plan for his speech at Seattle in which he expects to discuss Alaskan conditions. Wichita Falls, Ranger and Fort Worth Railway Also Adds To Equipment.

Announcement of the new train service on the Wichita Falls, Ranger and Fort Worth railroad, effective Sunday, July 22, was made today by General Passenger Agent H. A. Coomer. Instead of one train daily both north and south over the road, there will be two trains north and one south.

New and modern equipment, including a locomotive and passenger coaches, will be put into service at

Train No. 2 will leave here at 5:40 a. m. for Breckenridge. The first train south for Dublin will depart from the station at 9:20 a. m., which will be train No. 1. The second train for Breckenridge, No. 4, will leave Ranger at 2:35 p.m. There will be fourteen stops between Dublin and Breckenridge.

Trains Nos. 1 and 4 will make connectiton at Dublin with the M., K. & T. and also the Frisco. Train No. 2 will make connections with the Wichita Falla and Southern for all points on that line.

The additional train between Ranger and Breckenridge is on an experiment basis. The railroad officials believe it will pay. In the event it does not, it will be withdrawn. The officials have already secured the consent of the chambers of commerce of this city, Breckenridge and Eastland that they will not oppose the withdrawal of train No. 2 if it proves to be a financial burden,

The big passageway in front of the Wichita Falls road's freight station has been improved. Stone and clay have been laid down to make it more convenient for loading and unloading at the platforms. Rains in the past have interfered with loading but the harder surface will make it an easier job for truck drivers.

## Propaganda Is Not News

The Ranger Times is not posing as a moulder of public opinion. Editorially it reserves the right to express opinions of its own, but its news and advertising columns are intended to report events of public interest and what people say and do, and to carry the messages of advertisers to the readers.

Except in matter of transcending general interest, people usually turn first in a newspaper to stories of events with which they already are familiar. They attend a ball game and then read eagerly the newspaper account of it. A public speaker reads the published report of the speech which he had learned from end to end before it was delivered, and if a mistake has been made the newspaper hears of it.

A story is told of a new reporter sent to report the burning of a church. He returned to the office, but failed to hand in a story. "Where is your report of the fire?" asked the city editor. "Didn't the church burn down?"

"Certainly it burned down," was the reply, "but all the good members of the church were

there and know all about it, and

the bad members have no concern about the church and won't care to read it." The new reporter lacked the knowledge that goes with experience.

Newspapers are keen to publish stories about civic work and public improvements. The people may know what is being done; they also wish to read about it. But the telling of such stories may be overdone and it then becomes propaganda, which is often regarded as twaddle. It should be avoided if the confidence of the public is to be retained. Propaganda must be backed up by action else it loses its force. But a certain amount of propaganda is helpful to all civic work.

The Ranger Times is interested in public work and public progress and publishes news stories to advance the public interests, but care must be exercised not to overstep the bounds. Every step in the city's forward advance is entitled to recognition and should be proclaimed for the encouragement of all, but mere boosting without some substantial act to give foundation to the propaganda not only places all a newspaper's stories under suspicion as "suggested," but lessens its efforts to work for the public good. The newspaper that respects itself wins the respect of the

public. The merchant who sticks to truthful advertising and tells the public exactly what he is offering wins the confidence of the people and gets the trade. The newspaper that reports stories of civic progress while yet news, but refuses to be led into continued wild extravagance in the circulation of mere propaganda holds the confidence and interest of the public. The Ranger Times has the

best interests of Ranger at heart and will continue, as in the past, to do everything possible to aid in its growth and progress. But just so far as it may be possible. the Ranger Times will avoid publishing propaganda that "beats the air" without getting results. The Ranger Times has the confidence and respect of the people and will try to retain it. It must be remembered that all matters relating to public progress, starting as news, turns into propaganda unless backed up by acts.
