# TAX RATE OF **COUNTY \$1.50**

Commissioners' ourt FCixes Figure, Which Is 25 Cents Higher Than Last Year.

Eastland county's tax rate for the scal year, beginning today, will be By Associated Press. \$1.50 on each \$100 valuation. This missioners after hearing from the county auditor and the county assessor of the county's budget needs and the probable tax rendition.

The tax rate increase is due principally to two items. The tax valuation, on which the rate is based, is approximately \$8,000,000 less than that of last year. For road bonds last year the sum of 82.5 cents was apportioned out of the budget, whereas this year it is \$1.05.

Here is how the money will be spent for the new fiscal year: General fund 22 cents; roads and bridges 15 cents; courthouse and jail 3 cents; jury 4 cents; courthouse and jail, sinking, 1 cent; road bond interest and sinking fund \$1.05.

Last year's budget contained no funds for the courthouse and jail and the courthouse and jail sinking funds. Amounts allowed for other departments were: Jury 2.5 cents neral 25 cents; roads and bridges cents; road bonds 82.5.




